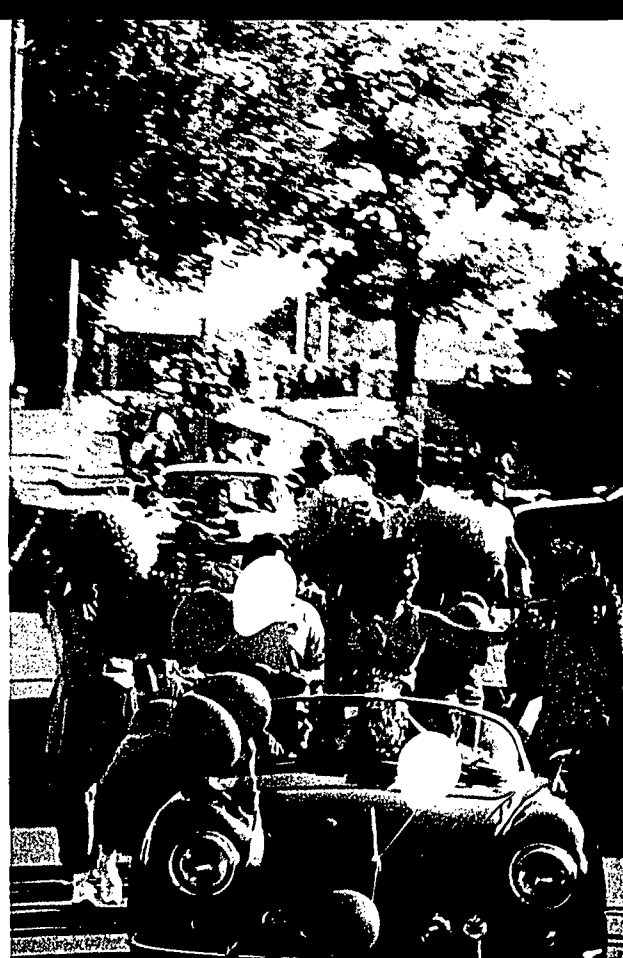

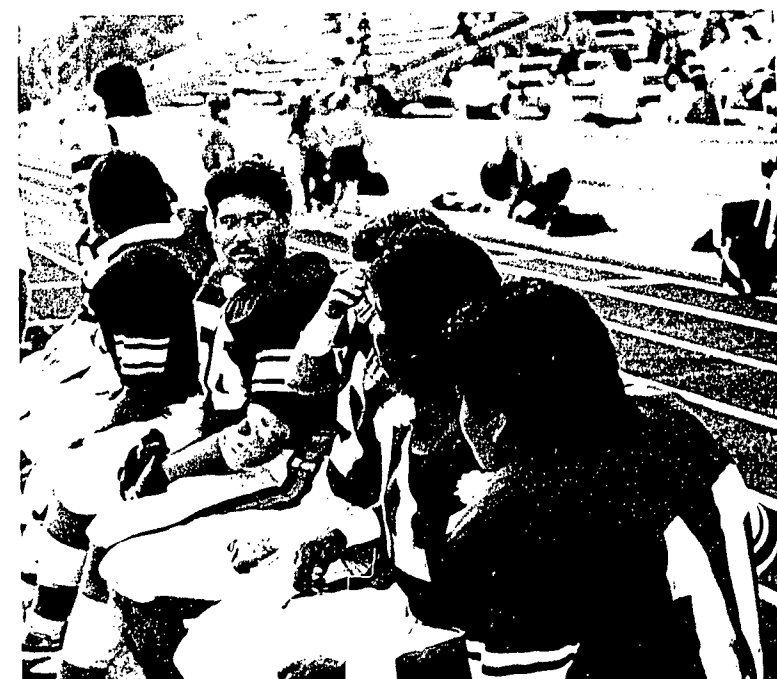

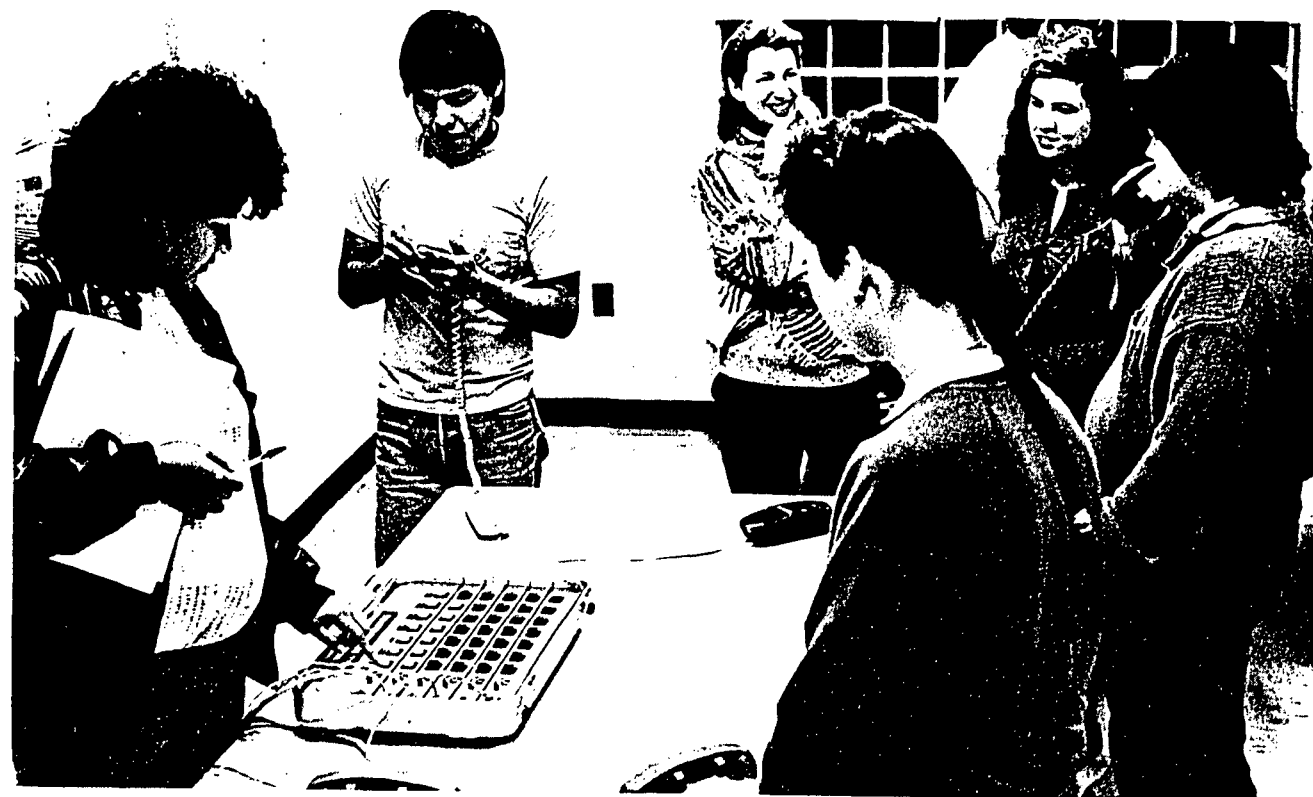
A.I.S.E.S.

Thunderbird Theatre

The drama troupe began the semester by placing first in the White Mountain Apache Fair and Rodeo with "Songs of Life." In December they presented two plays by Haskell graduate Owen LeBeau, *Between Worlds* and *Thunder Takes a Wife*. They explain how the northern lights and the rainbow came to be. The productions combined the traditional American Indian arts of storytelling, dance, sign language, and tribal music, with contemporary theatre styles of dialogue and stage movement.

Owen LeBeau is a graduate student at the University of Kansas. He writes of the Thunderbirds, "I believe there is a real need for Indian theatre, especially the way the people of Haskell have developed it. I learned not only the basics of acting and writing there, but also dignity, integrity, and honor. I learned that theatre is a group art, and not one or two people taking center stage."

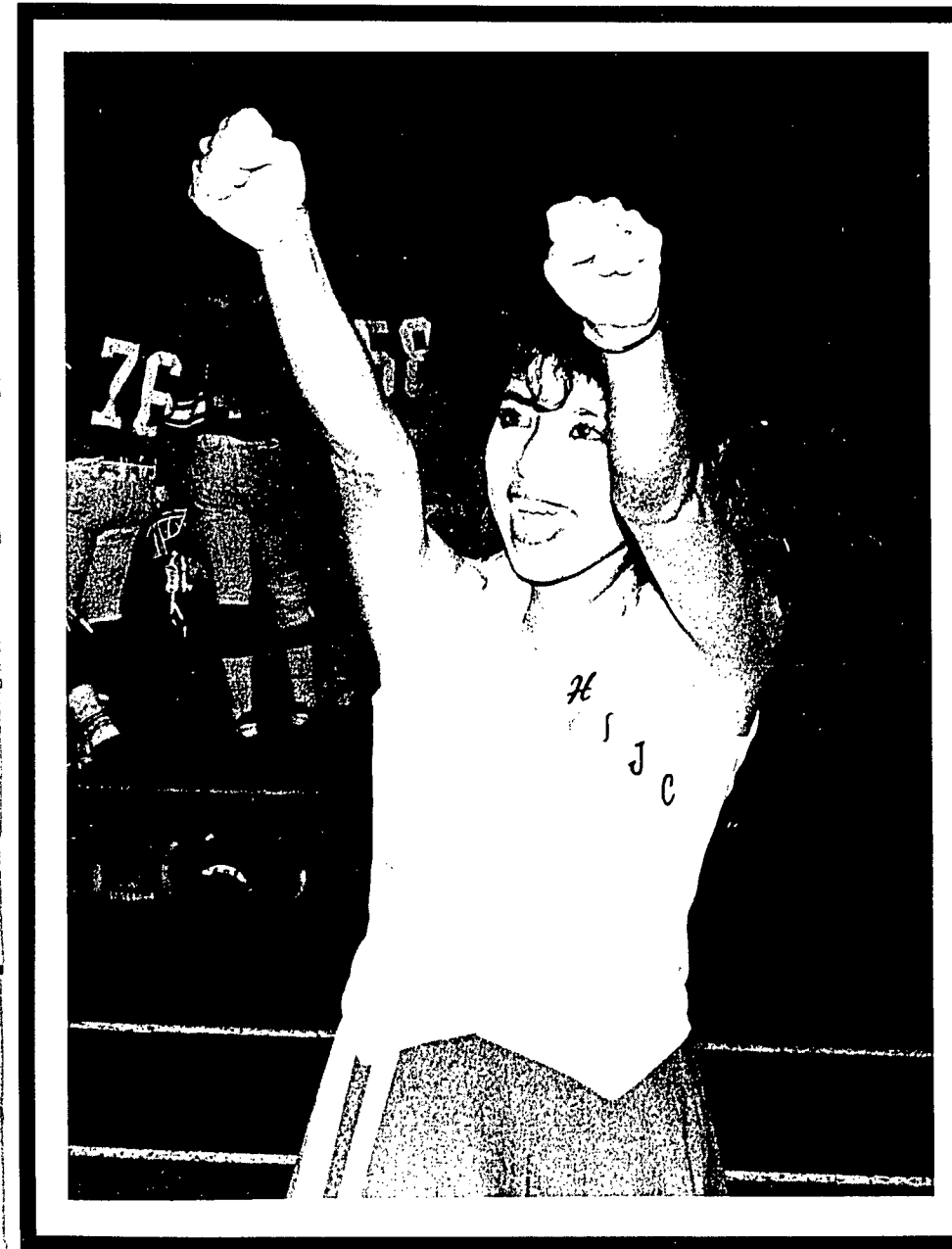

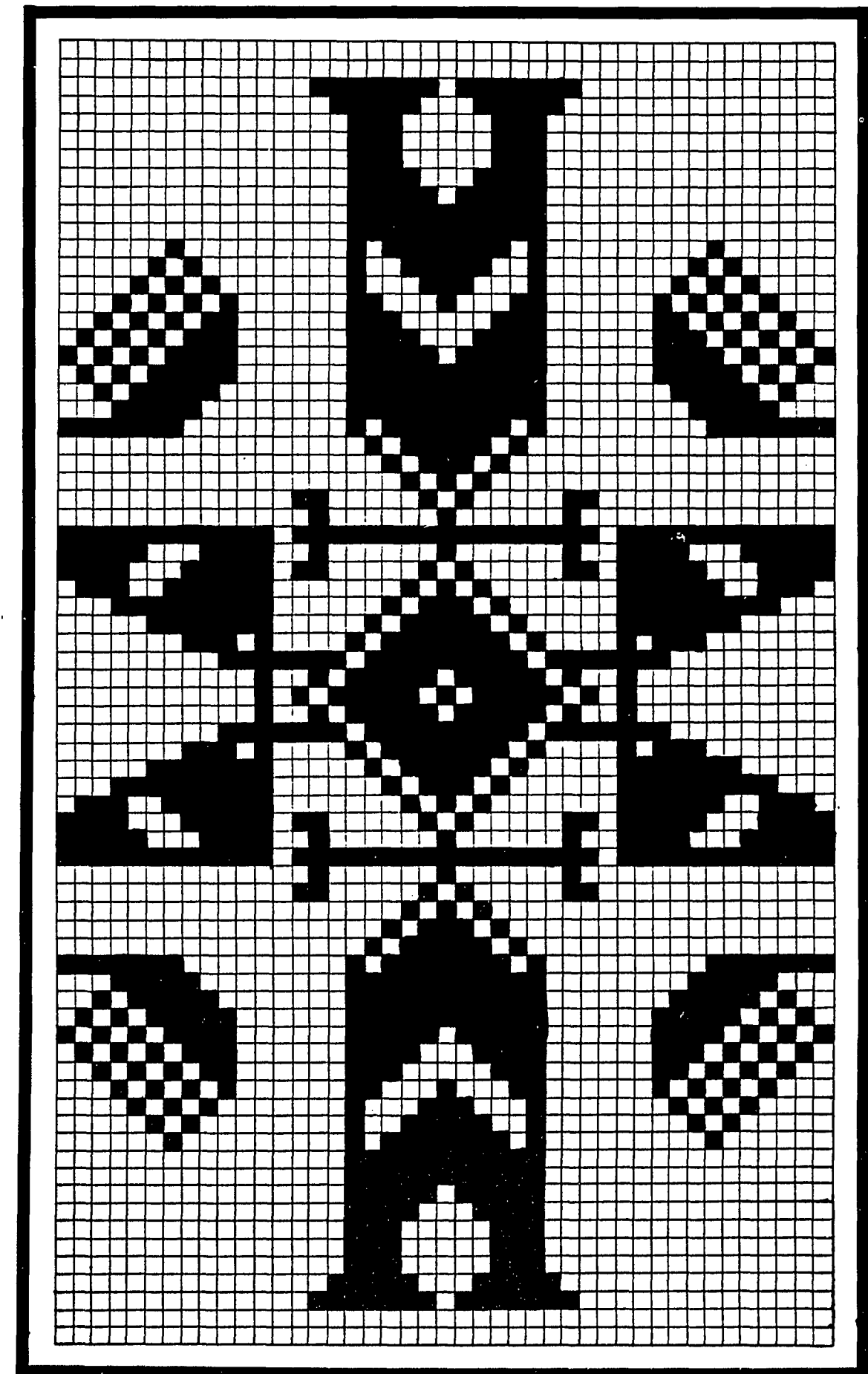

Haskell cross-country team again finishes in top ten

For the seventh time in the last eight years, Haskell's cross-country team has finished as one of the top ten schools in the National Junior College Athletic Association's national cross-country championships. Haskell finished eighth Nov. 14 at the nationals, held on the Johnson Co. Comm. College course.

Leading the way for the Indians and finishing 42nd individually was Ricky Bedonie, with a time of 26:25 over the five-mile race. Aldric George finished 52nd in a time of 26:37, and Scott Davis was 57th in 26:46. Coach Phil Homeratha was optimistic. "I don't see why we can't continue that level and maybe rise a little higher," he said. Homeratha said that the team's ability to stick together contributed to its success.

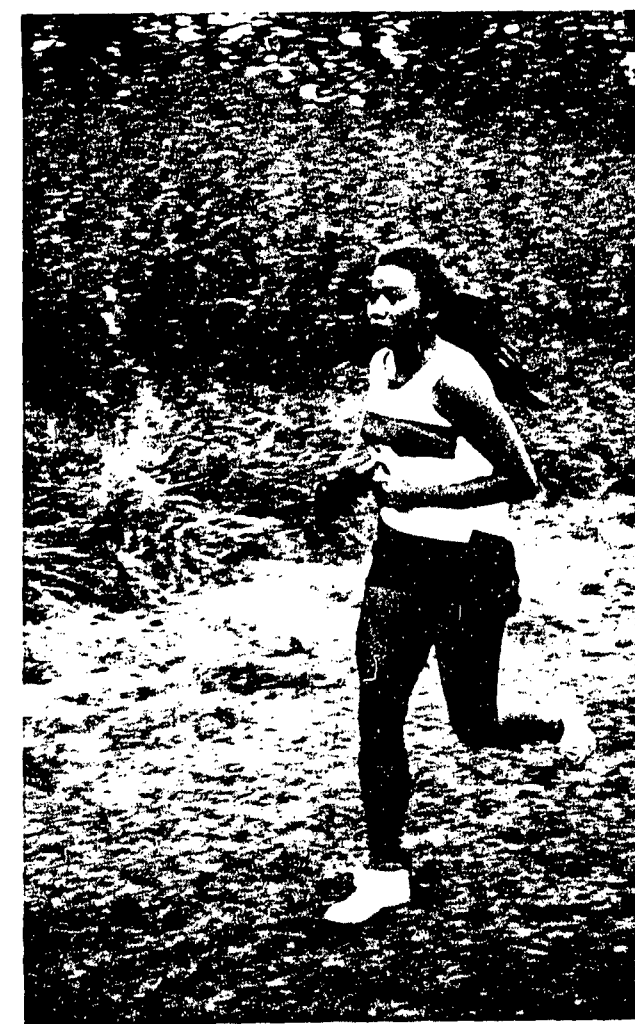

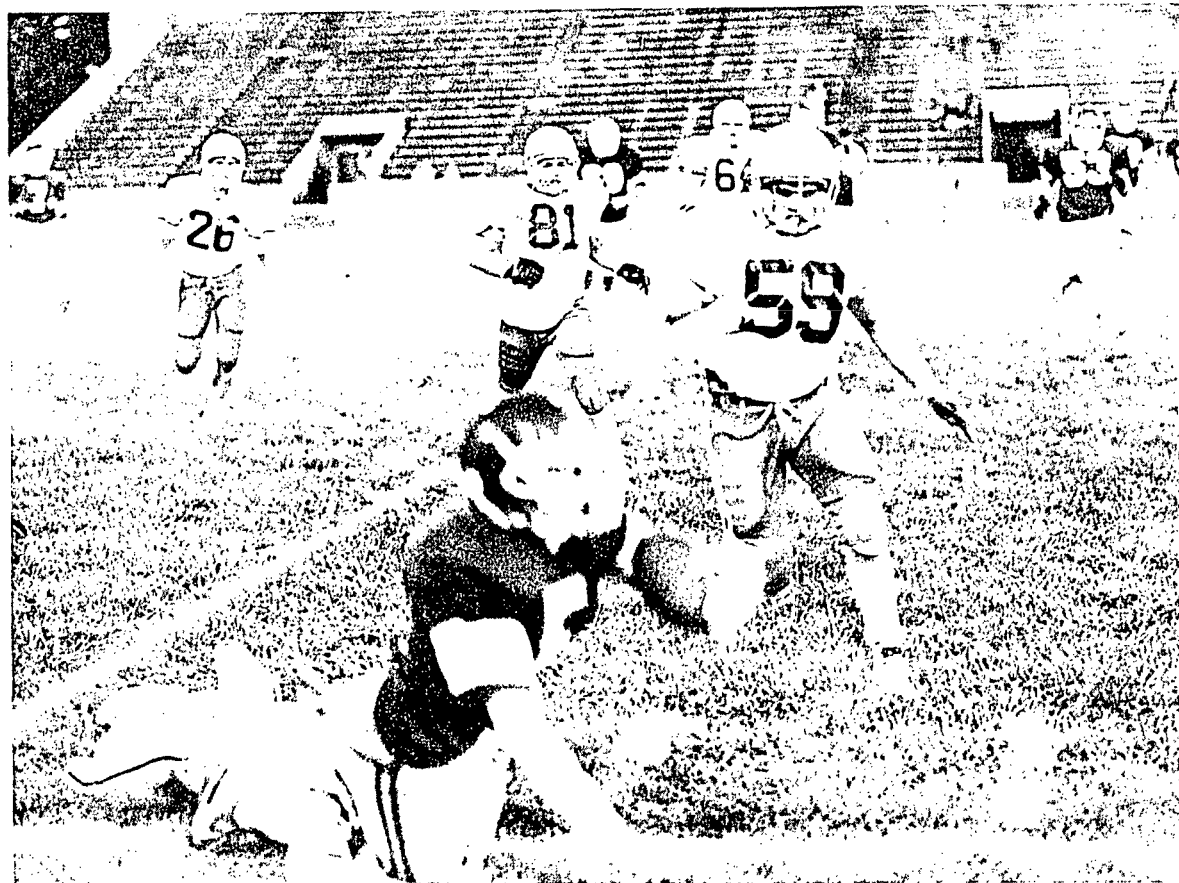


Throughout the 1987 season players give best effort

"They helped to keep the players pumped up," he said. Coach Tanner initiated a new direction in Haskell football, emphasizing social and academic progress as well as athletic training. Overall the team had a 2.1 GPA.

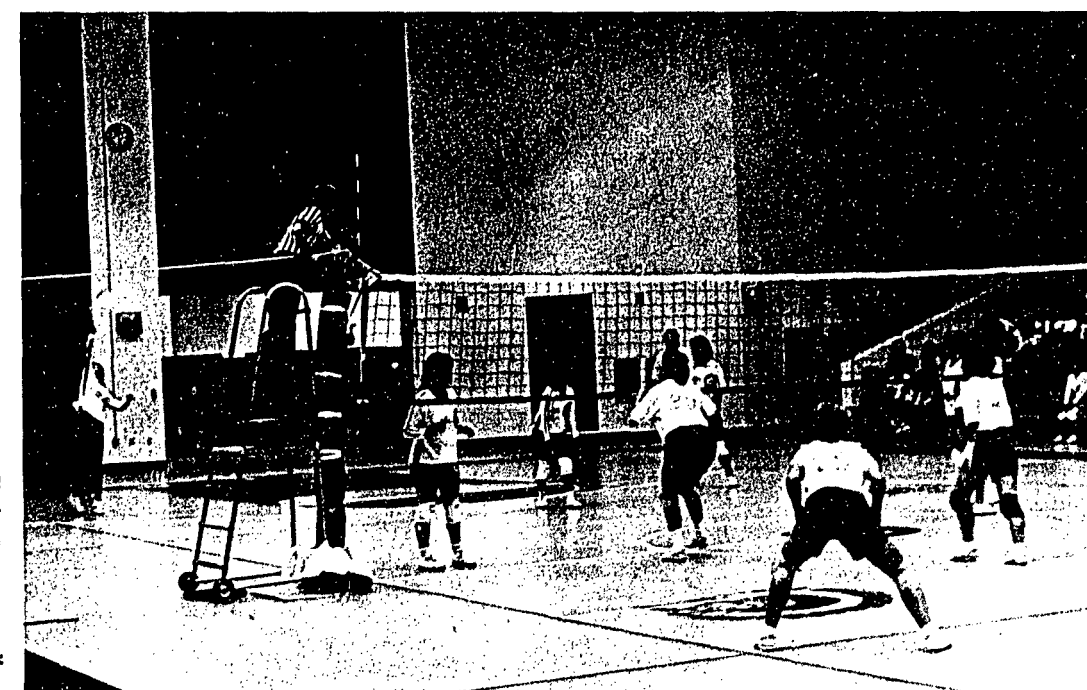
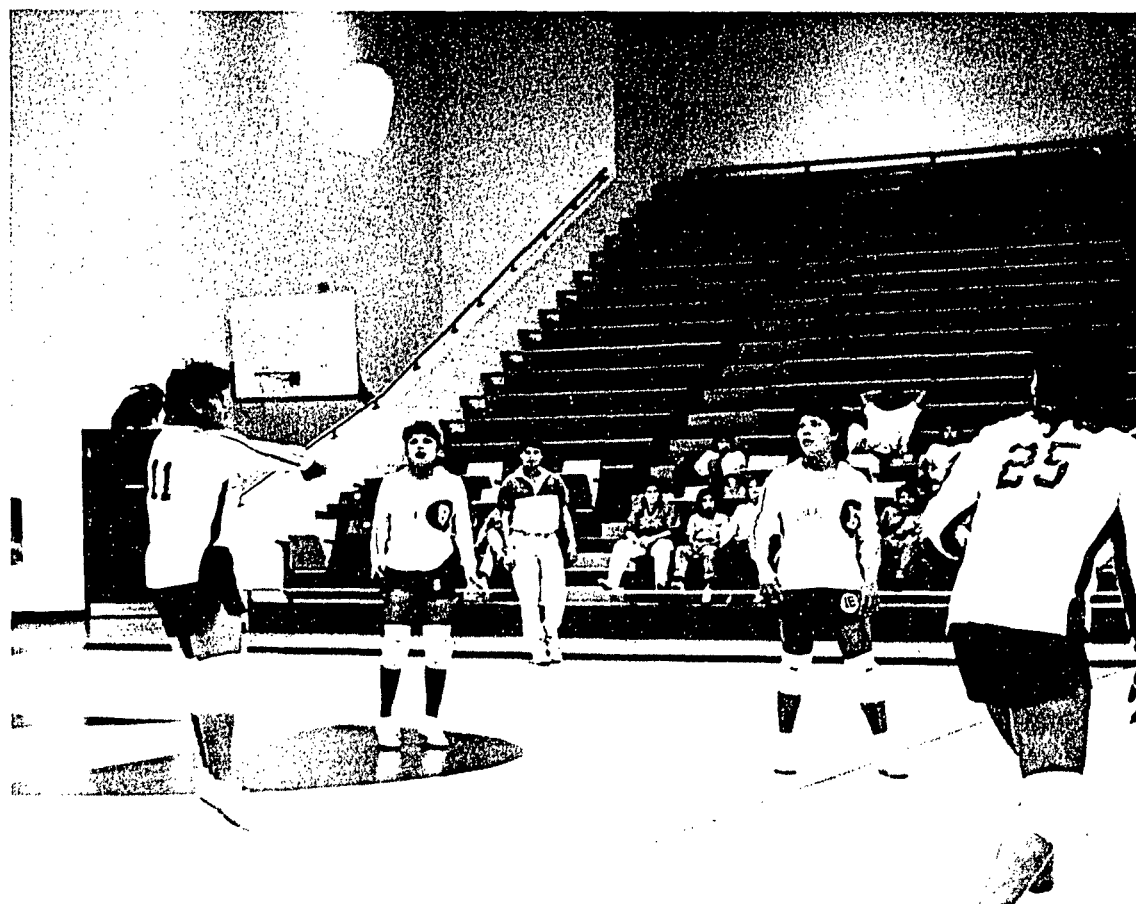
Dedicated volleyballers enjoy winning season

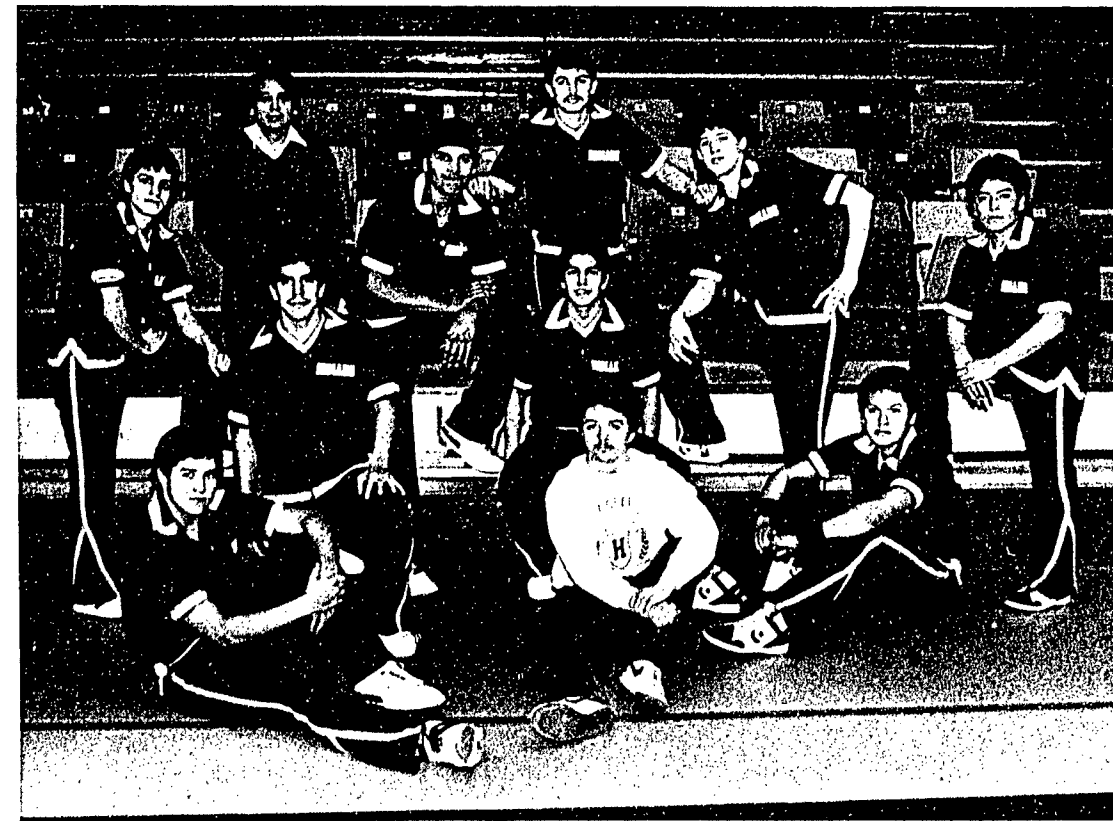
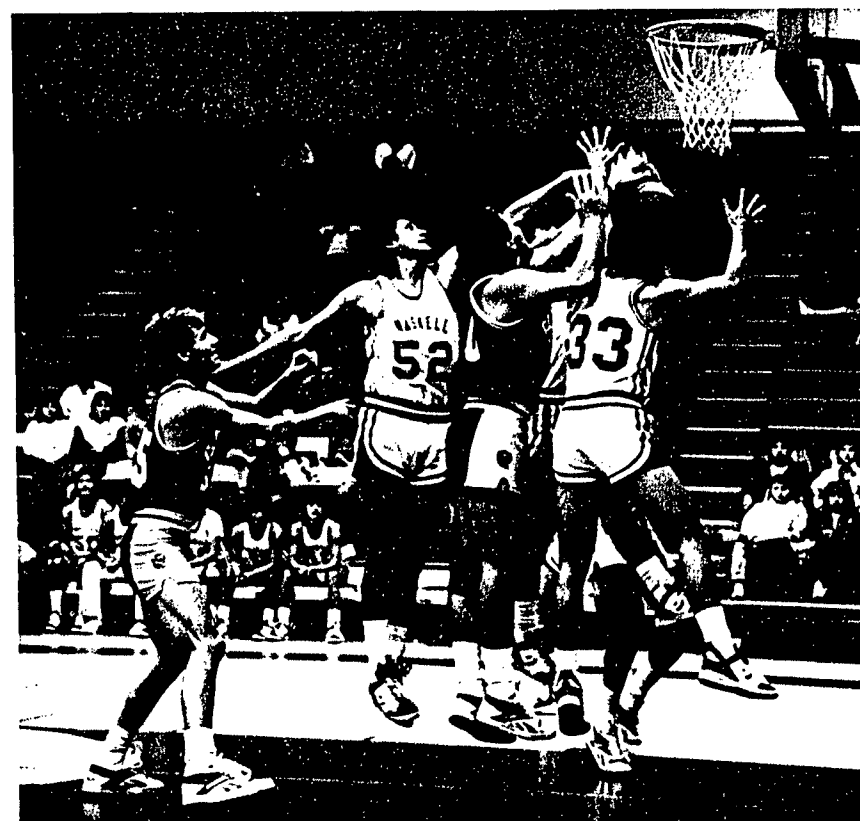


After working hard all season Indians finish with victories

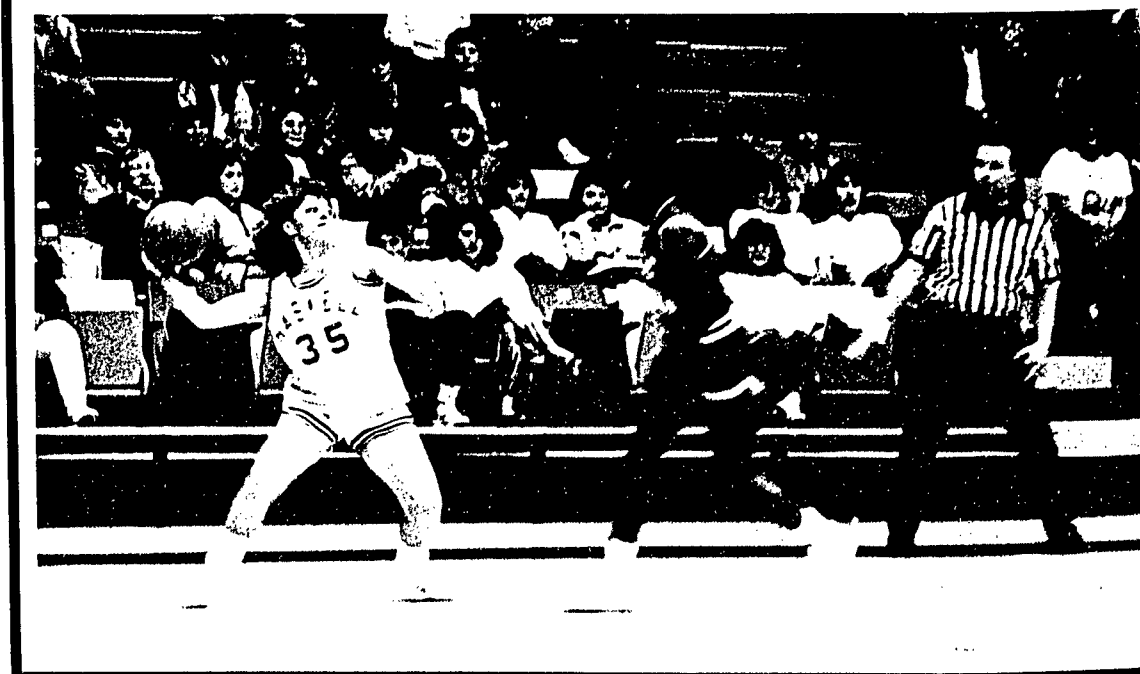
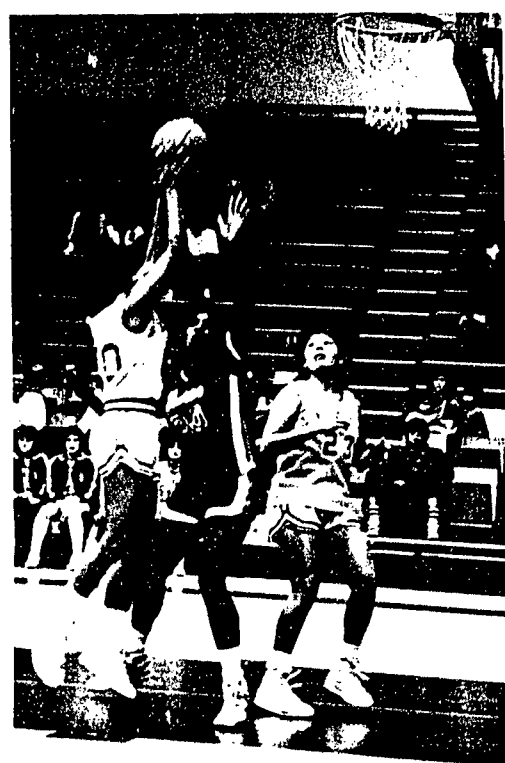
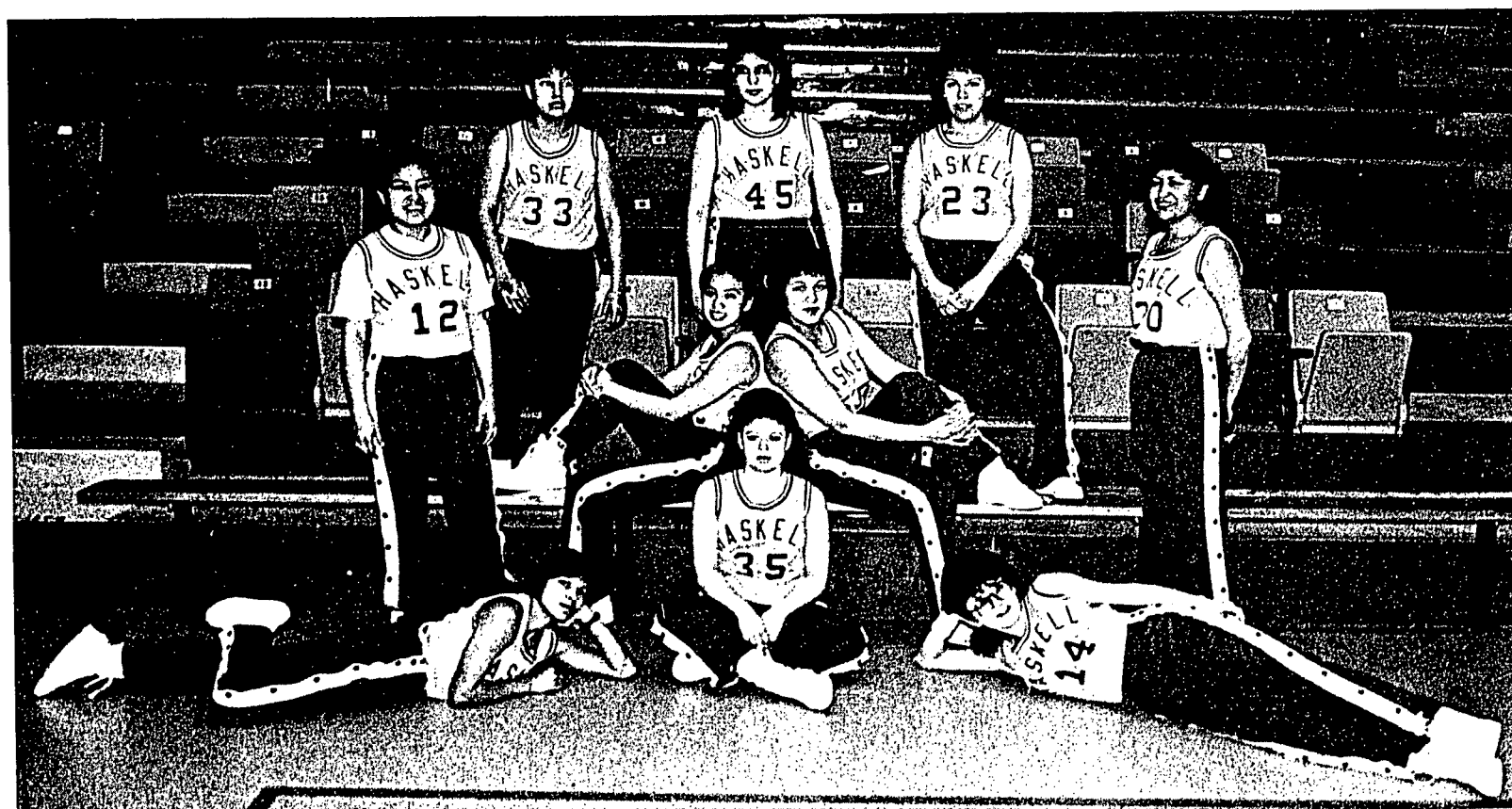




Haskell women's basketball team has winning finish

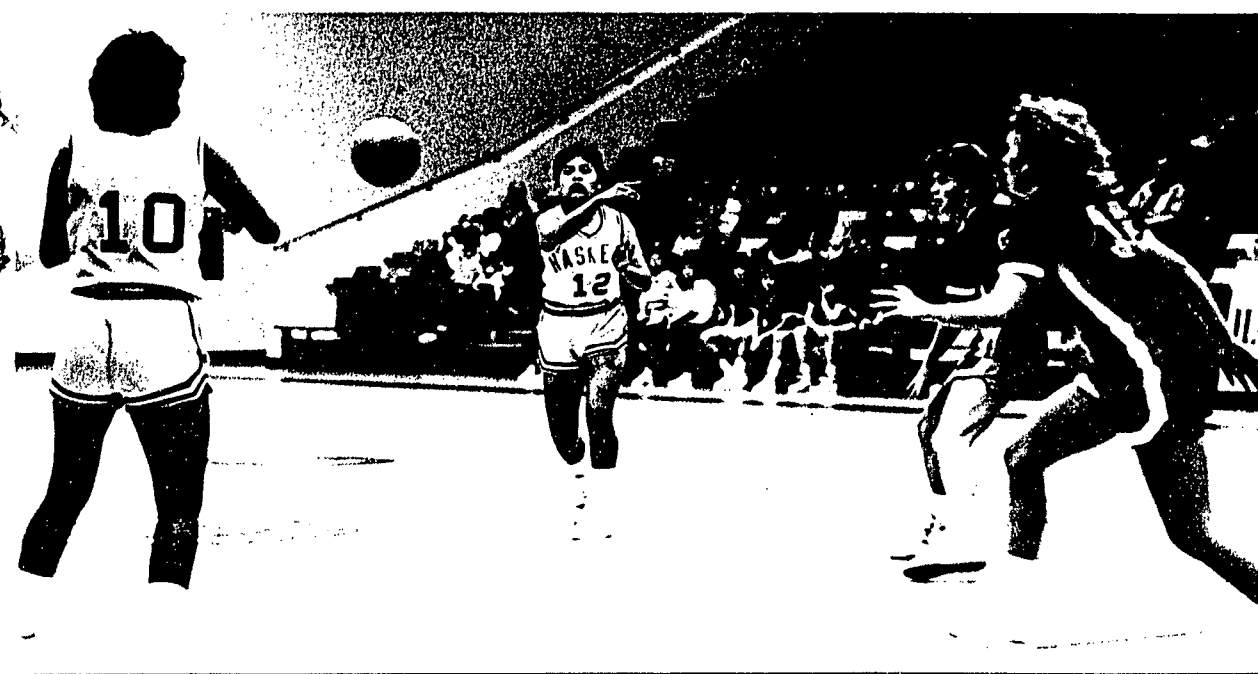
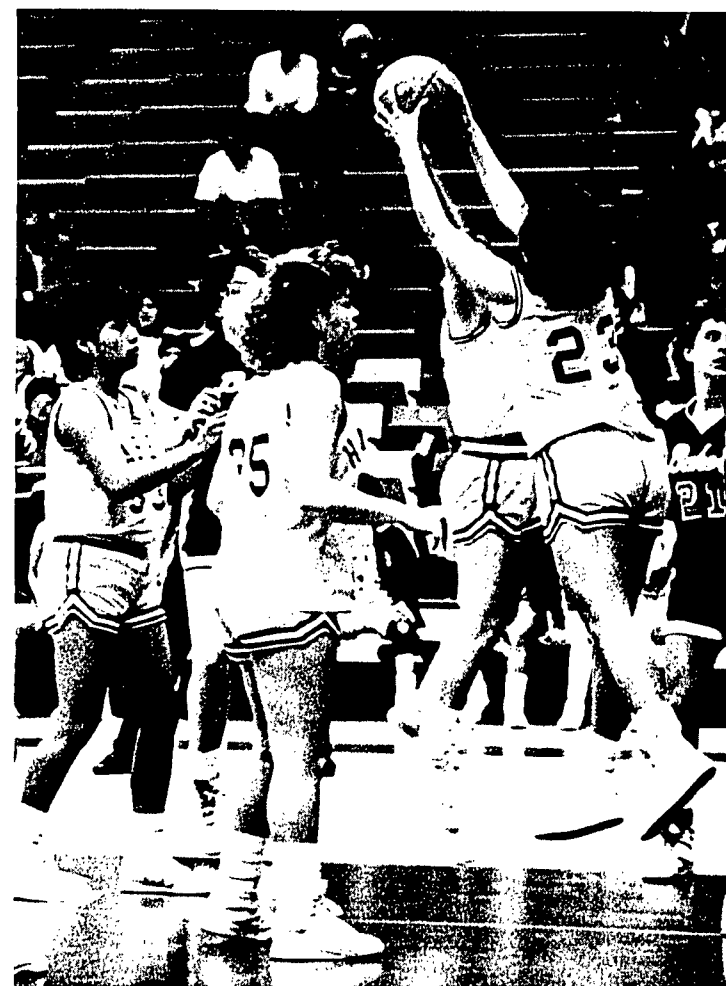

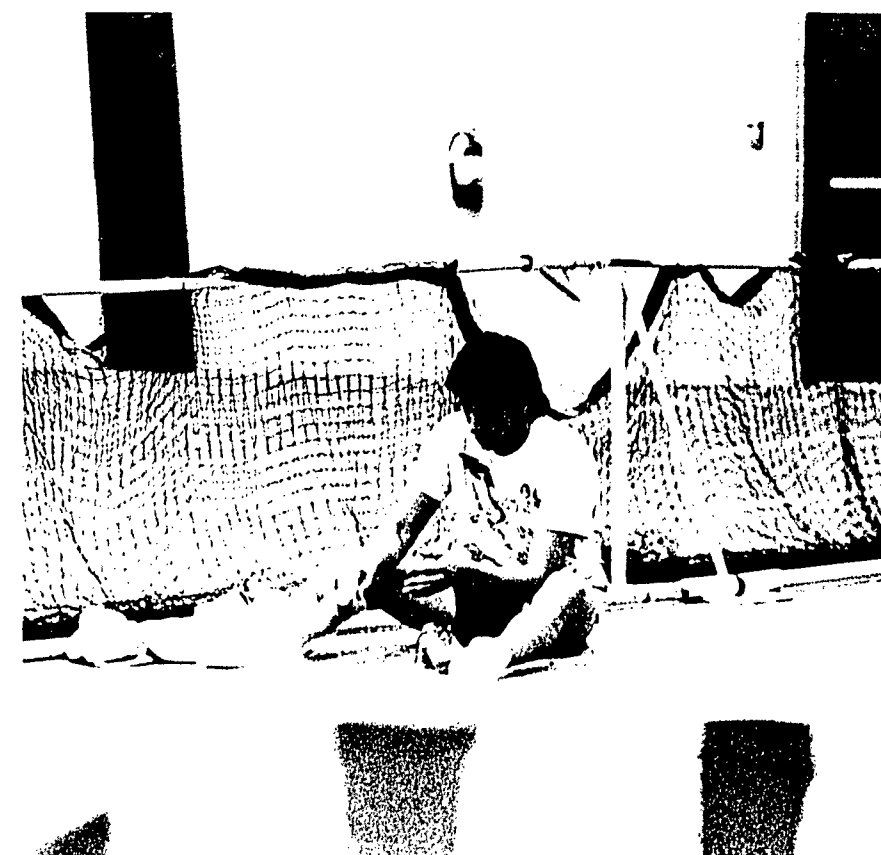

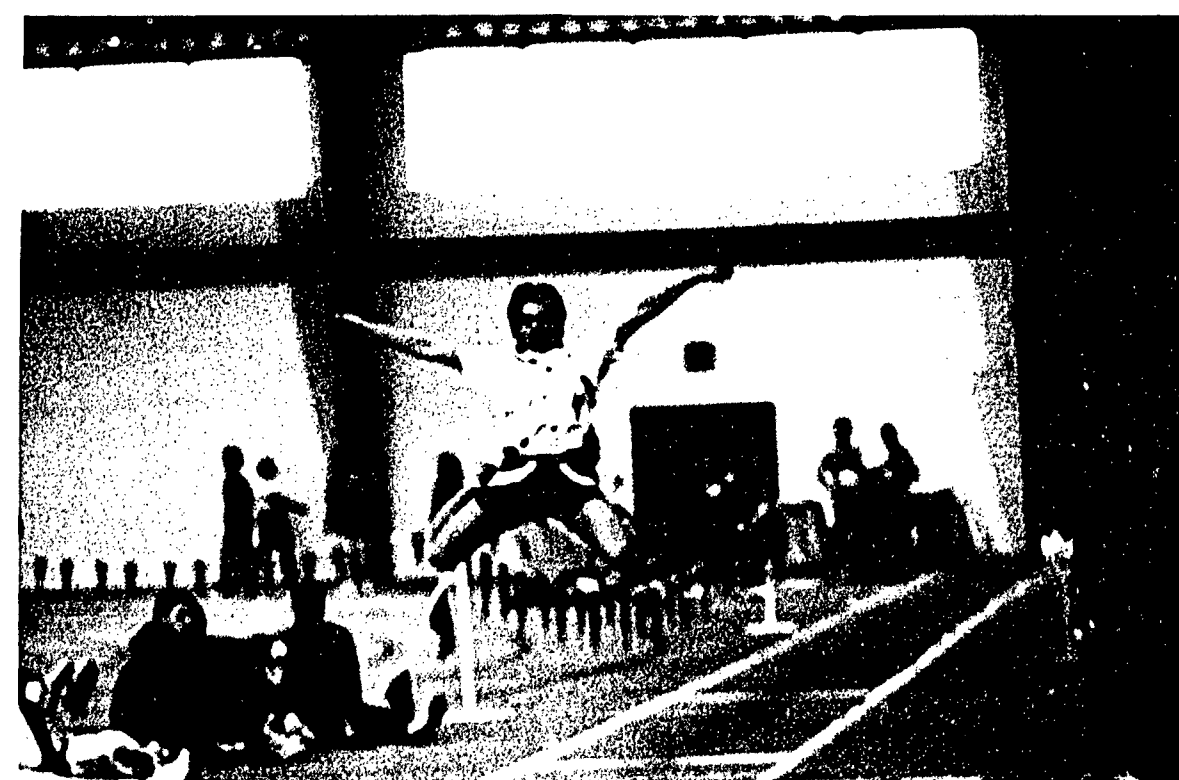

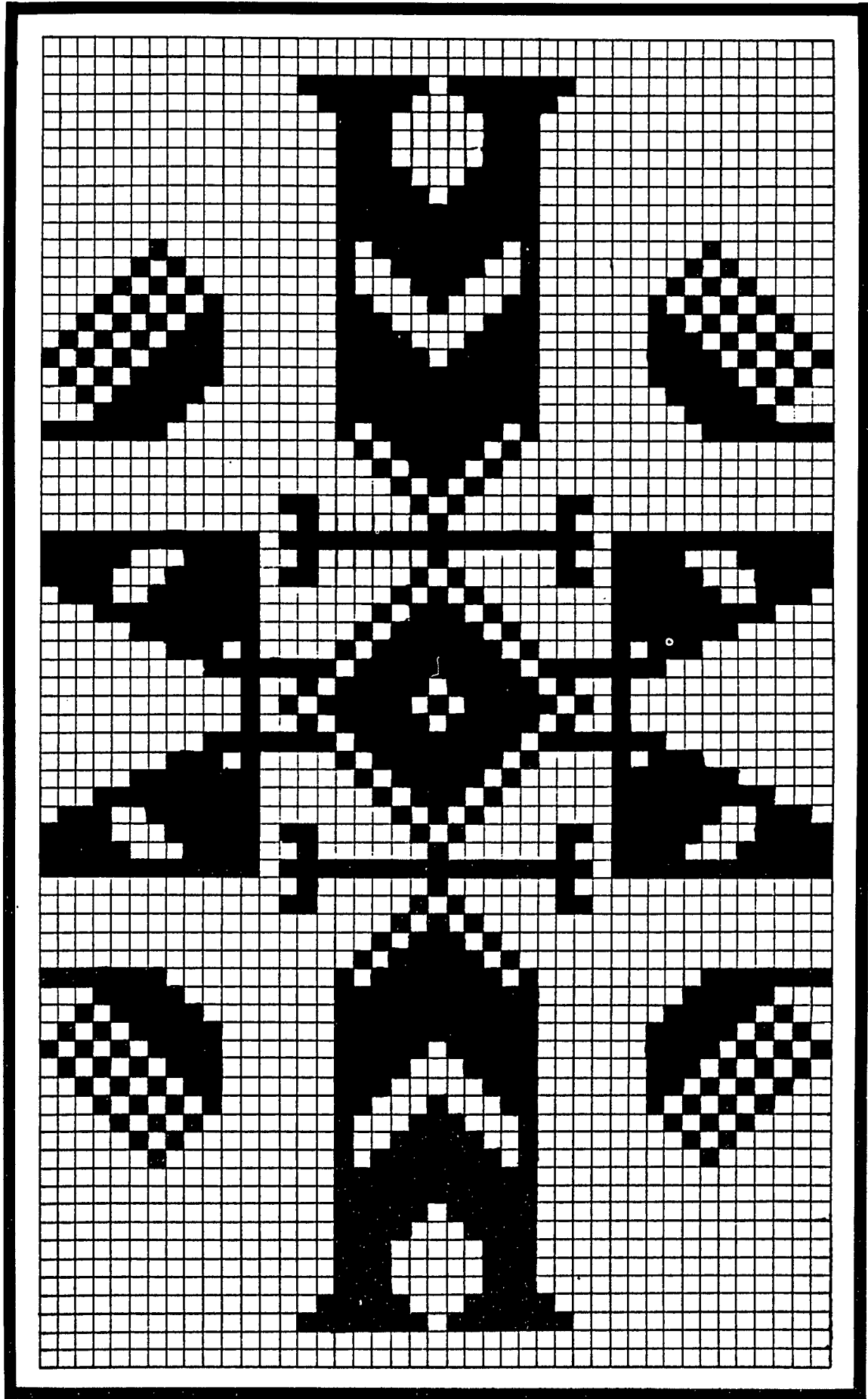

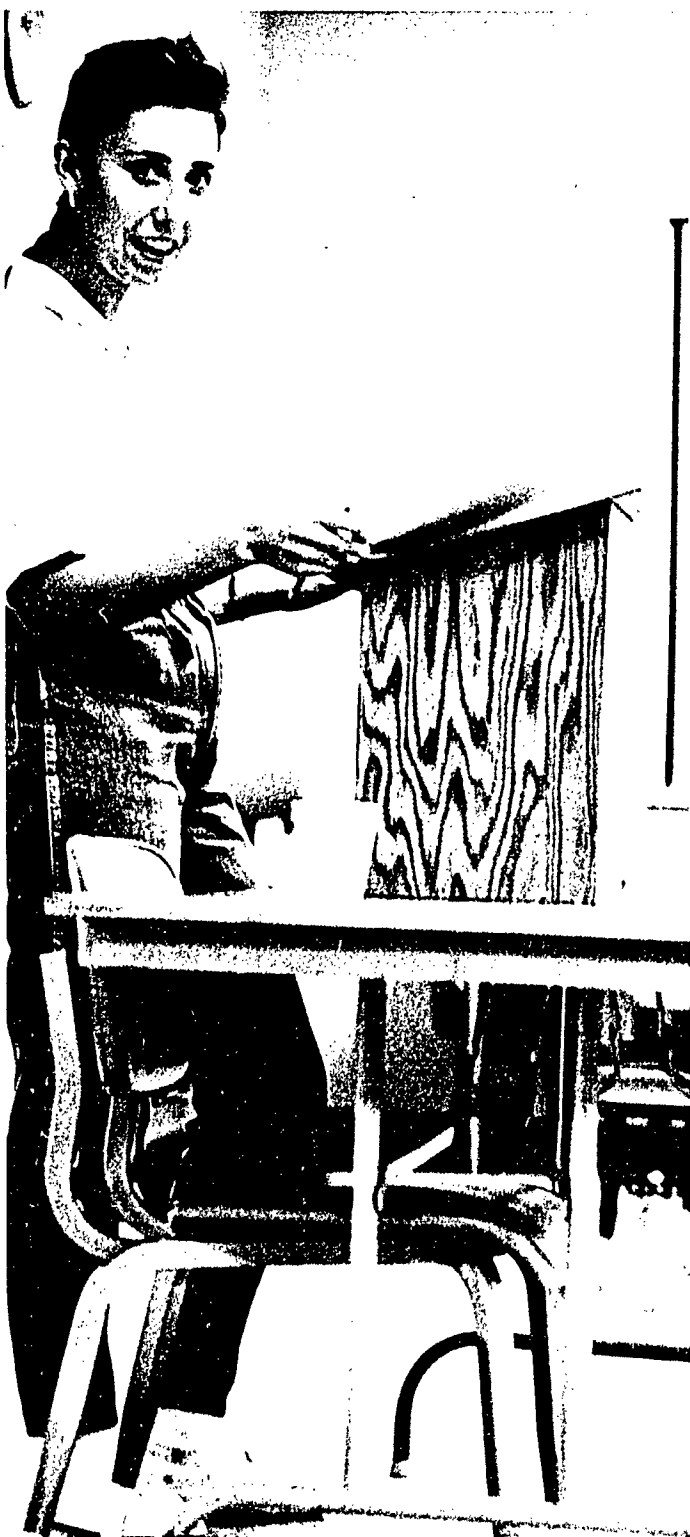

Haskell Philosophy and Objectives

Haskell was established in 1884 by the federal government to fulfill in part the treaty and trust obligations of the United States to educate American Indians. Today Haskell's missions as an intertribal college is to educate American Indians and Alaskan Natives for individual accomplishment and contributions to the continuity and strength of the tribes and Indian communities, to the vitality of American Indian culture, and to society in general.

The educational philosophy of Haskell is based on a traditional American Indian way of life which honors the unity of creation, teaches respect for the earth and for all living things, and seeks to maintain a balance of the intellectual, spiritual, emotional, and physical elements of life.

Haskell recognizes that because its students live in a multicultural society, they must have a historical and contemporary understanding of American Indian, Alaskan Native, Euro-American, and other cultures of the world.

Haskell believes that the economic, political, and social health of a community depends on the effective participation and leadership of individuals who have high self-esteem, have the knowledge to make decisions about how one can best contribute to the community, can understand the forces shaping society and the individual, can anticipate and adapt to or affect outcomes in a changing society, and can turn cultural stress to creative purpose.

Haskell is therefore committed to establishing a total campus environment that uses comparative cultural education to enable graduates to achieve and integrate the following skills and knowledge.

1. Lifelong inquiry: to gain, interpret, apply, and communicate knowledge regarding all facets of life with particular reference to one's chosen field of endeavor and avocation.
2. Critical and creative thinking: to formulate questions, to reason analytically, to evaluate, and to draw conclusions.
3. Intercultural perspectives: to provide academic and social experience that encourage students to compare worldviews.
4. Personal ethics: to assume responsibility for the choices one makes in relation to one's work, other individuals, social systems, and the environment.

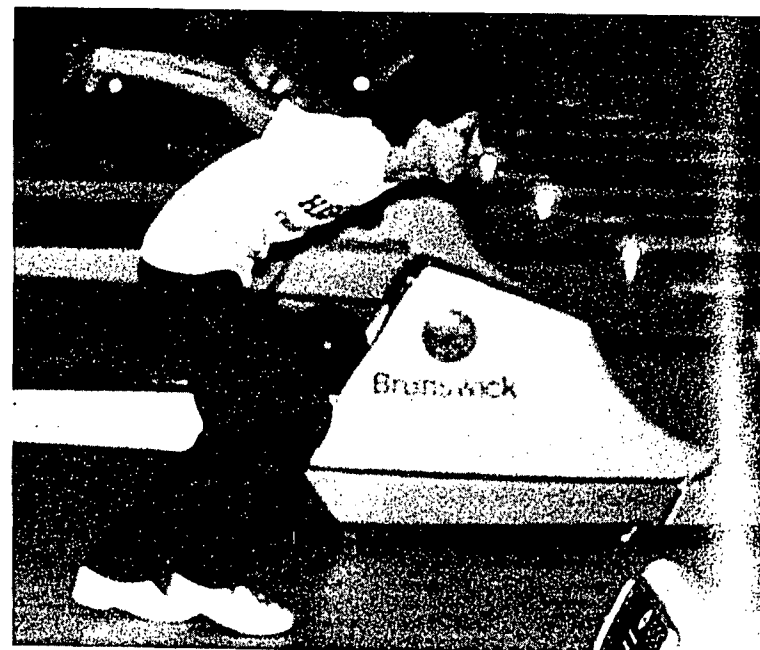

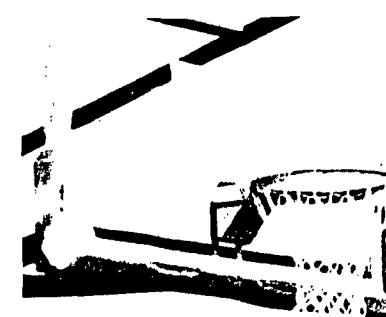

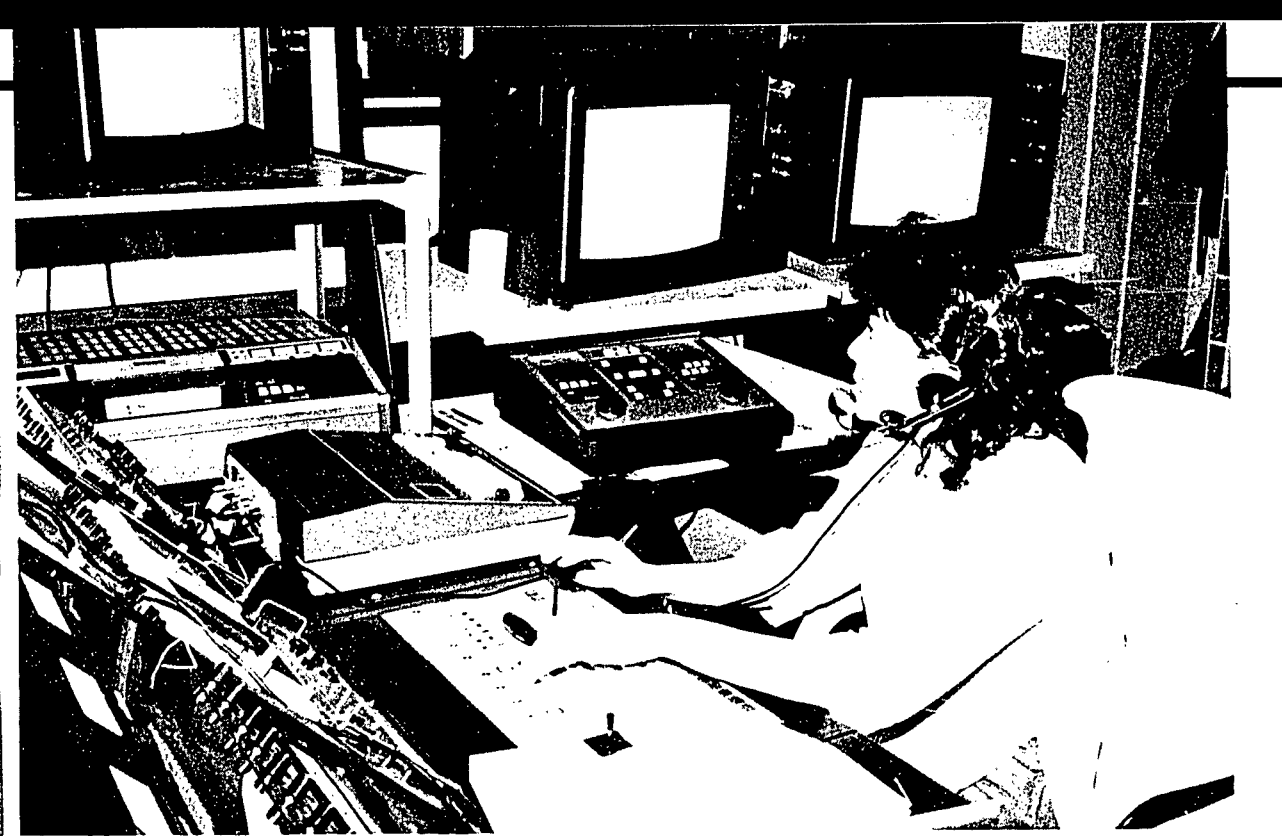

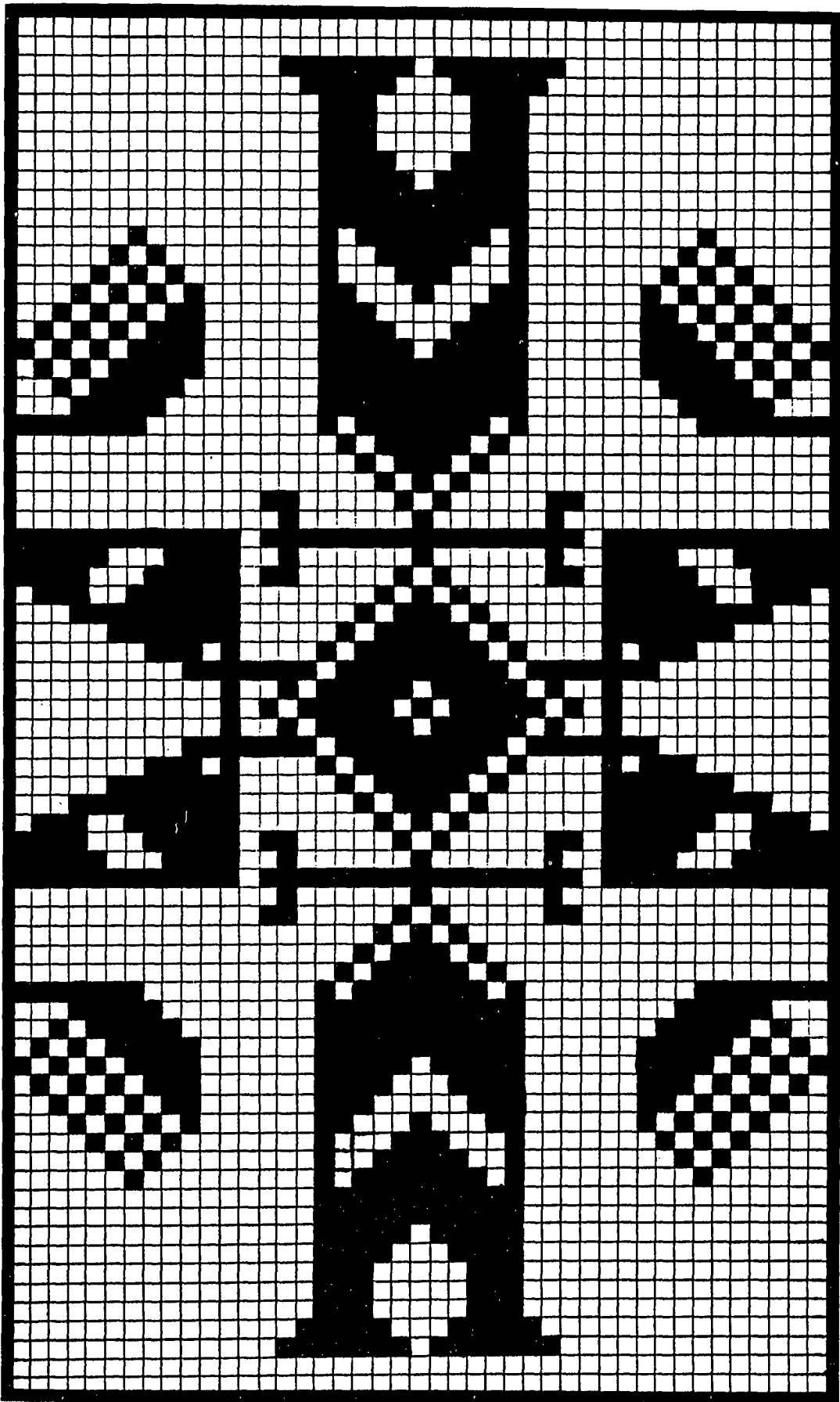

A special project of the Business Law class was a videotaped dialogue with Indian offenders at Lansing Prison. Class members taped questions about the judicial process, law in general, and the

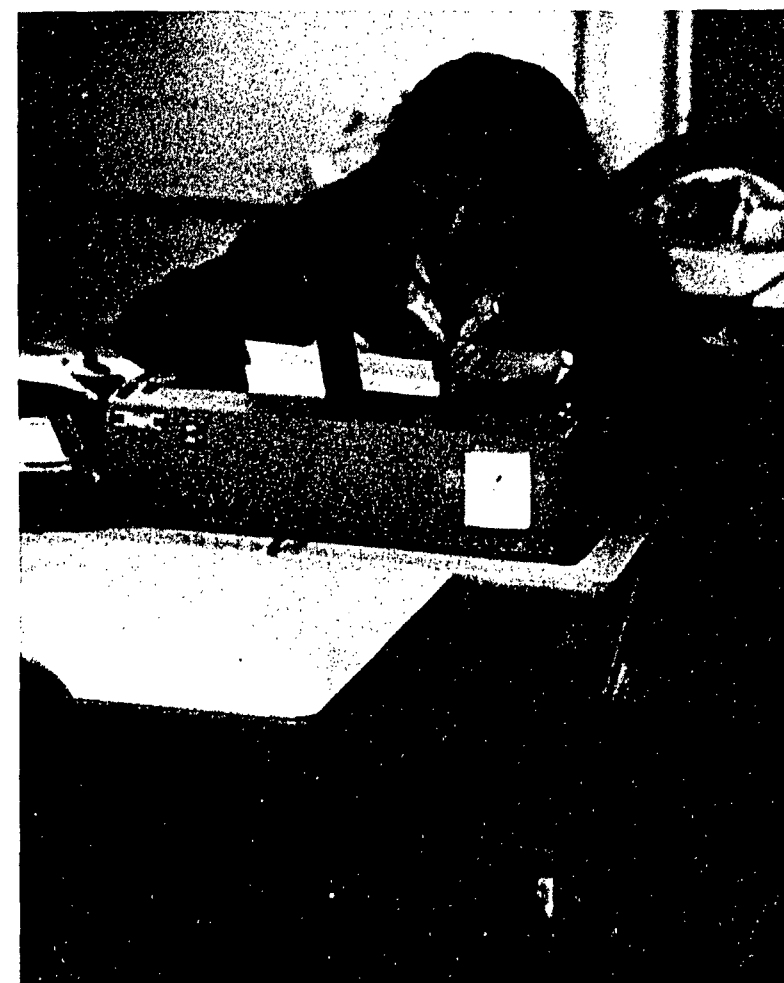

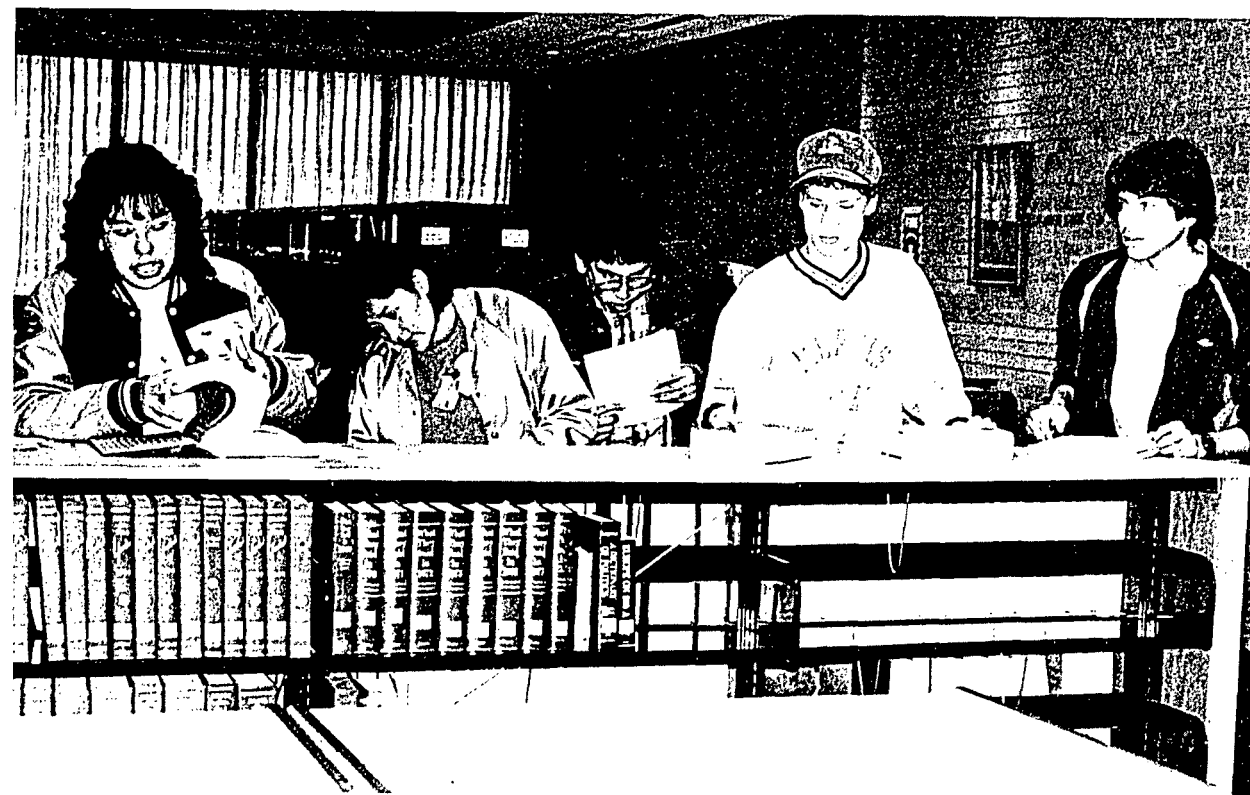

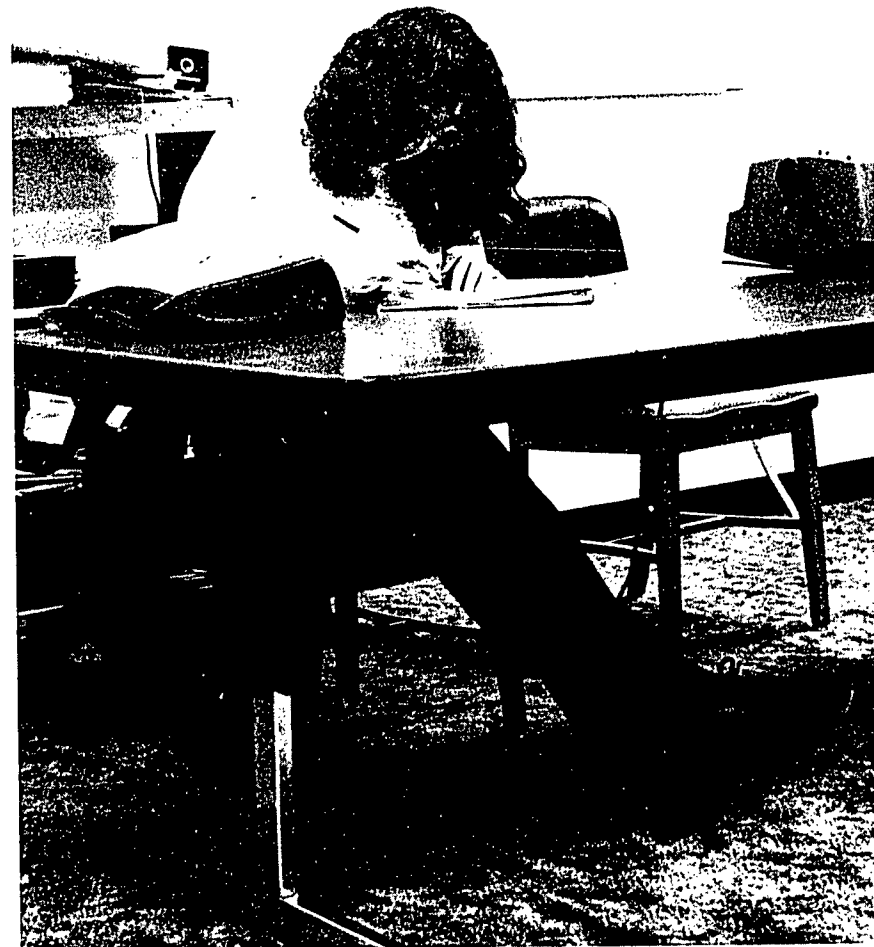
