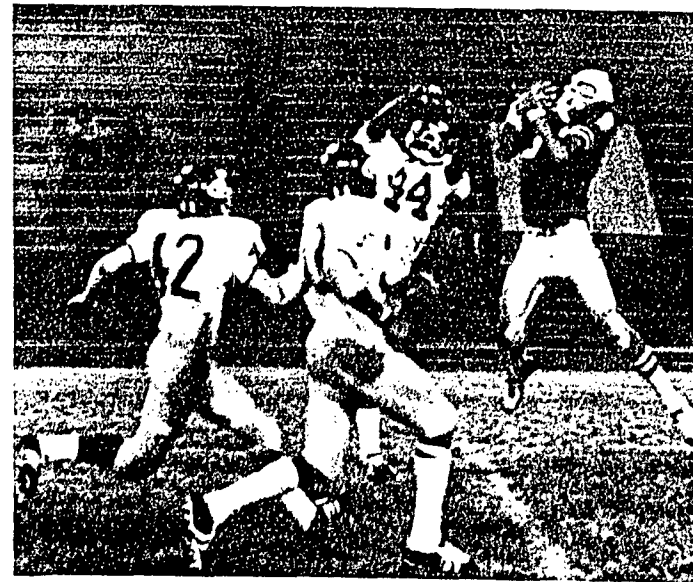


This year Haskell Indian Junior College, with an enrollment of approximately eleven hundred students, began with many expectations.

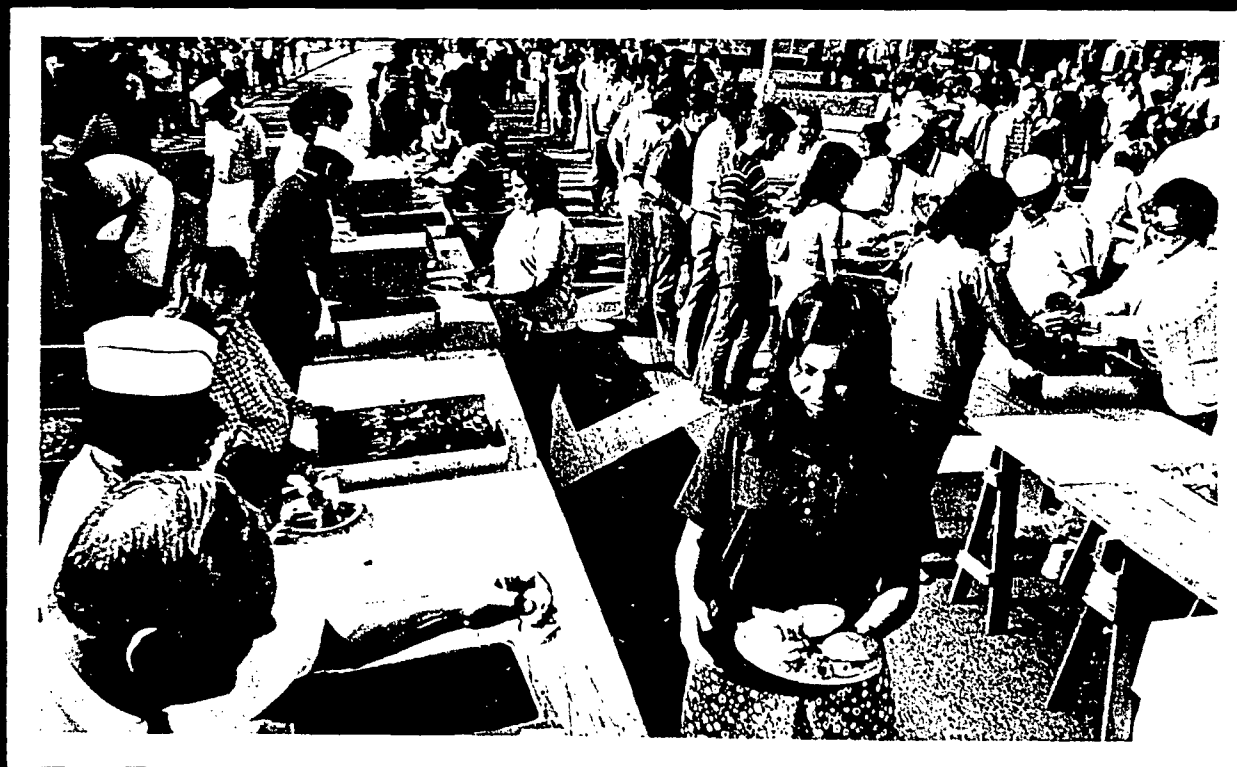

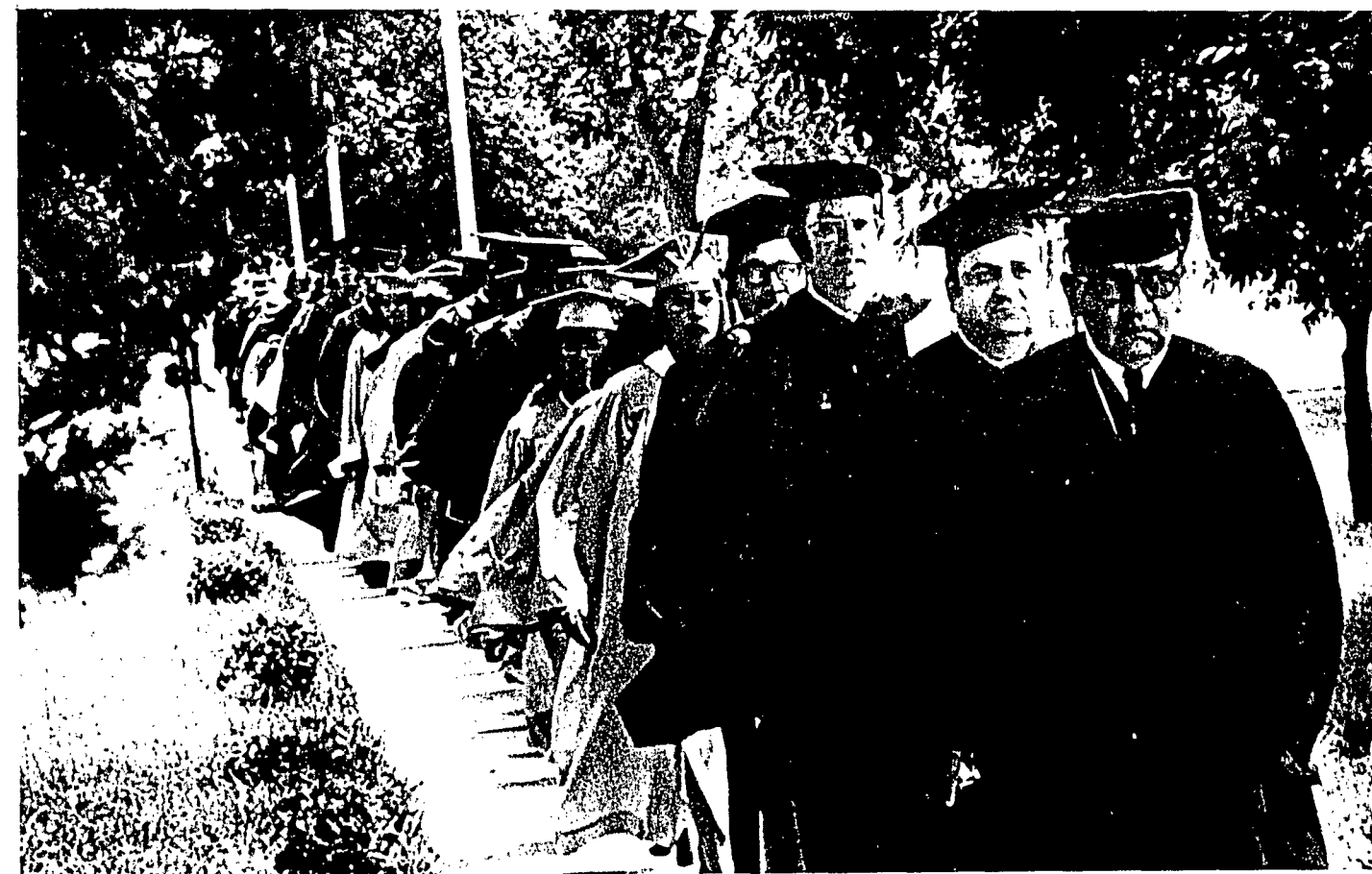

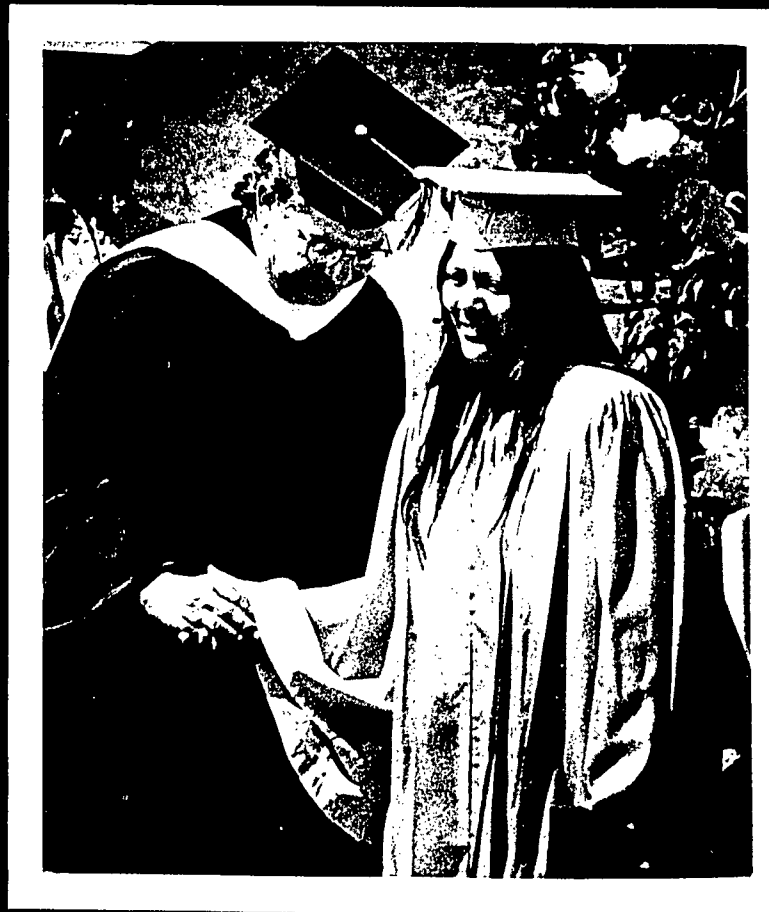

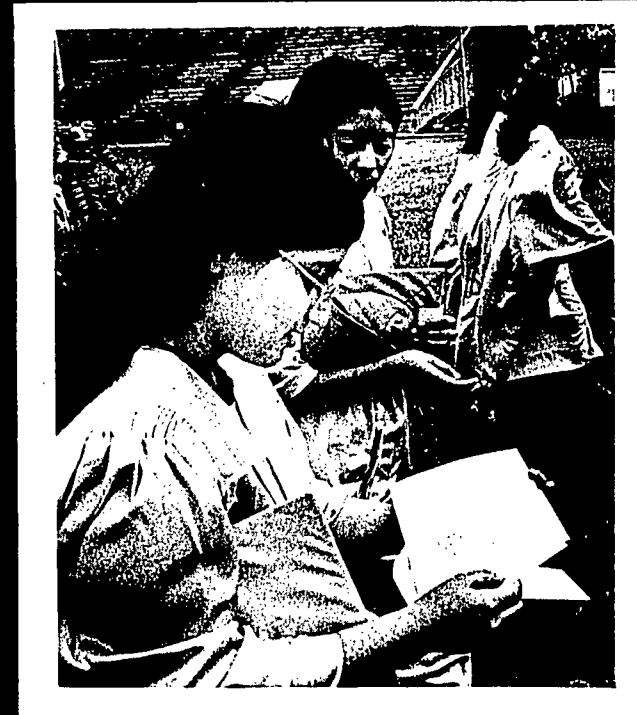

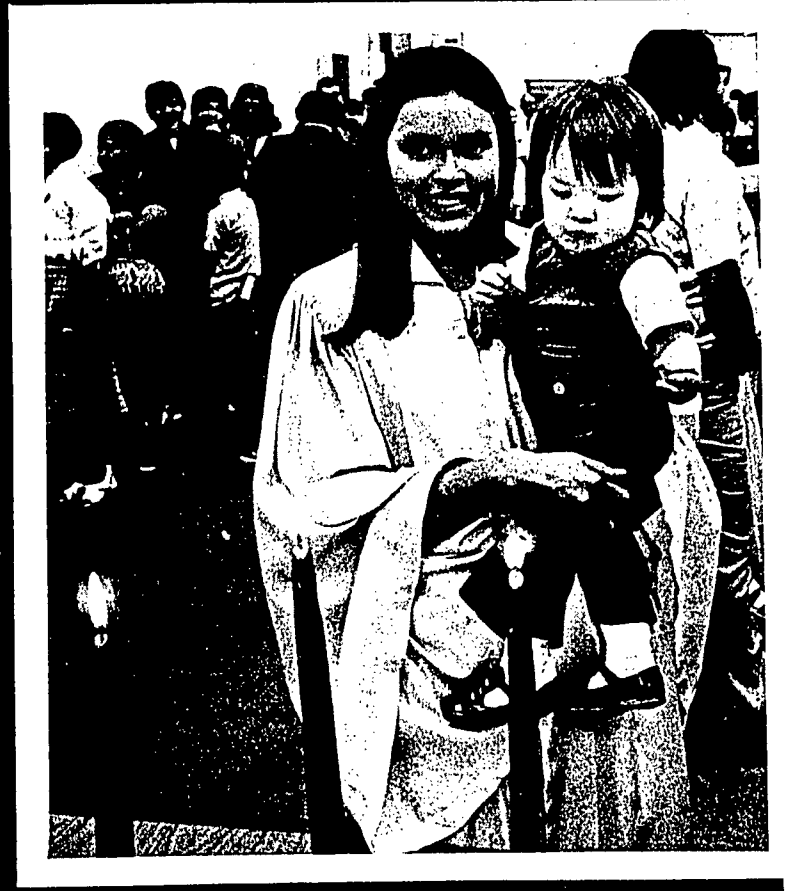

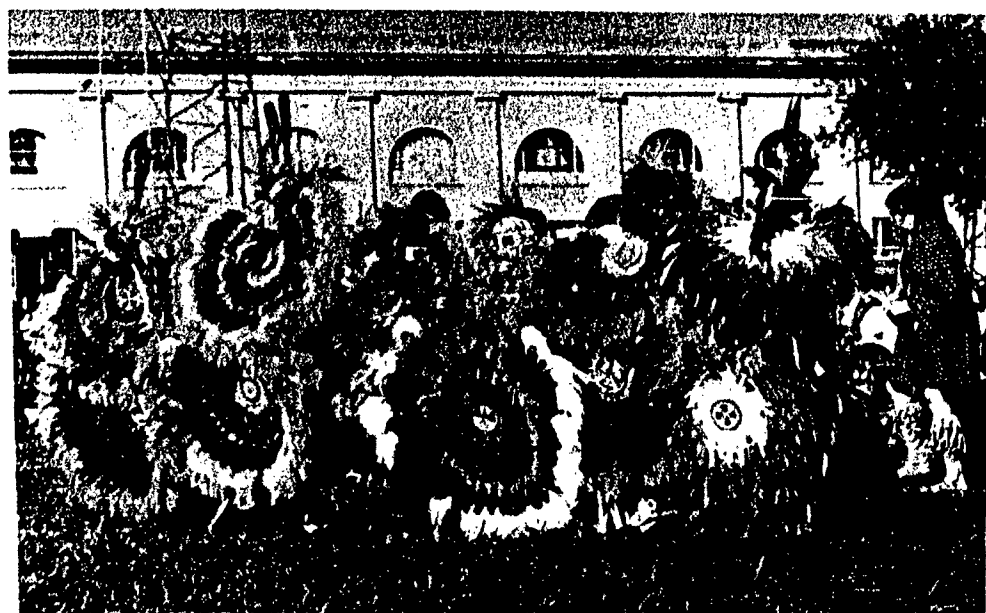

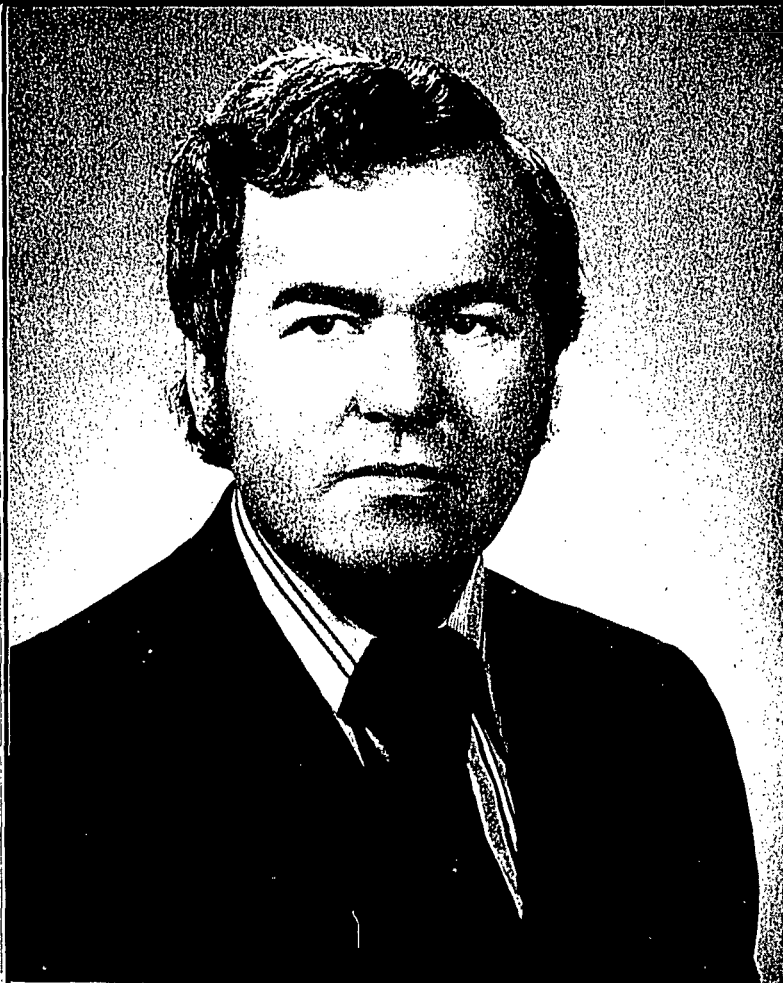

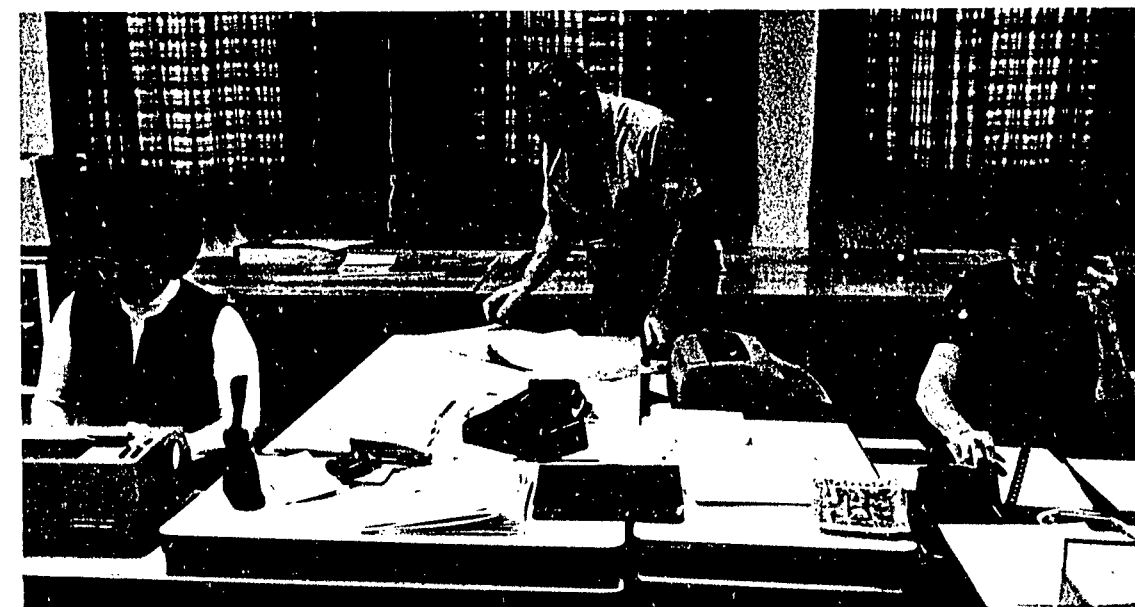

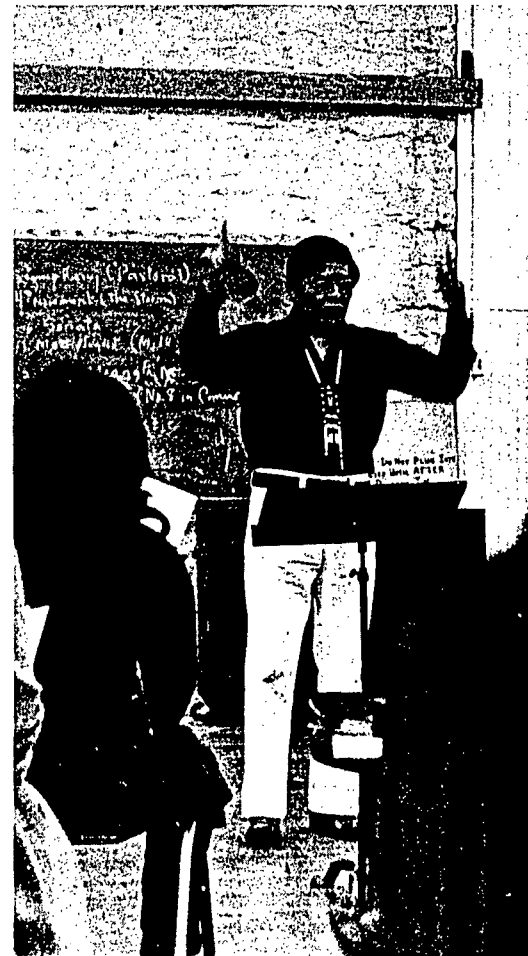

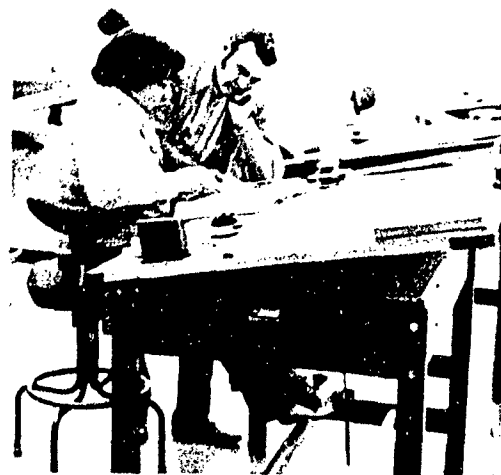


Carroll Parker is the head of Industrial Mechanical Technical Division.

Senate Tries

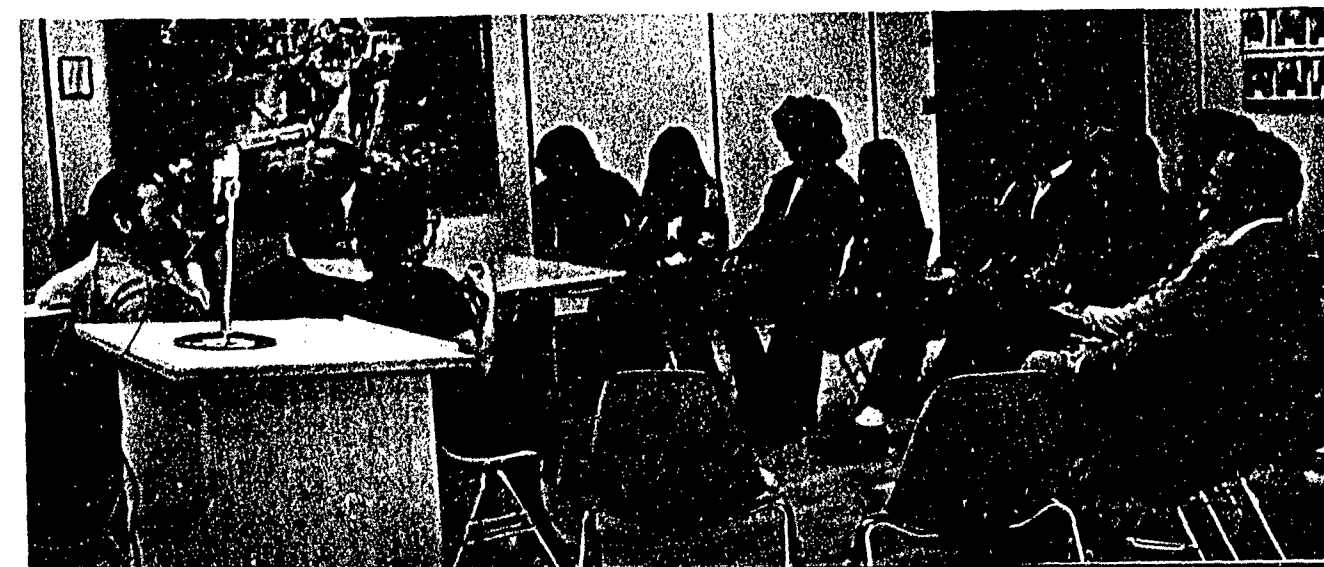

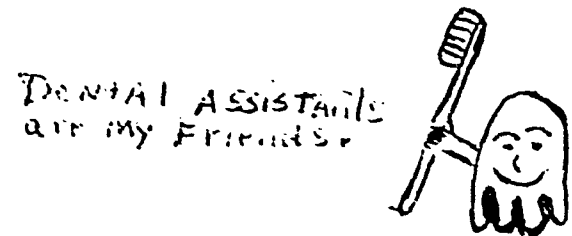

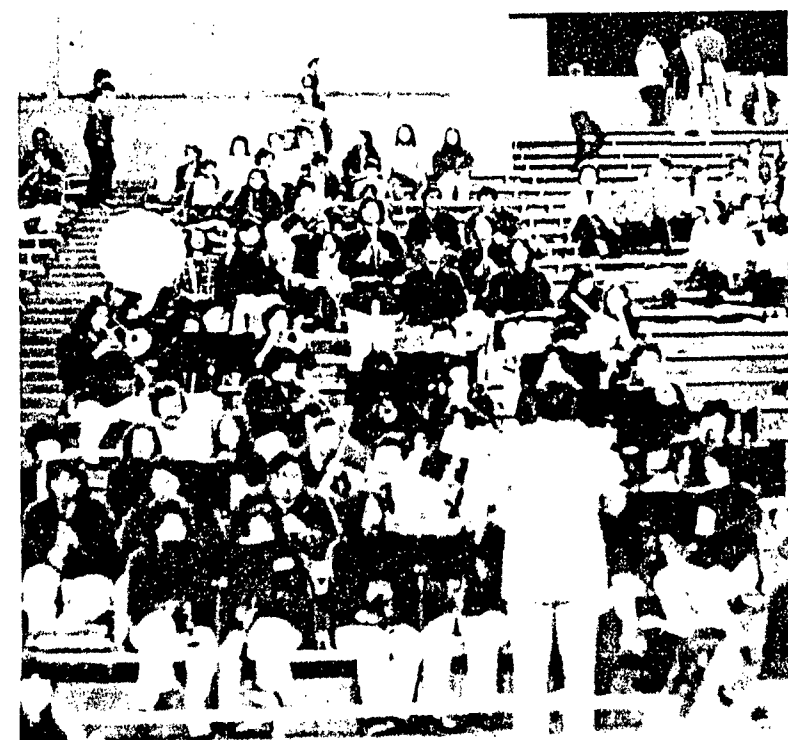

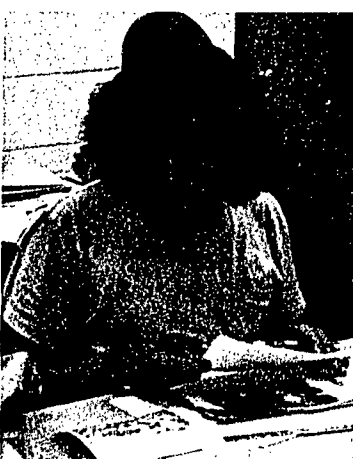

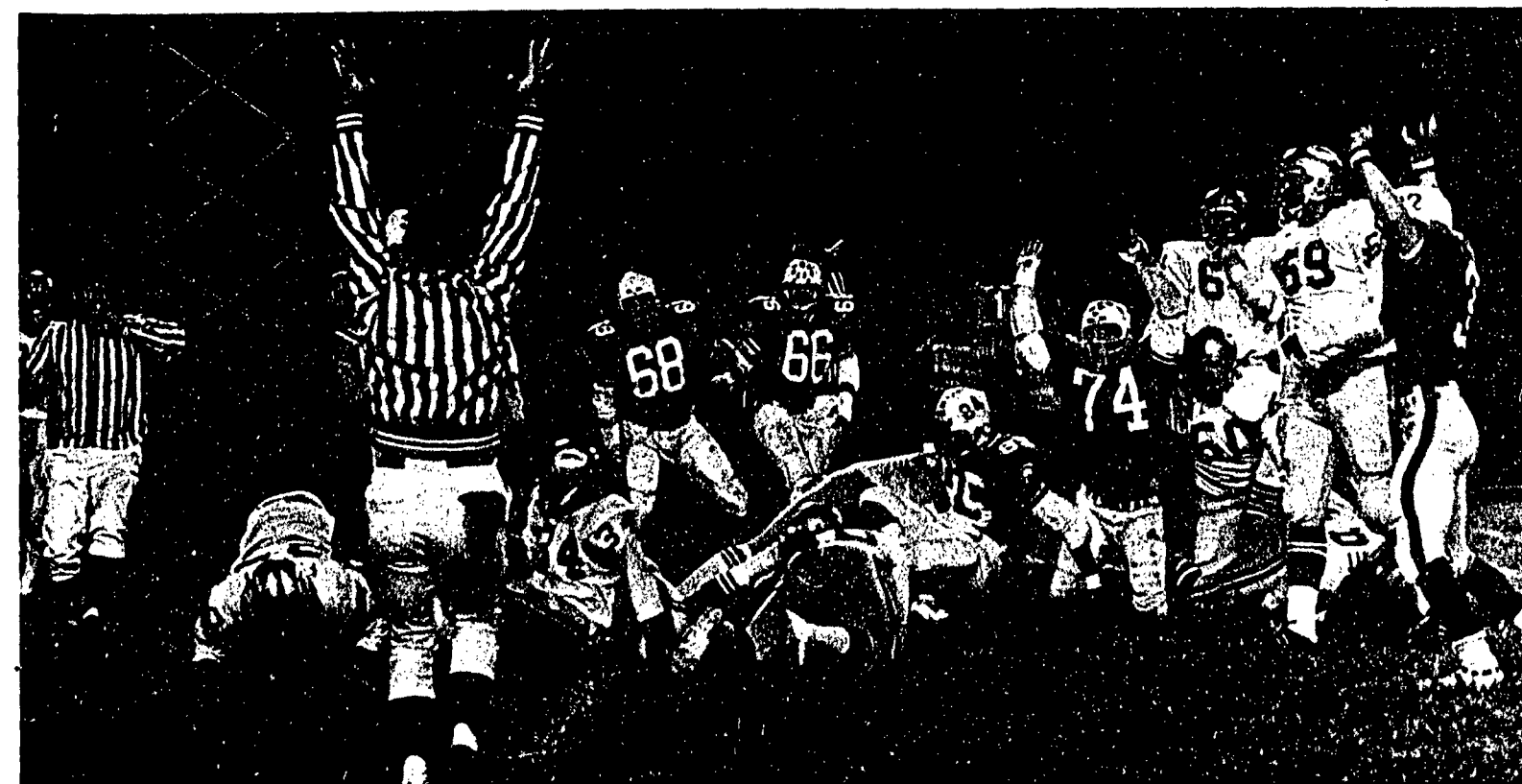

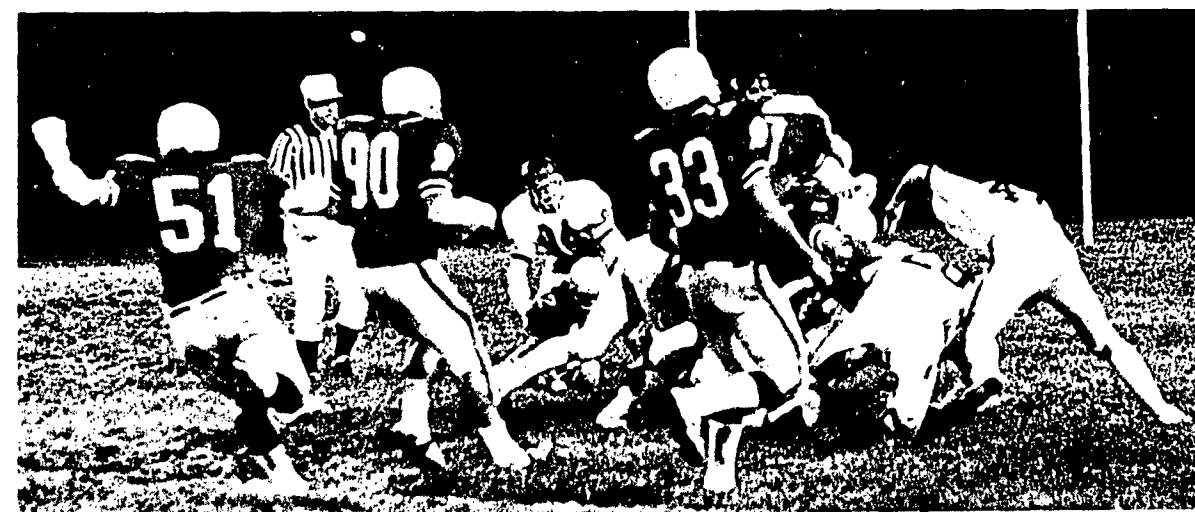

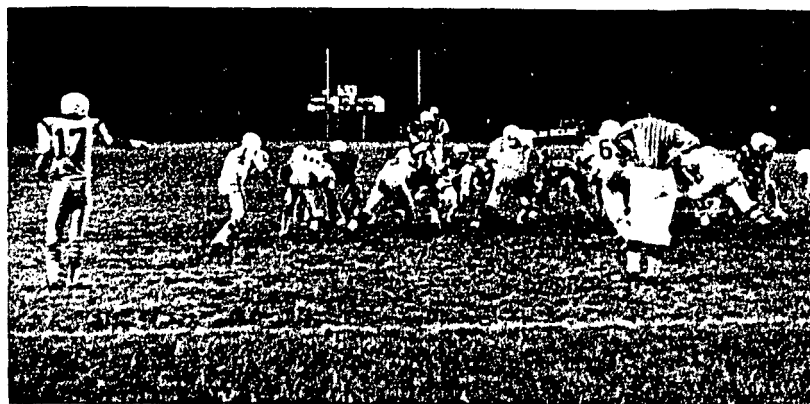

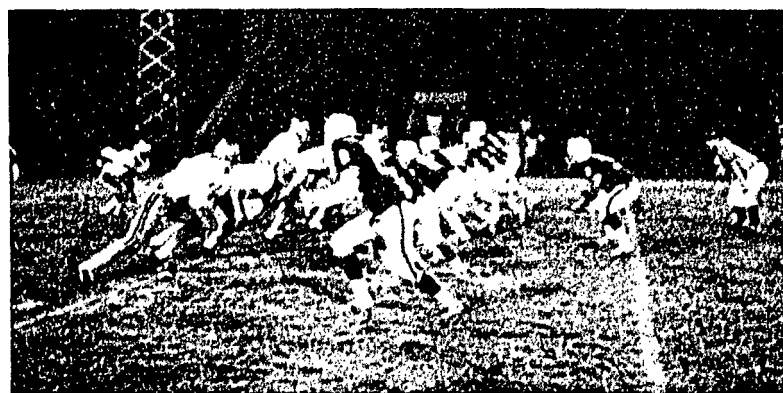

Haskell's Fightin Indian basketball team got off on the right foot when they beat Colby, Kan., in the opening round of the Johnson County Classic in Kansas City. The next two games proved to be disastrous for the Indians when they lost to Johnson County and Meramec of St. Louis, Mo. The next week the Indians traveled to Great Bend, Kan. for the Cougar Classic. Losing the first two games to Cloud County and Barton County, the Indians bounced back to beat Neosho in what proved to be the turning point for Haskell's cage team.

On Nov. 30, the Indians traveled to Concordia, Mo. and ran over St. Paul's. Dec. 4 was the date for Haskell's home opener with Hesston and the Indians' third straight victory. The Kemper Tourney was next on the schedule for the Indians where they won two games and the championship. Allen County and Nebraska Southern were the next Indian victims before the semester break.

Jan. 12 was the day and the place was in Allen Fieldhouse. The Fightin' Indians fought from a 14 point first half deficit to shock the Kansas University JV's 57-55. This victory has to

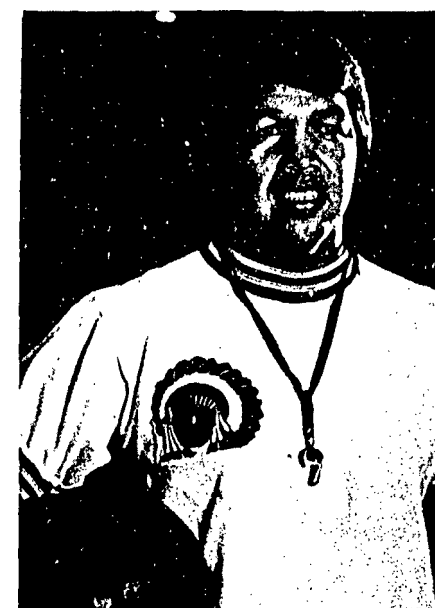
be the most satisfying for the Indian team. Playing under Big 8 rules, 30-second clock and three referees, the shorter Haskell team outran and outjumped a team that will undoubtedly be in the national limelight next year.

With Ken Pemberton, 6'6" center, leading the way, Haskell continued their record-breaking winning streak by beating Penn Valley, twice, Allen County, Kemper Military, twice, McPherson Central, twice, Hesston, Wentworth Military, twice, Nebraska Southern, Longview and St. Pauls.

In the last regular season game, the Indians traveled to Longview to try for their 22nd straight victory. It was not to be and the Indians were stopped with 21 straight wins. Haskell's team then had a two-week layoff to prepare for the Sub-regional Tournament to be held in Concordia, Kansas. Cloud County ended Haskell's basketball season when dropped the Indians for the second time. This year's basketball team will be remembered as one of the greatest Haskell has ever had.

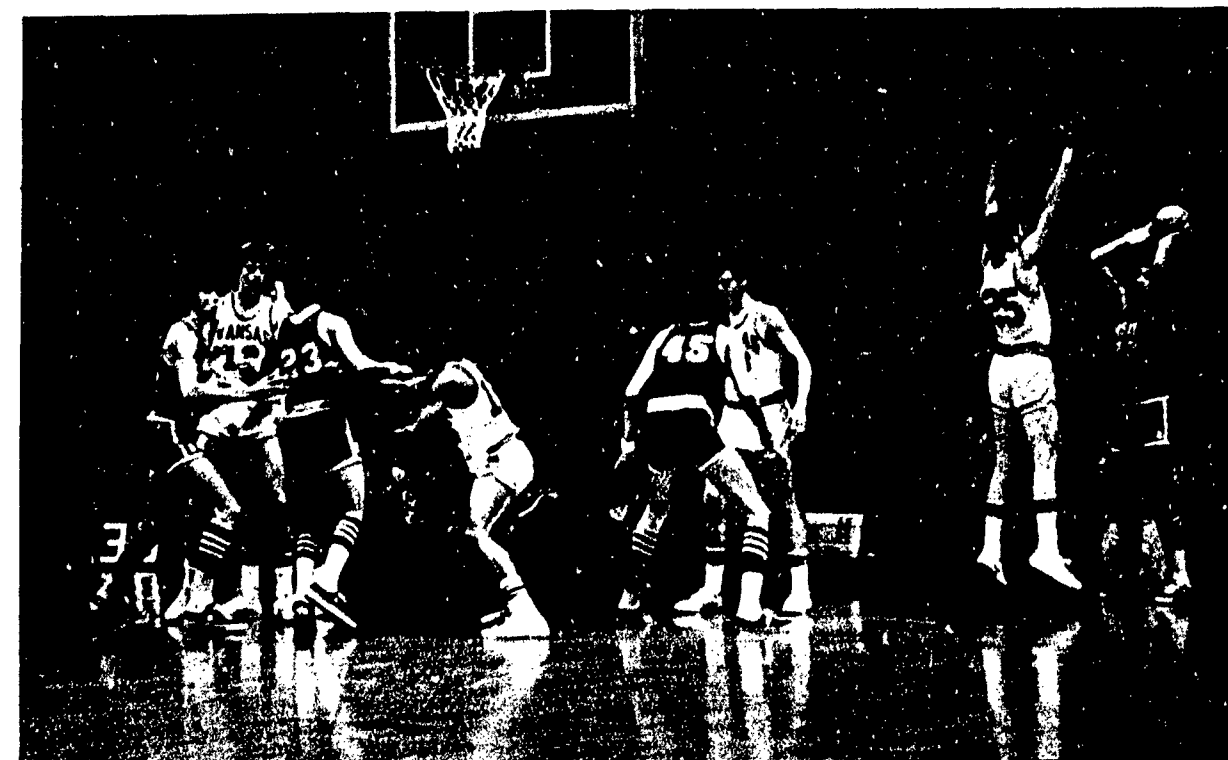

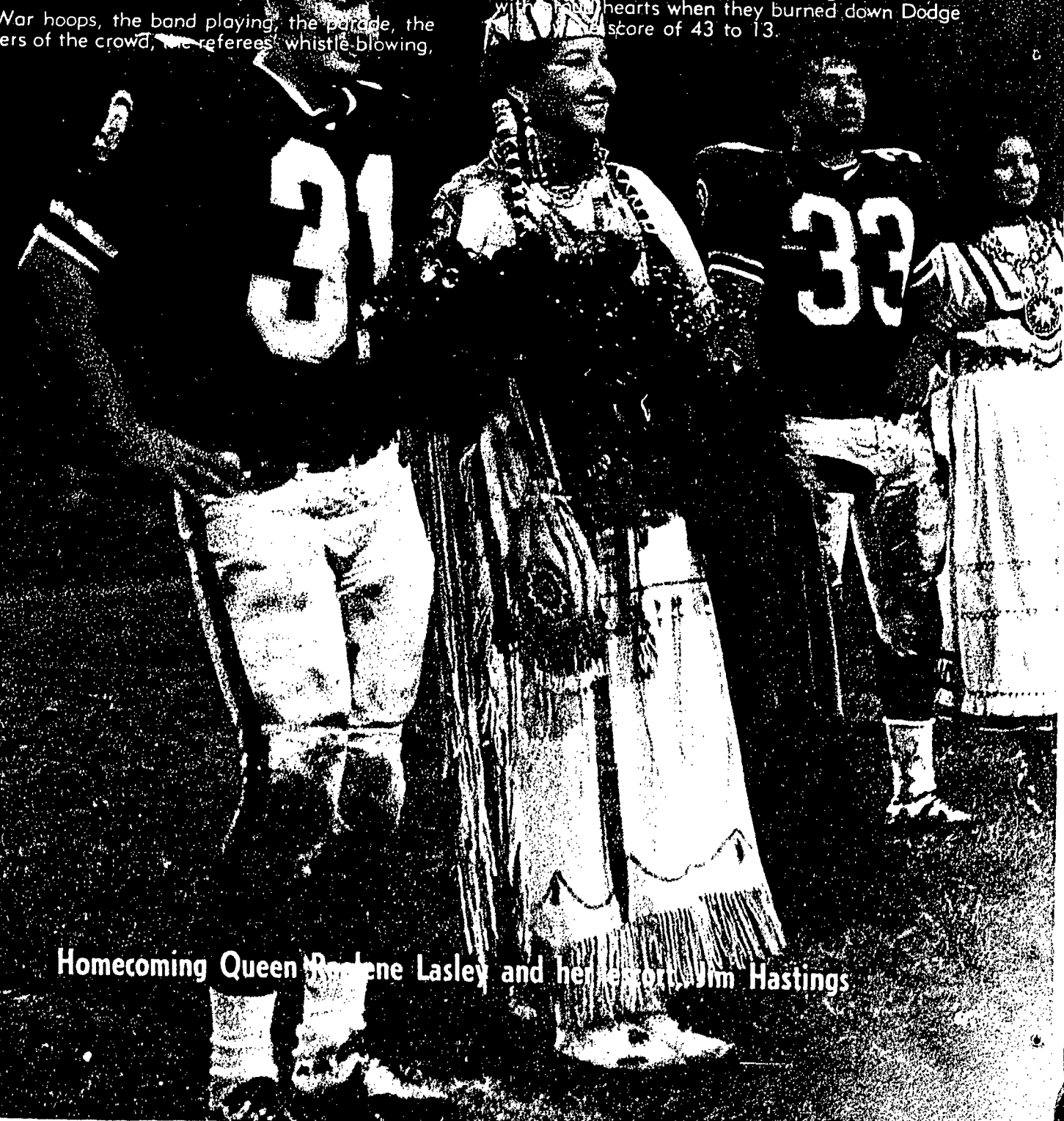
Homecoming, 1973

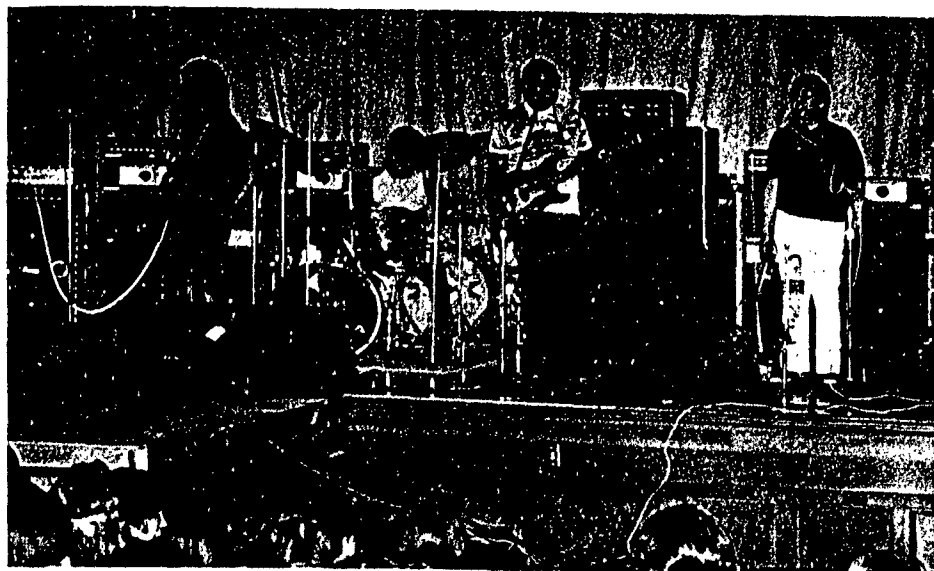

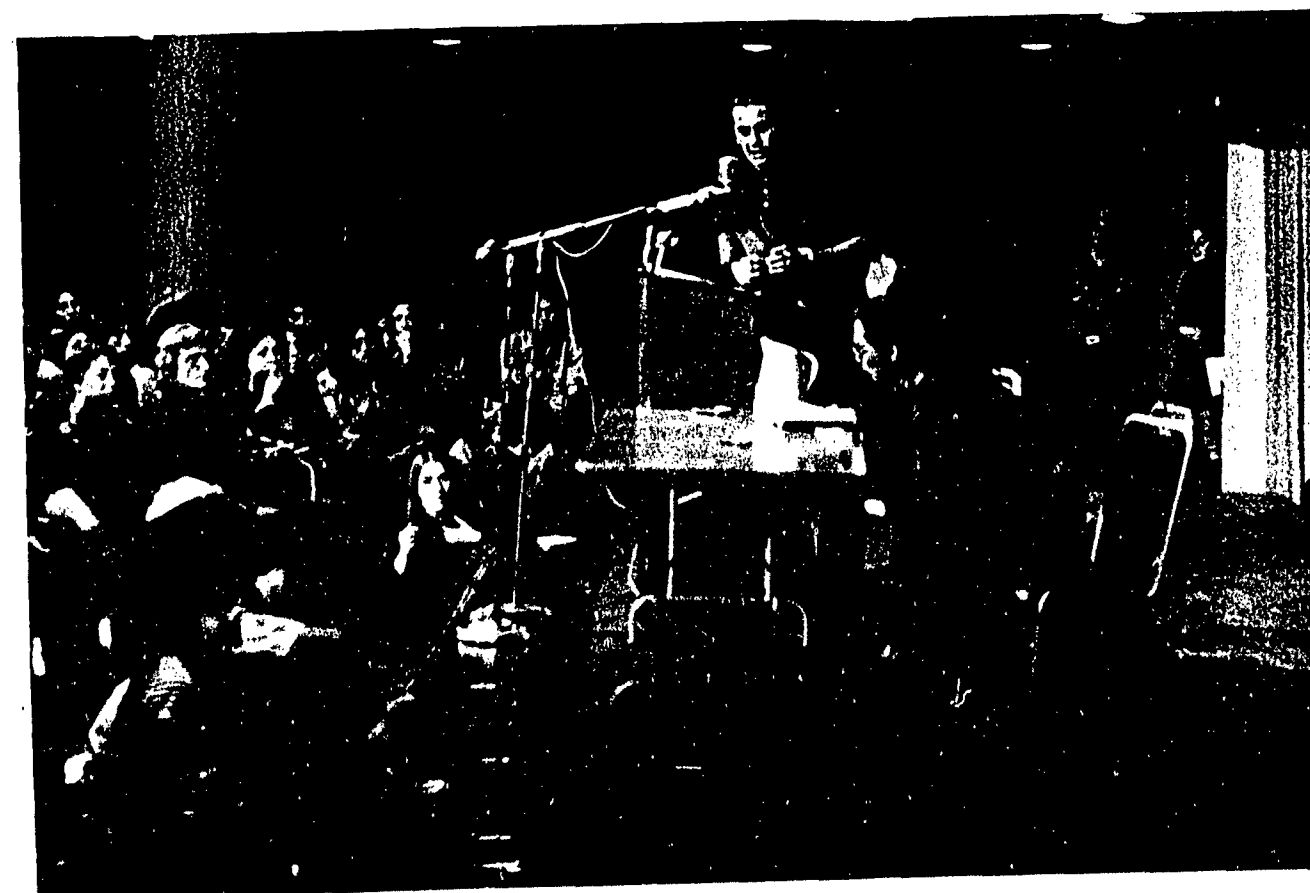
