CENTENNIAL HISTORY

Haskell opened as the INDIAN TRAINING SCHOOL at Lawrence, Kansas, on September 1, 1884, with an enrollment of fourteen pupils, all boys. By January, 1885, 280 students were enrolled. Three buildings comprised the initial group: the women's and girl's dormitory (later known as Keokuk), the men's and boys' dormitory (later known as Osceola), and the school building (later known as Sequoyah).

Haskell Indian Junior College is an educational institution for American Indians built to fulfill partially the treaty obligations of the United States government. Haskell started as a specialized vocational school with a major emphasis on agriculture. In the 1900s, Haskell became involved in teacher training and business education. In 1927, it became a secondary school; by 1935, a post-high school vocational program was established. In 1962, Haskell began to phase out the secondary program as it evolved into a post-high school vocational-technical institution. The last high school class was graduated in 1965. Haskell received Kansas State junior college accreditation in 1970 and was granted North Central Association junior college accreditation in 1979.

In 1890 the name "Haskell" was officially chosen for the school by the secretary of the Interior in honor of Dudley C. Haskell, representative of the Second Congressional District of Kansas, who had suggested the location of the school in Lawrence.

On May 24, 1962, at the dedication program of Sequoyah, Osceola-Keokuk, and Winona, Merrill J. Mattes, regional historian of the National Park Service, presented Haskell with the Registered National Landmark plaque, which is now located in the hallway of Stidham Union.

Today, Haskell Indian Junior College consists of more than fifty buildings situated on a 320-acre campus. It is a contrast of styles, from Hiawatha, built in 1898, to the Haskell Stadium and Memorial Arch of the 1920s, to the Stidham Union built by Haskell students in the 1960s, to such modern structures as Blalock Hall, Curtis Hall, Tommaney Hall, and the Tony Coffin Sports Complex.

The bandstand, a landmark of Haskell, was constructed in 1908. The bandstand was used frequently for concerts in the early days of the school. The National Historical Society has requested that the bandstand be a permanent structure on the campus.



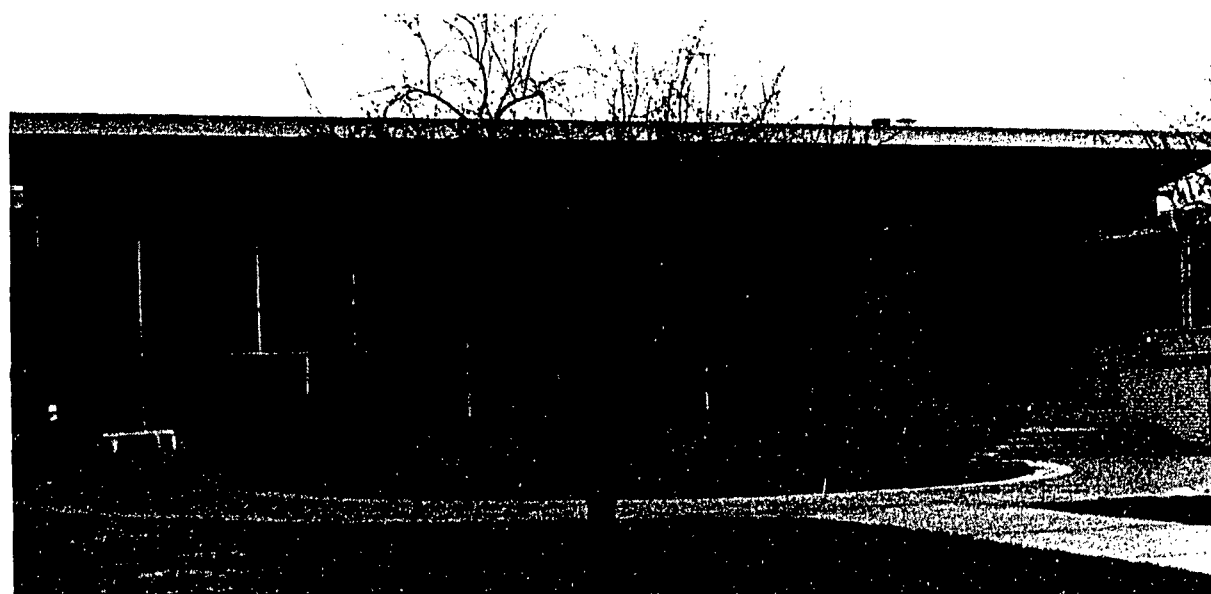
Blue Eagle Hall was constructed in 1957. As part of the 75th anniversary of the school it was dedicated in honor of Acee Blue Eagle whose paintings were presented to the school. It houses the present business classes.



The Shack was the students' entertainment place, the fore-runner of a present-day student union. It was built in 1926. The employees' dining room was in one half, and the students' social center and snack bar occupied the south half. It was razed in 1965.



Stidham Union was built and dedicated in 1965. The work on the footings, glass, hot tar for the roof, and the ceiling beams were contracted out; Haskell students did all of the other work. It was named for Tom Stidham, a Creek Indian from Oklahoma.



The maintenance building, later used as the carpentry shop, was erected in 1891. The original use of the building was to house all maintenance equipment, then a heating plant. It was razed in 1965.

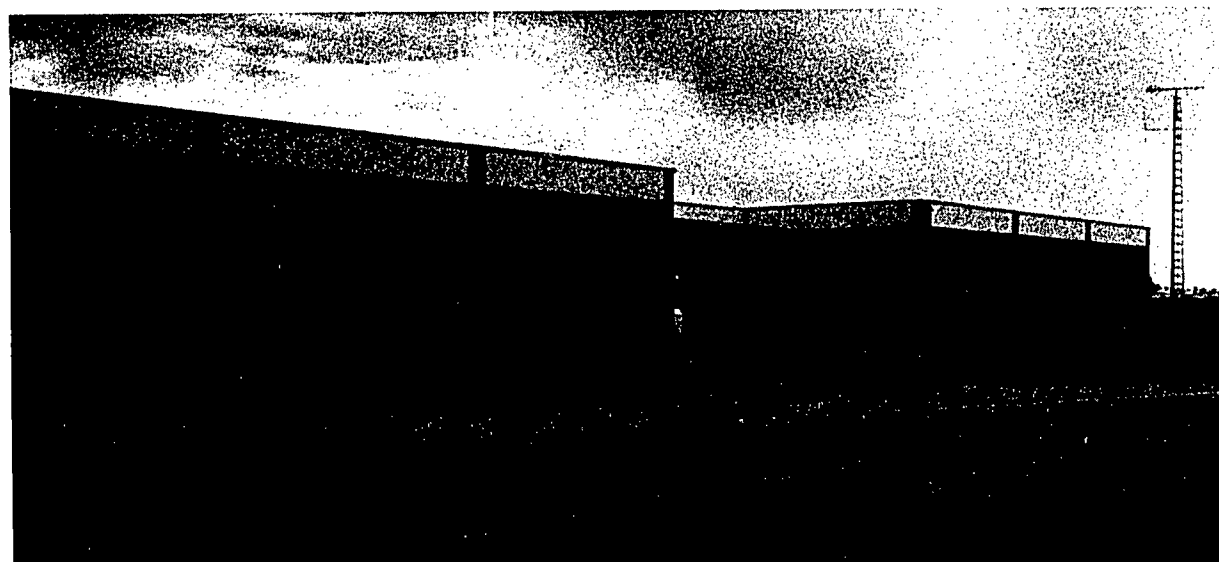


Pushmataha, the administration building, was built in 1920 and has been internally rebuilt several times. Pushmataha, a Choctaw, was born in 1765; his name means "the eagle." He was one of the main leaders in persuading the Choctaw Nation to join the United States. The picture below is the building as it stands today.



Parker was constructed in 1966 for vocational shops. The building was named after Eli Samuel Parker, who was the first Indian named by President Grant as commissioner of Indian Affairs in April, 1869.

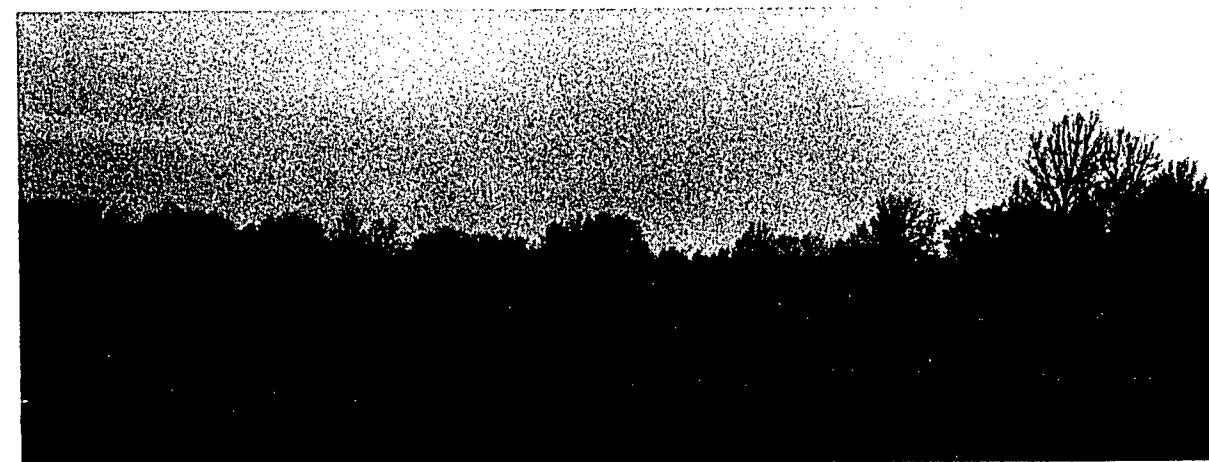
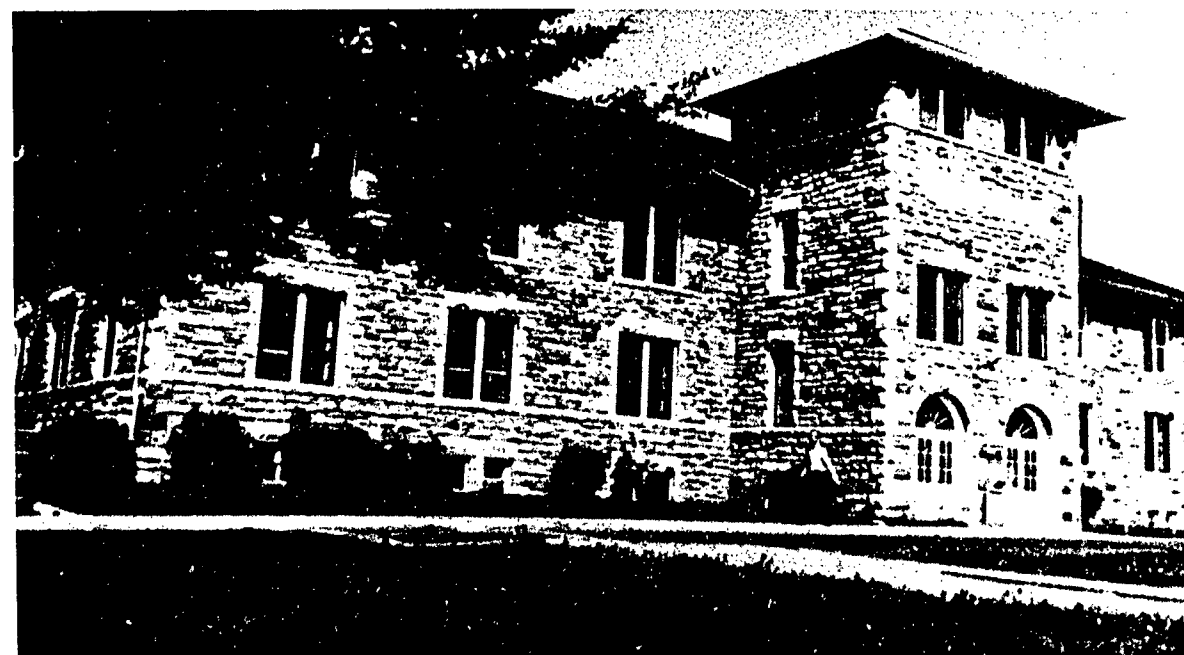




Ross Hall was constructed in 1972. Named after John Ross, one of the chiefs of the Cherokee Nation, it houses the electro-mechanical technology programs, the computer center, and English classrooms.



The first Curtis Hall, below, was constructed in 1902. It was the kitchen, bakery, and dining hall for students. The students' dining room was on the first floor; and the domestic science department was on the second floor. It was named for Charles Curtis who served in Congress and as vice-president in the Hoover administration. The new Curtis Hall was completed in 1977.



Tahoma, left, was built in 1905 as a hospital for the school. It had a 42-bed capacity. Renovations were numerous throughout the years, and in 1954 the building, its contents, and nine-tenths of an acre were given to Indian Public Health. The new Tahoma was completed in 1979 and is located on the west side of the campus. Tahoma is an Indian name for Mt. Rainier.



The original building, Sequoyah, below, one of the first three buildings on the campus, was built in 1884 as the school Building or Academic Building. The present Sequoyah was built in 1961. It has 12 classrooms, offices, and a learning skills center. Sequoyah, who conceived and perfected a syllabary of the Cherokee language, was born the son of a Cherokee mother and white father in Tuskagee, Tennessee, between 1760 and 1775.





The girls' first dormitory was located north of the current Curtis Hall. Built in 1899, it could house 300 girls. By Sioux tradition, Winona is the name given to the daughter if she is the "first born" child of the family.



The building below, a dairy barn, was converted into a warehouse in 1929 and is still used as a warehouse and maintenance facility (above). It was built in 1907.

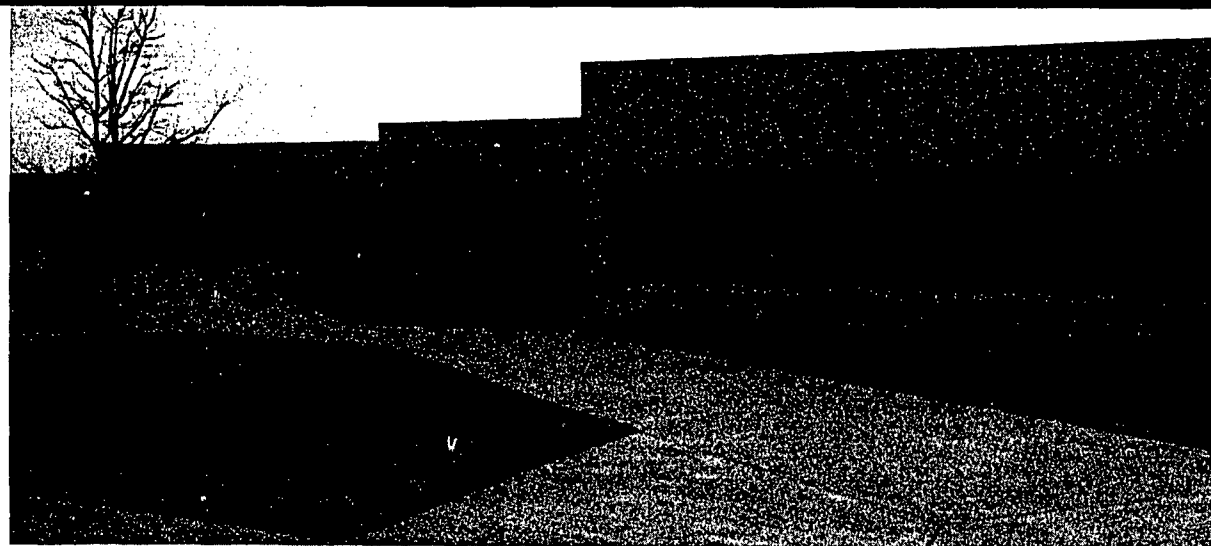


Osceola, one of the original three buildings at Haskell, was built in 1884 as the boys' and men teachers' dormitory. Later it became known as "the little boys' building," later as a dormitory for male students. The current Osceola-Keokuk was constructed in 1962 to house 400 men students. Osceola, whose name means "Rising Sun," was born about 1804 in a village near the Tallapoosa River in Alabama.

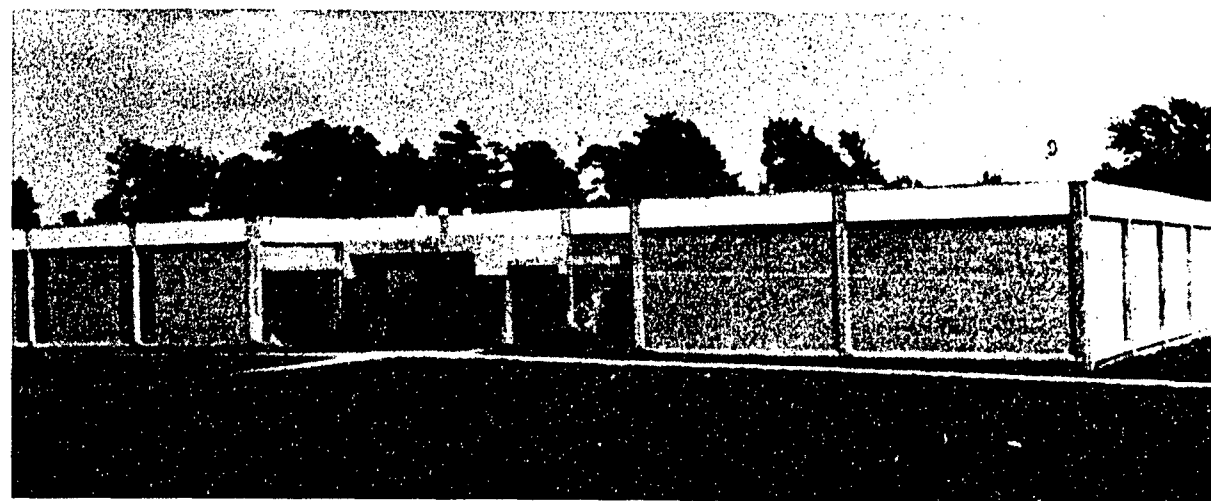


The building at left housed teachers' quarters and was in use until it was razed in 1961. It was constructed in 1886 first as a hospital. The boys and men of the vocational trades department built the building. A new hospital was constructed in 1905 and this building became the employees' quarters.

This building, finished in 1977, is known as the learning resource center and carries the name of Tommaney Hall. It has a large number of books and a special Indian collection. In addition it carries a modern television studio and full photographic facilities.



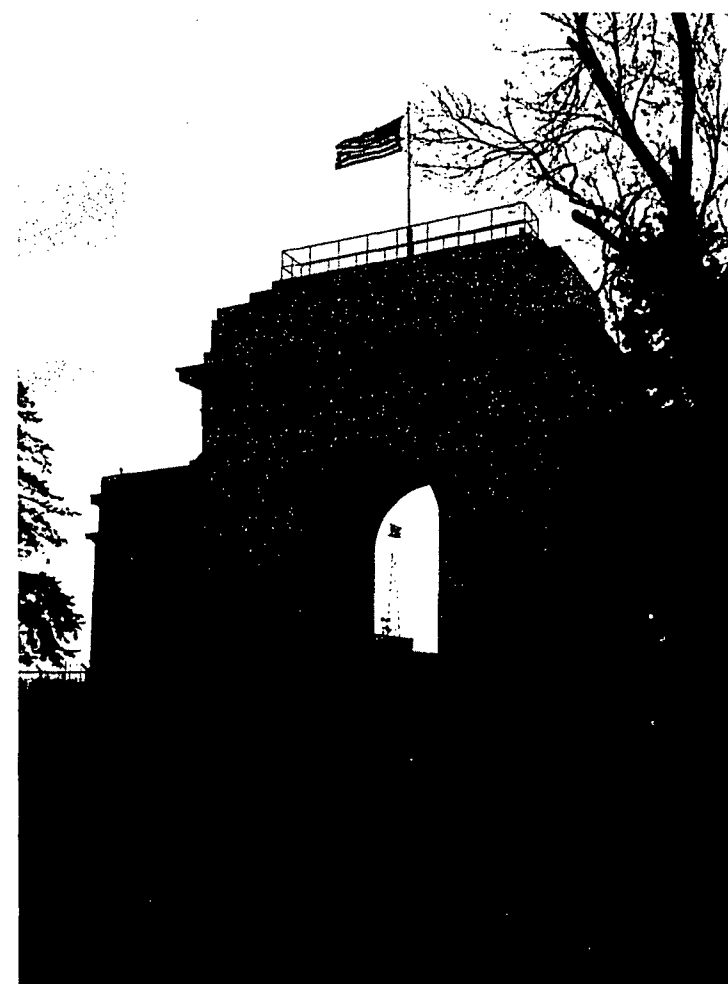
Winnemucca Complex was built in 1970. It houses the automotive, body and fender, and welding shops. The complex was named after Winnemucca, a Plaute.



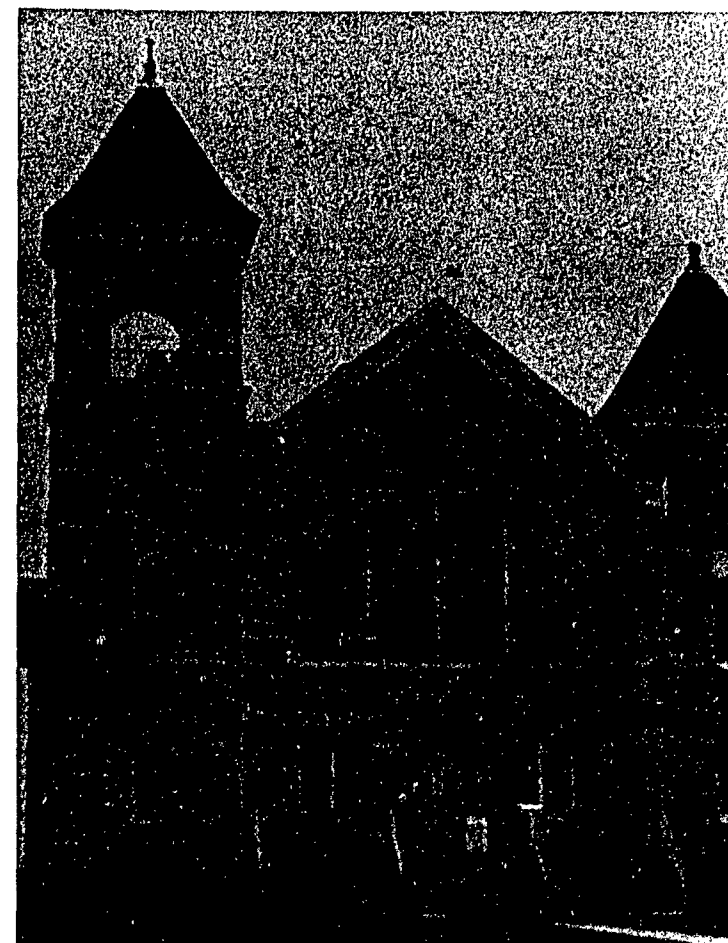
The red brick building (right) known as "the print shop" was constructed in 1908. Navarre Hall was named after Peter Navarre, the first graduate from the Haskell Institute printing department in 1901. A new graphic arts complex was built in 1972. The first building was used for many classes such as the auto shop, mechanical drawing, and was razed in 1972.



The Haskell Stadium was dedicated October 27-30, 1926. The three-day dedication program consisted of the presentation of the drama "Hiawatha" by Haskell students, a buffalo barbecue, the dedication program, and the Haskell-Bucknell football game, which Haskell won 36-0.

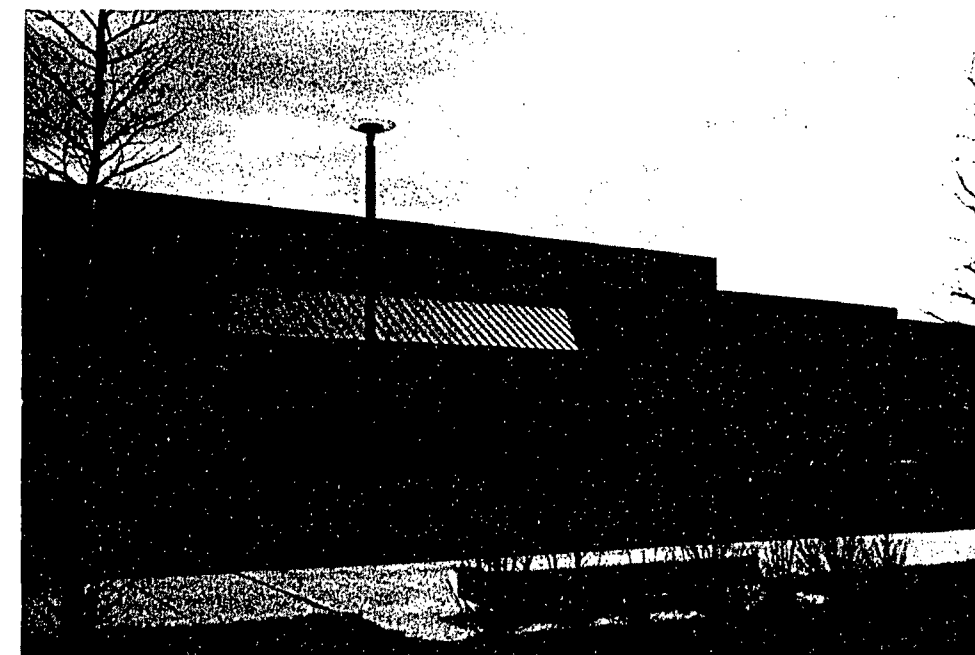


Hiawatha was built in 1898 and was used as a chapel and auditorium. In 1933 Hiawatha was converted into a girls' gymnasium.



This building was rebuilt in 1914 from a farm cottage into an employees' duplex. In 1972 it was converted into the Little Indian Center.

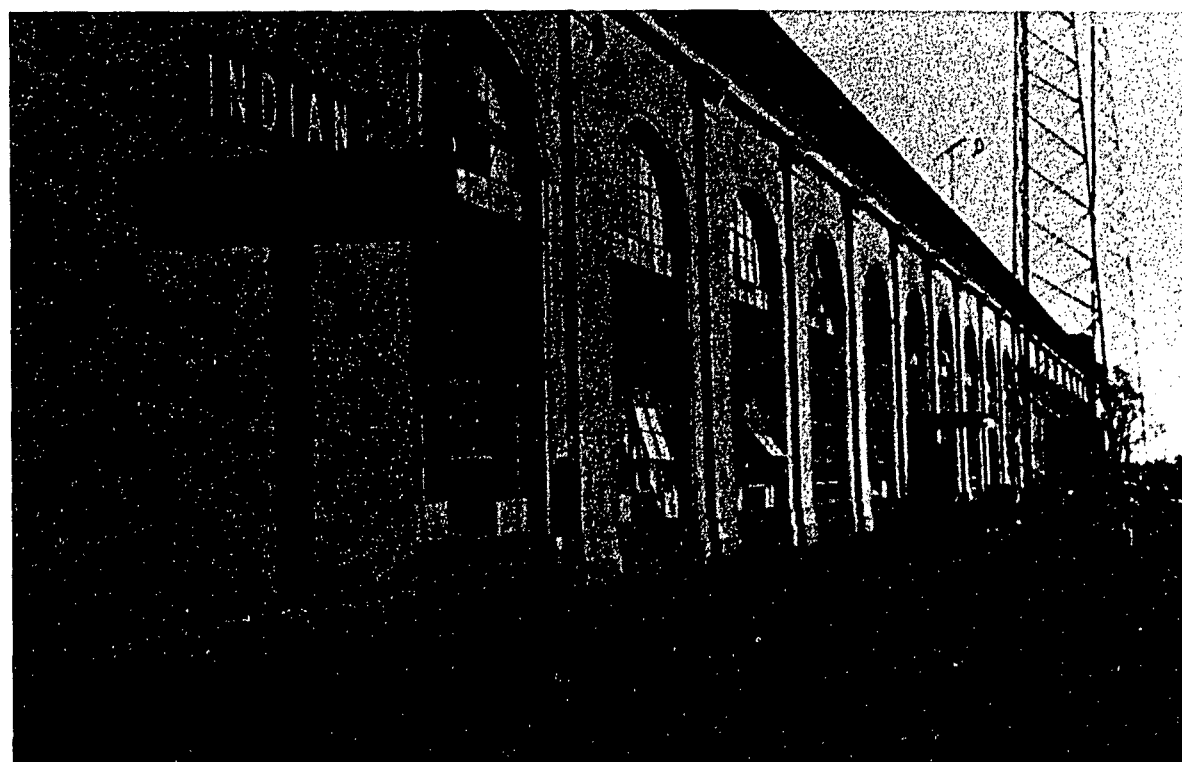
Completed in 1981 the Coffin Sports Complex, houses a swimming pool, weight room, basketball court and racquetball courts. Tony Coffin was a long-time Haskell coach.



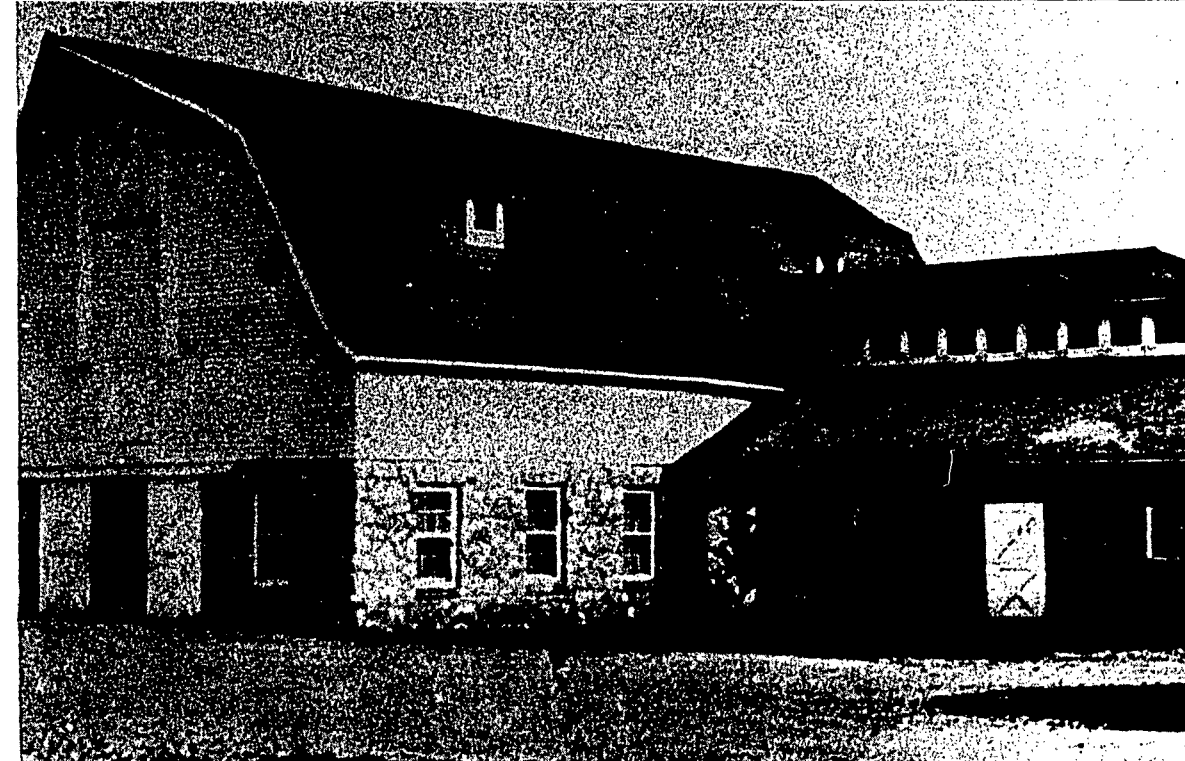
Constructed in 1957 as a girls' dormitory, the dedication of Minoka Hall was part of the 75th anniversary of the school. It was named in honor of Dr. L. Ross Minoka Hill, a Mohawk medical doctor.



Tinker Hall, a dormitory, was completed in the late 1950s. It was under the south section of the stadium. Much of the construction was completed by Haskell vocational students over a two-year period.



As it stands today, looking out over Adobe Flats. At one time Tinker housed football athletes.



The horse barn was built in 1918. After its use for horses it was converted into work areas for teaching masonry and exploratory courses in the building trades. The building was razed in 1968.



Named after Margaret Blalock, a Chippewa and also a long-time employee, Blalock Hall has 64 rooms and houses 128 students. It was built in 1977.

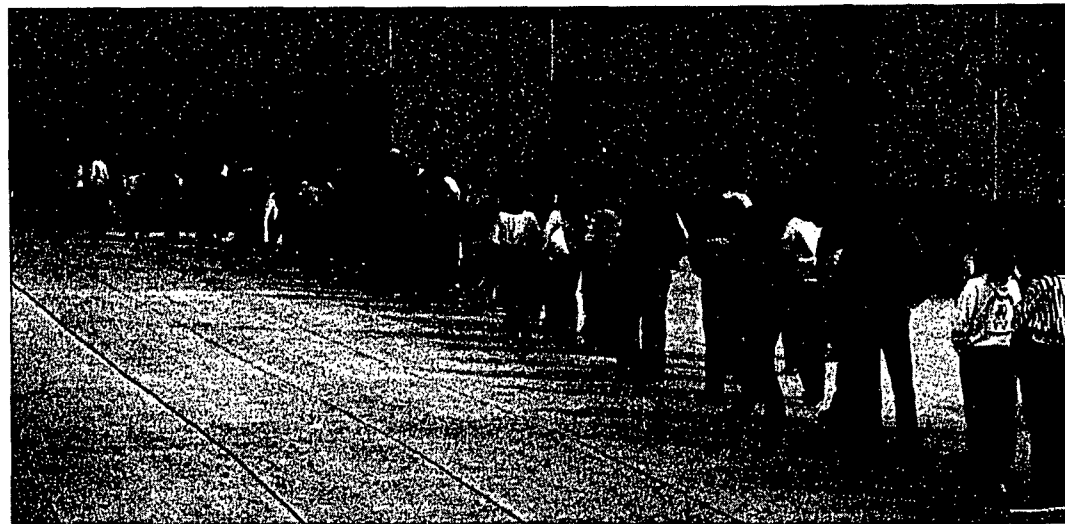


The auditorium was built in 1933 and has a seating capacity of 1001. In the foyer of the auditorium is the World War II memorial plaque and statue, "Comrade in Mourning." The statue by the Apache sculptor Allen Houser, grandson of Geronimo, was dedicated on January 22, 1949.

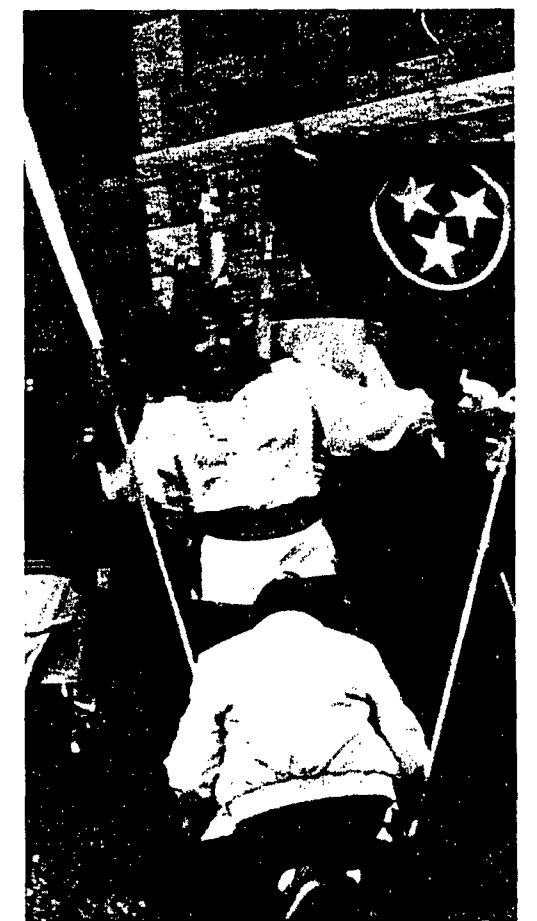
1884 OPENING CONVOCATION

On September 28, 1984 Haskell began its centennial celebration. Students lined the walk from Coffin Complex to Tecumseh gym gathering under state and tribal flags as well as signs which identified the various Indian nations which are represented at Haskell.

Despite cold and windy weather student support was exceptional.



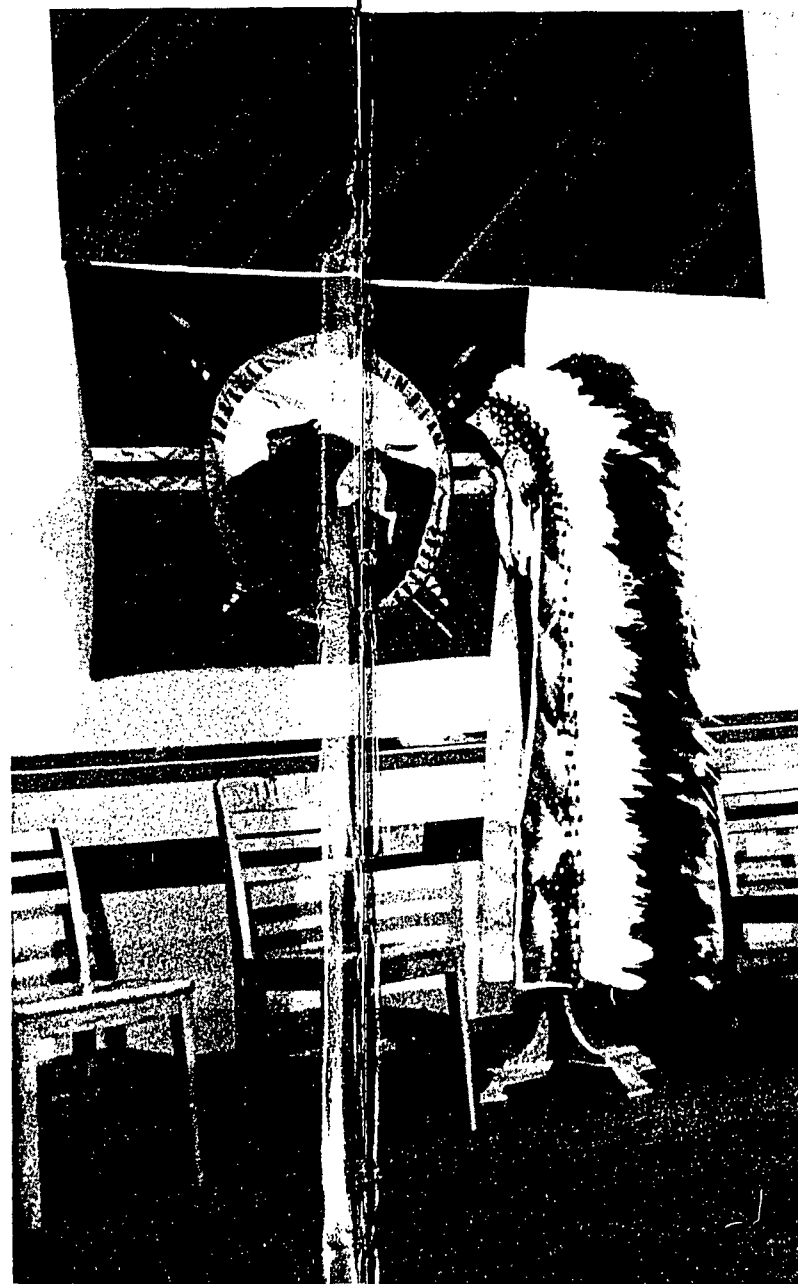
OPENING CONVOCATION 1984



The centennial processional began with a prelude by the Haskell band. The color guard was led by Miss Haskell, Kathy Bailey; Donny Belcourt; Patti Sherman; and John Sousea. Dr. Gipp headed the board of regents and representatives from national, state, county, local, and tribal governments.

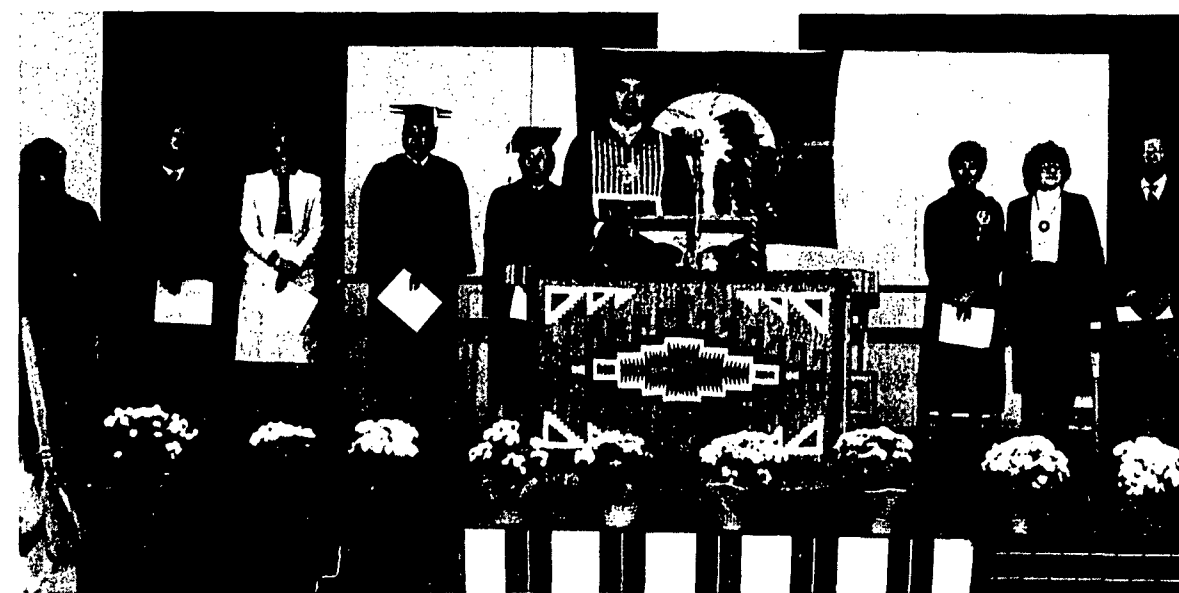
Haskell faculty, staff, and administration were clad in traditional cap and gowns.

Everyone who participated in the convocation showed their pride with enthusiasm as nation upon nation flowed into the Coffin Complex.



Haskell's centennial event was like a national convention of tribes. Speakers, diplomats, delegates, alumni, family and friends gathered to celebrate "Haskell ever-changing everlasting."

Host for the ceremony was ABC sportscaster Chris Schenkel. Other speakers included Dr. Gerald Gipp; Student Senate President Blaine Dixon; guests like Ms. Leonora Blandin, a 1913 graduate of Haskell; and Mrs. Martha Yallup of the board of regents.

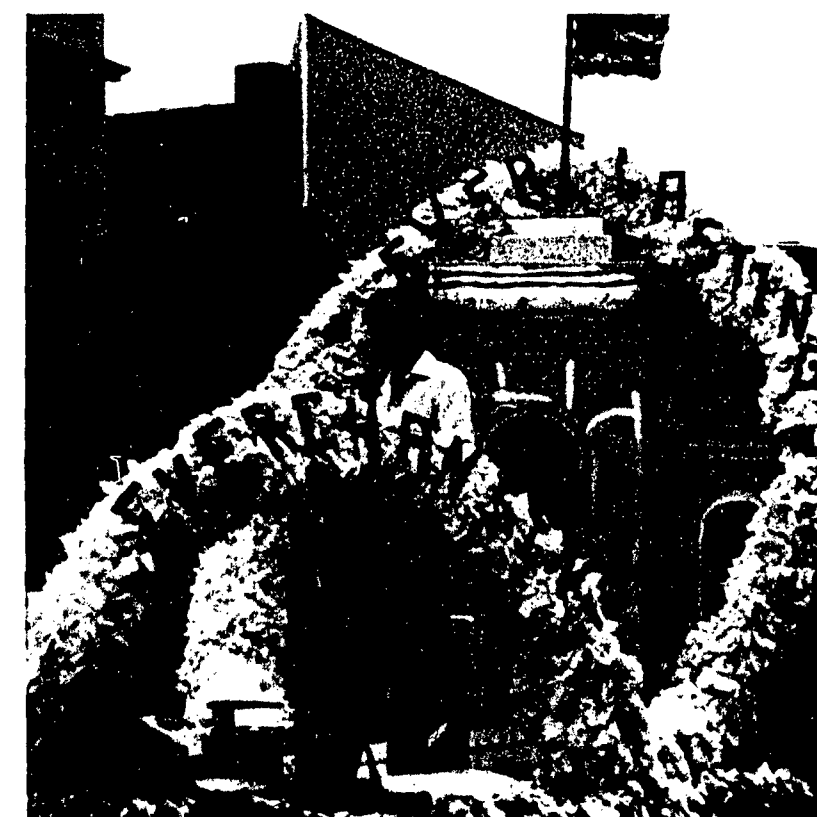
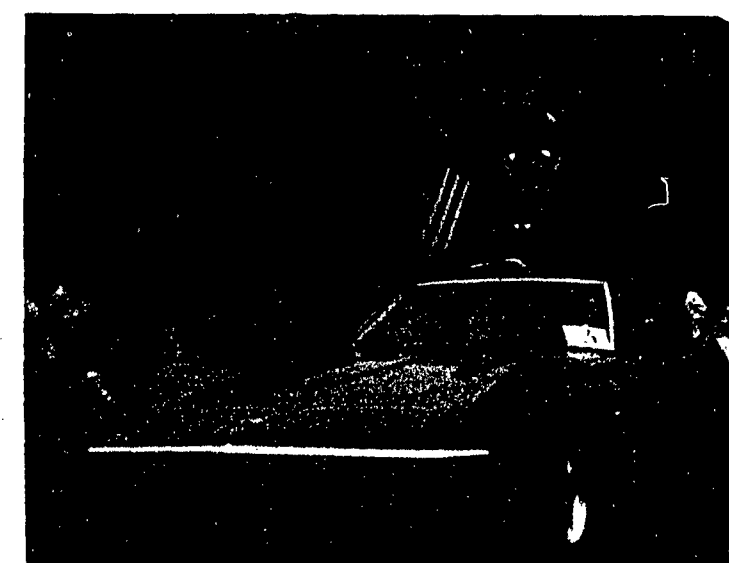
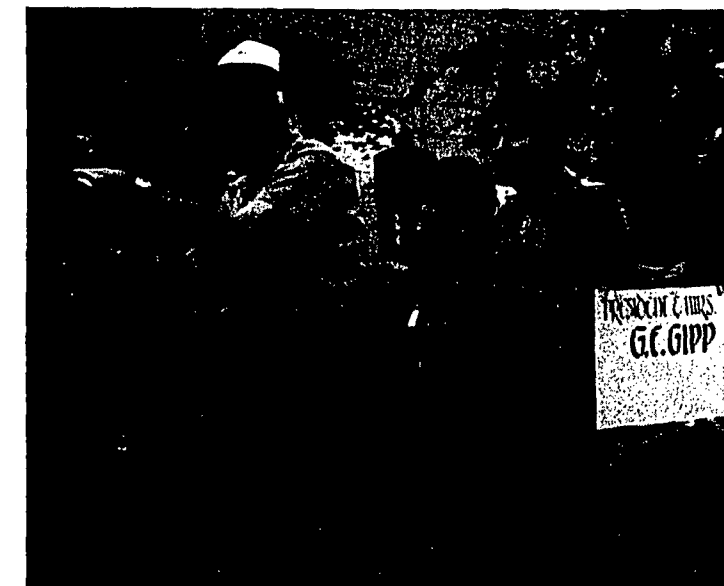


In conjunction with the convocation an evening banquet was held in Curtis Hall. The unveiling of a centennial poster by host Chris Schenkel and Mrs. Barbara Shoemake Haskell, outstanding 1974 Alumna. Also in attendance was Allie Reynolds, the first native American to be inducted into the Indian Athletic Hall of Fame. The Thunderbird Theatre performed "The Songs of Life," and a trio of flute players entertained during the meal.

Mr. Schenkel hosted the program of the evening and was presented with a centennial poster.



On Saturday, October 13, 1984 Haskell's homecoming events began with a 5,000-meter run. Following the run the annual homecoming parade proceeded down Massachusetts street. The parade was led by the North Dakota Veterans, and the parade marshal was Mr. Pahhe Yazza, class of 1913. There were antique cars, bands from the local school system, and princesses. Special guests of the centennial parade were members of the Phoenix Indian High School marching band.

The parade route was well attended by the city of Lawrence. Campus organizations put forth a tremendous amount of effort into their floats and a shot at a first-place cash prize.

First place was won by the Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Club, second place went to the Thunderbird Theatre, third place went to SAMA (Student Auto Mechanics Assn.), and fourth place went to the Intertribal club.

A special visitor was Anne Louise Willie, Miss Indian America, urging the young people to "be different." She is of the White Mountain Apache-Walker River Plate tribes.



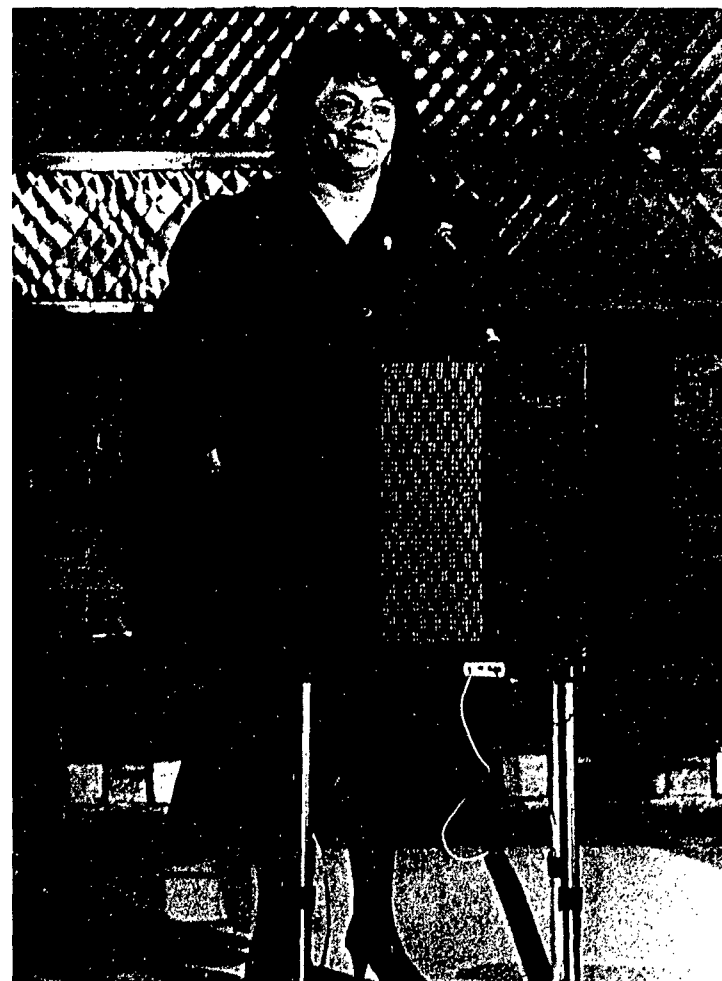
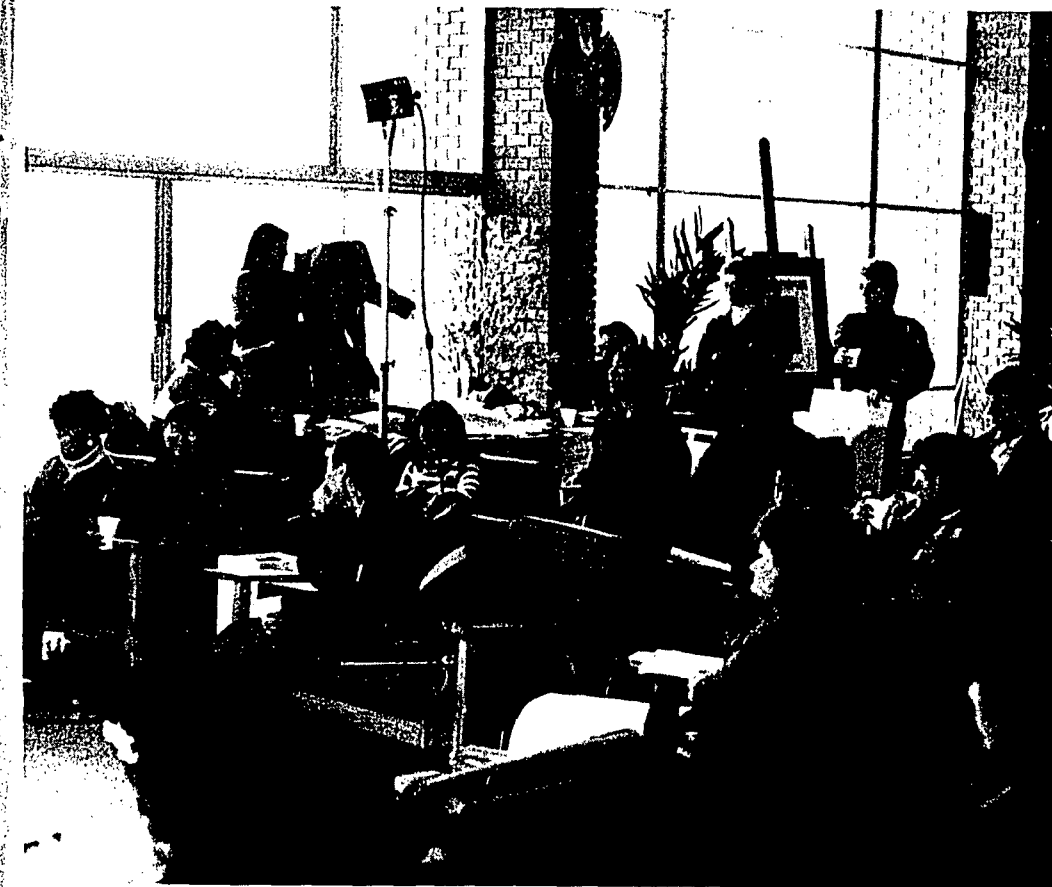
CHANGING ROLES OF NATIVE AMERICAN WOMEN AND FAMILY STRUCTURE

The conference was enjoyed by many Haskell staff and students as well as the Lawrence community.

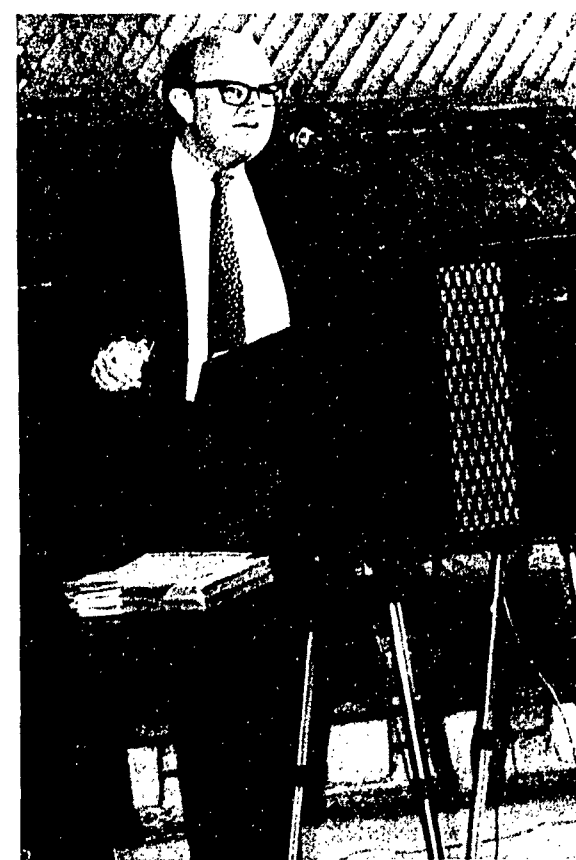

JURISPRUDENCE AND CHANGING VALUES IN TRIBAL GOVERNMENT

The fifth and final seminar was on "Jurisprudence and changing Values in Tribal Government"; it was held on March 19-21, 1985. The keynote speaker was Ross Swimmer, principal chief of the Cherokee Nation, Tahlequah, Oklahoma. Speaking on economic development, he said, "The way out of the morass ... we're in today is through education," and "we desperately need talent out on the reservation."

Among other speakers at the seminar were Roberta Ferron, attorney, director of Affirmative Action at the University of Kansas, Lawrence; Stephen Pevar, counsel, Rocky Mountain Region, American Civil Liberties Union, Denver; Donald Stull, associate professor of anthropology, University of Kansas, Lawrence.

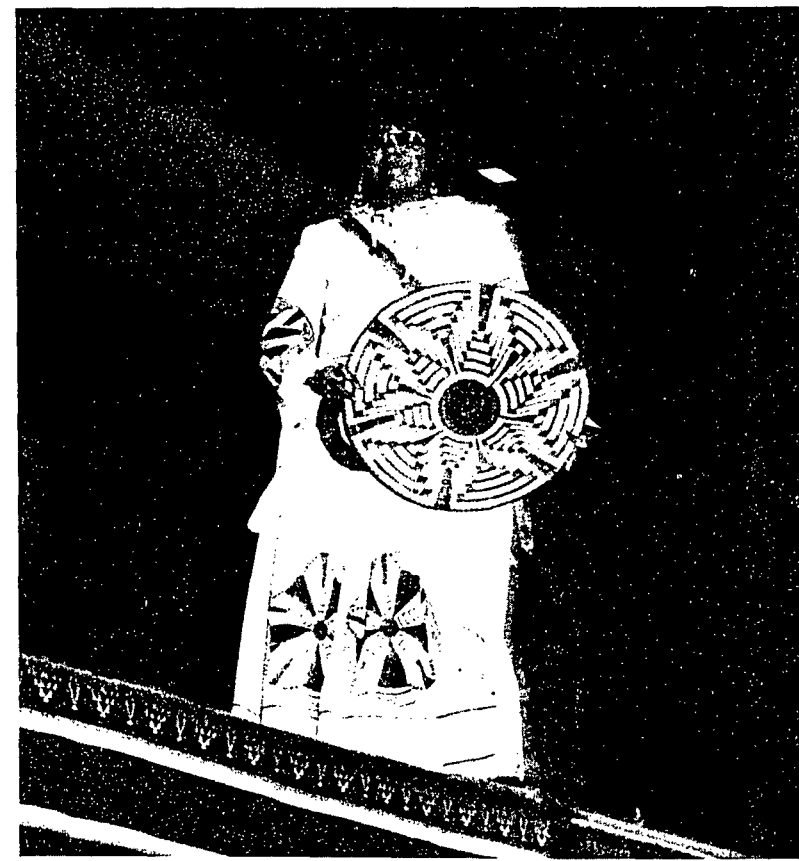


CONTEMPORARY AND TRADITIONAL DRESS REVIEWS

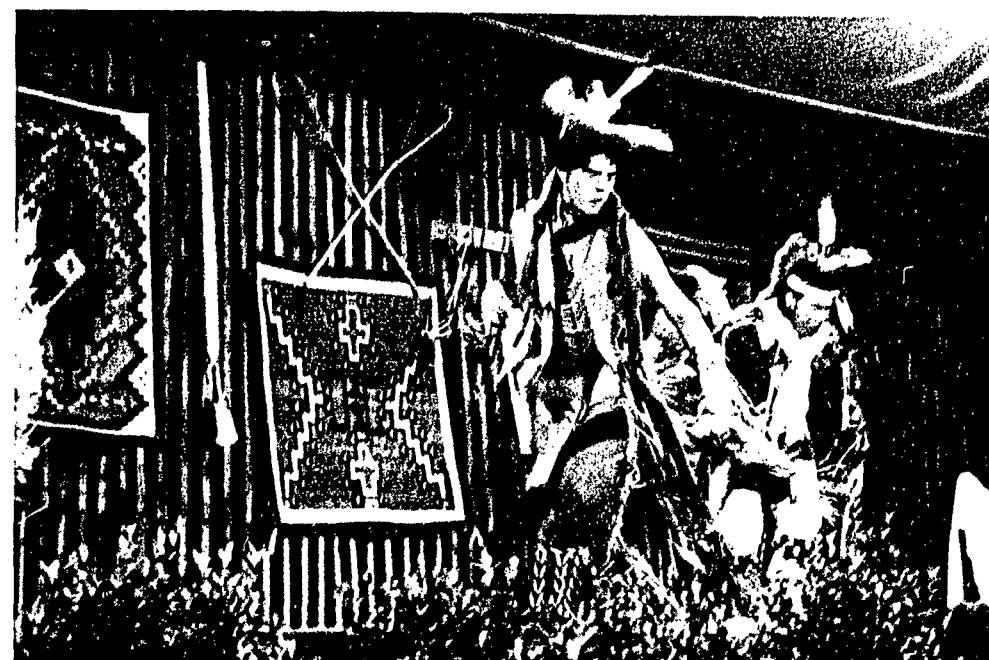
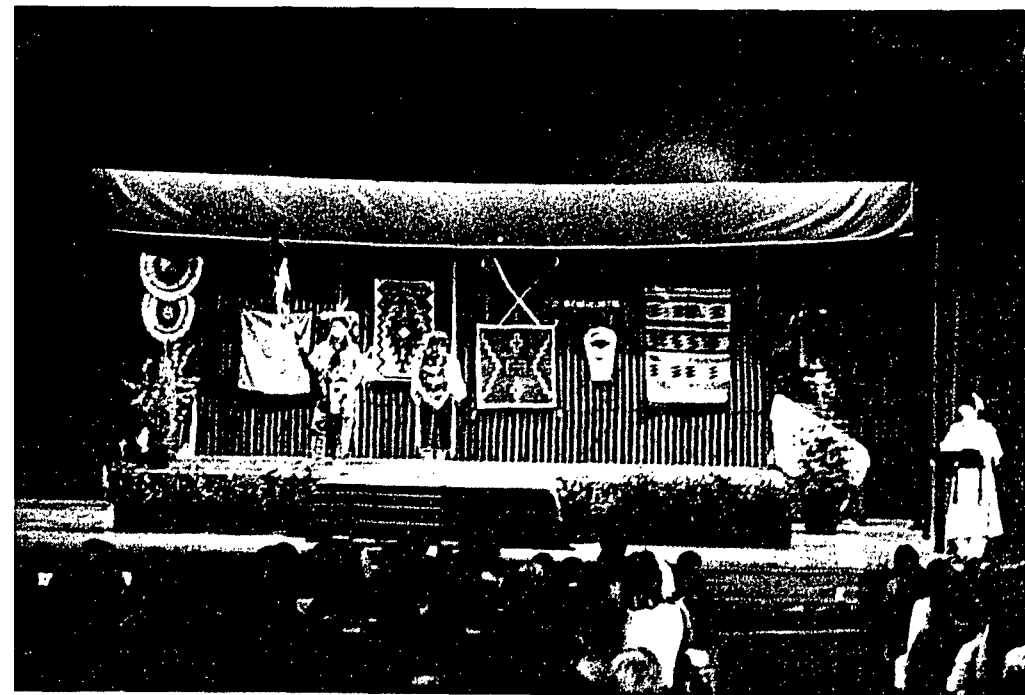

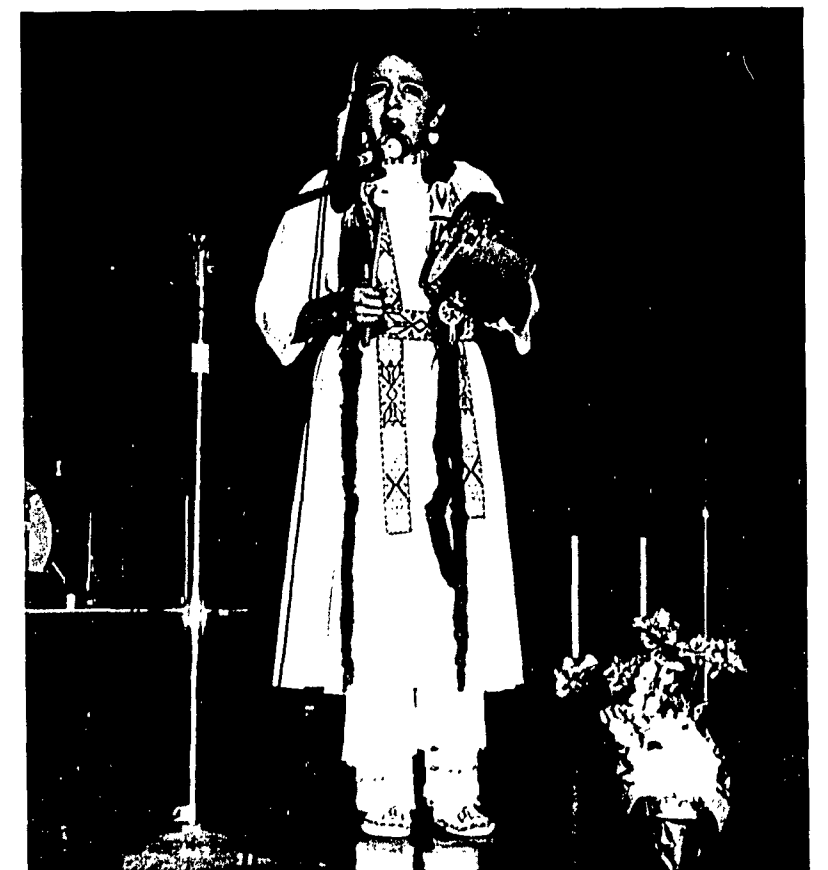
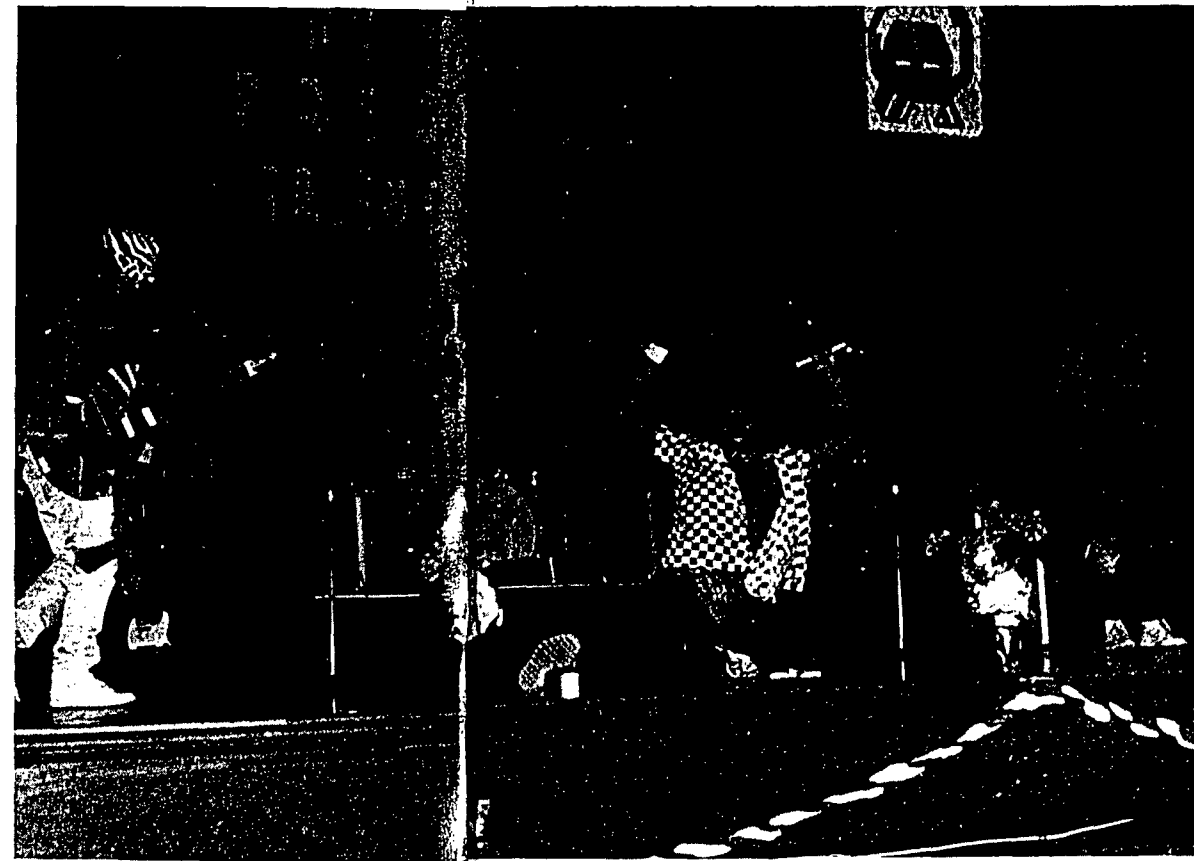
AWARDS 1984

AMERICAN INDIAN ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Five American Indians were inducted into the American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame at Haskell Indian Junior College during a ceremony in the Jayhawk Room of the Kansas Union. They were enshrined because they have brought honor to themselves and Indian people through sports and professional accomplishment. The honorees were Virgil Franklin, Sidney Carney, Robert Holmes, Gordon House, and Sampson Bird. Wes Santee, a noted track star at Kansas University, was the master of ceremonies.



COMMENCEMENT

John Fritz, acting assistant secretary for Indian Affairs with the department of the Interior, was the 1985 commencement speaker. In the opening address he asked: "What are you going to give back to our Indian community and our nation in return for what you received here?"

He told more than 200 graduates they were needed in the private and public sector. The graduates needed two rules: "Get started at changing things" and "keep at it."



The 1985 Centennial Commencement was dedicated to Haskell's oldest living graduate, Ms. Lenora Blandin. Ms. Blandin entered Haskell at the age of fifteen on September 7, 1904 and graduated from the commercial program on June 6, 1913. She was born in 1889 on the Pottawatomie Reservation.

Ben Shoemaker was elected as the outstanding alumnus. He attended Haskell from 1932-1940 and graduated from the high school in vocations. In 1939 he was selected as an honor guard for the world's fair.

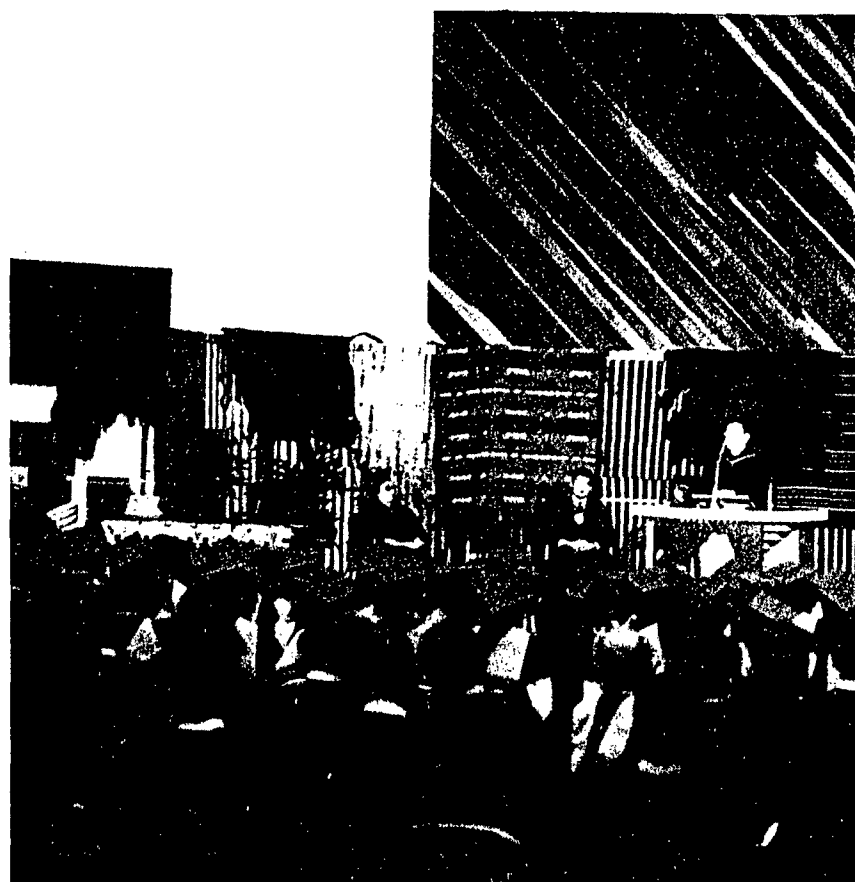


The day started out cool and windy, Caps and gowns were blowing about as the line of march was formed outside.

The first graduate to walk across the stage and receive a degree was Mrs. Carol Gipp, wife of the president; she also received a kiss.



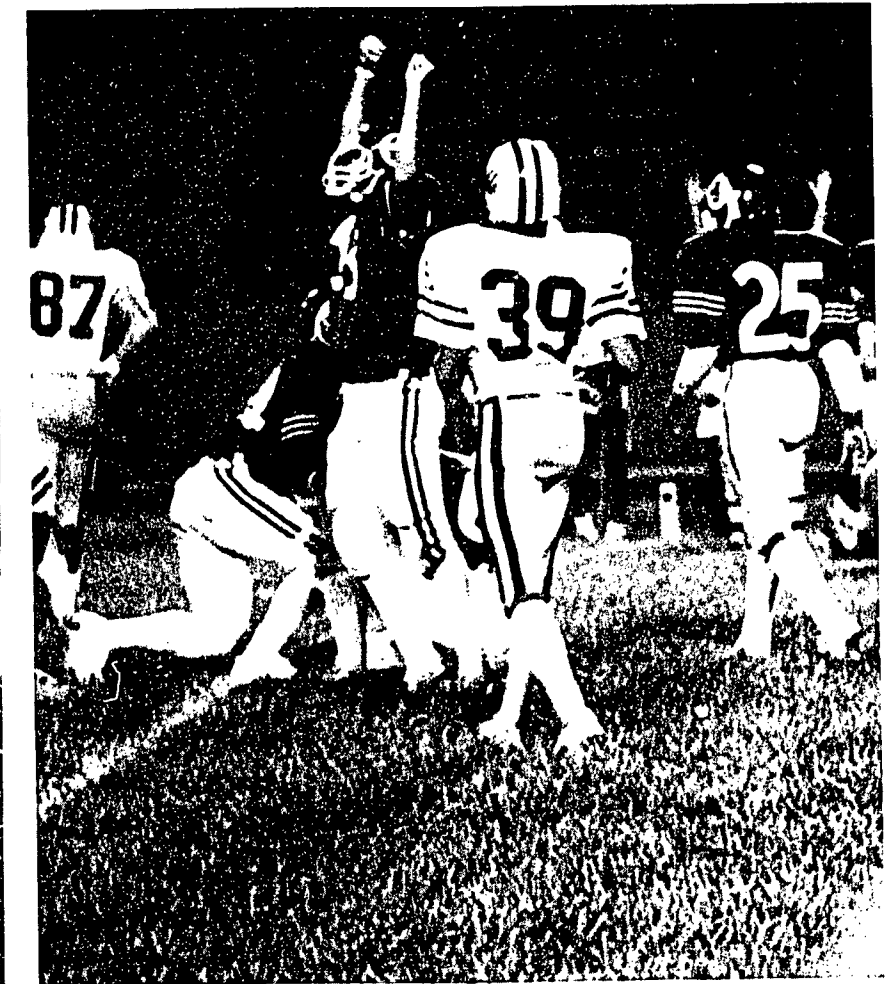

The 1984 Haskell football team took it on the chin this year. They played hard striving to overcome mistakes, but were outmanned in about every position. The defense seemed to be on the field most

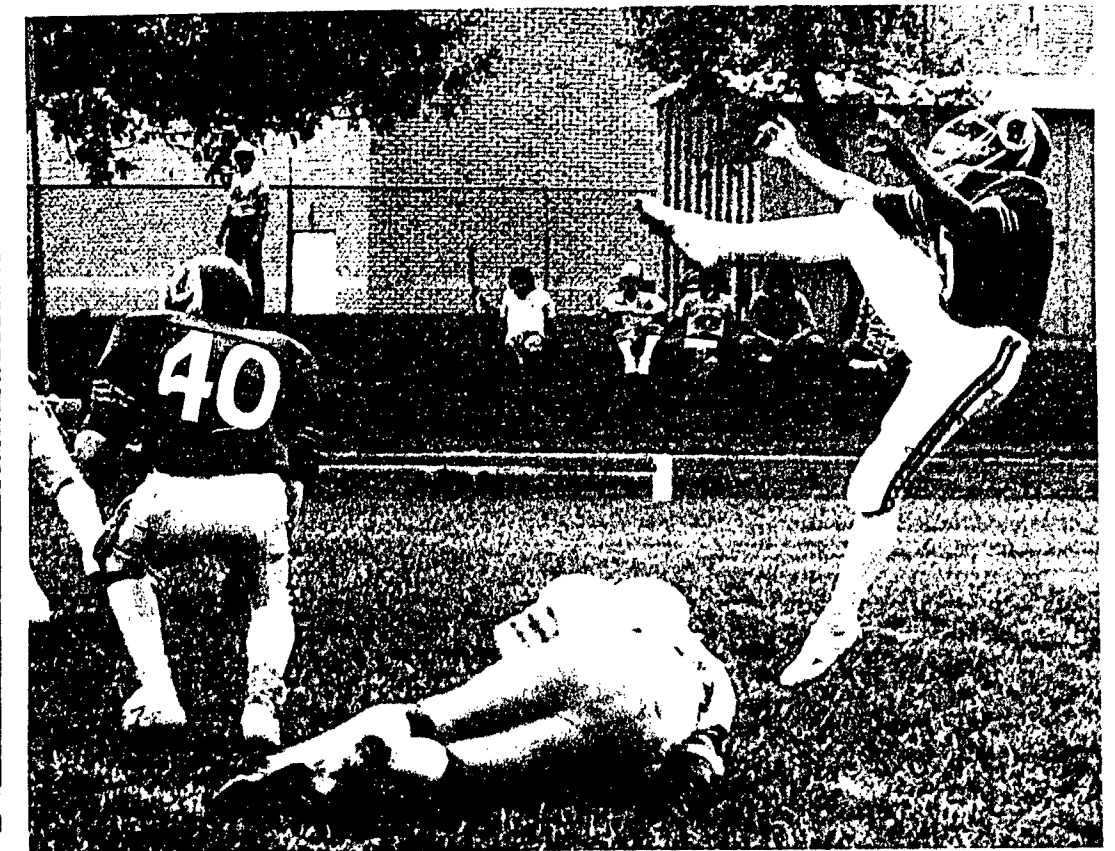
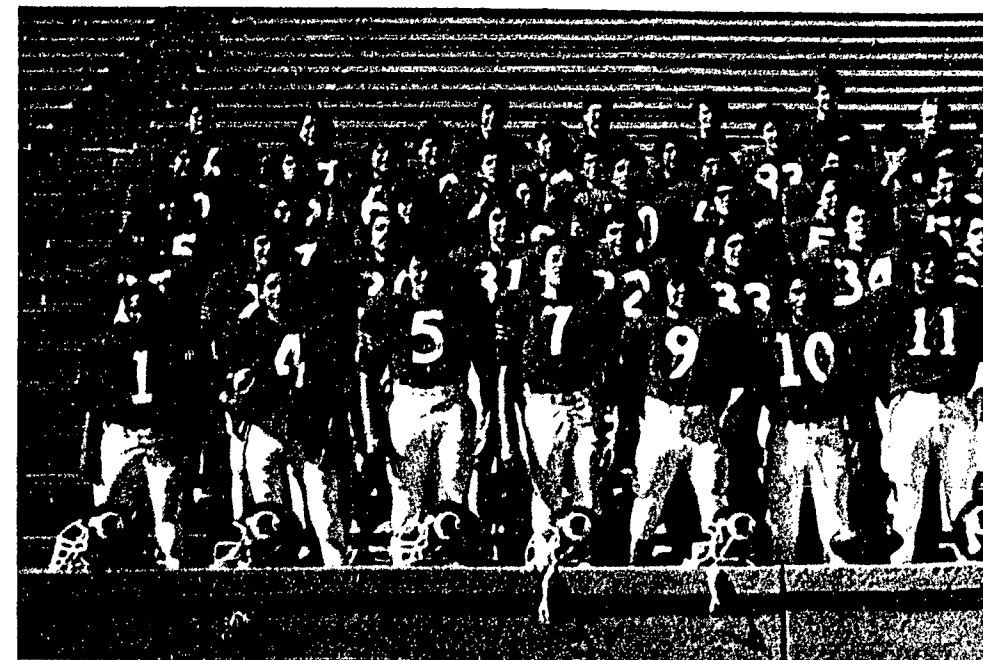
of the time to try to stop the other team. Haskell had a difficult ten-game schedule, but it won the final game of the year.

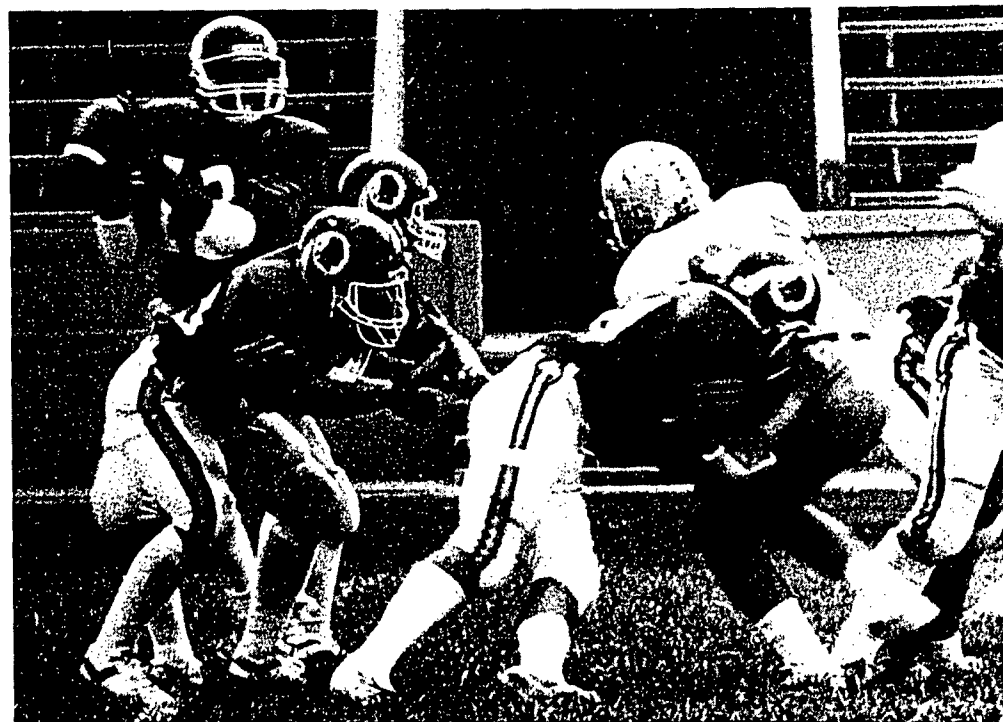


Taggert Martinez after catching a short pass heading upfield.

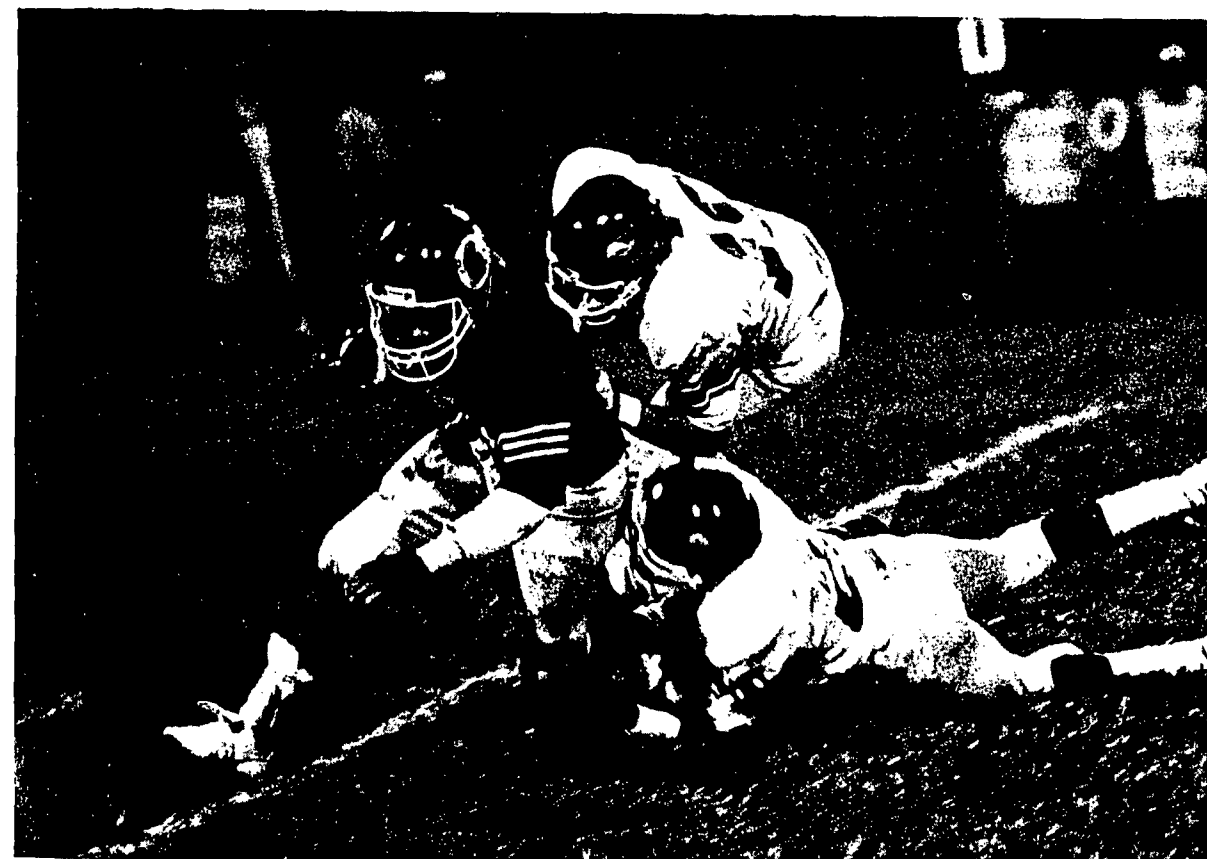

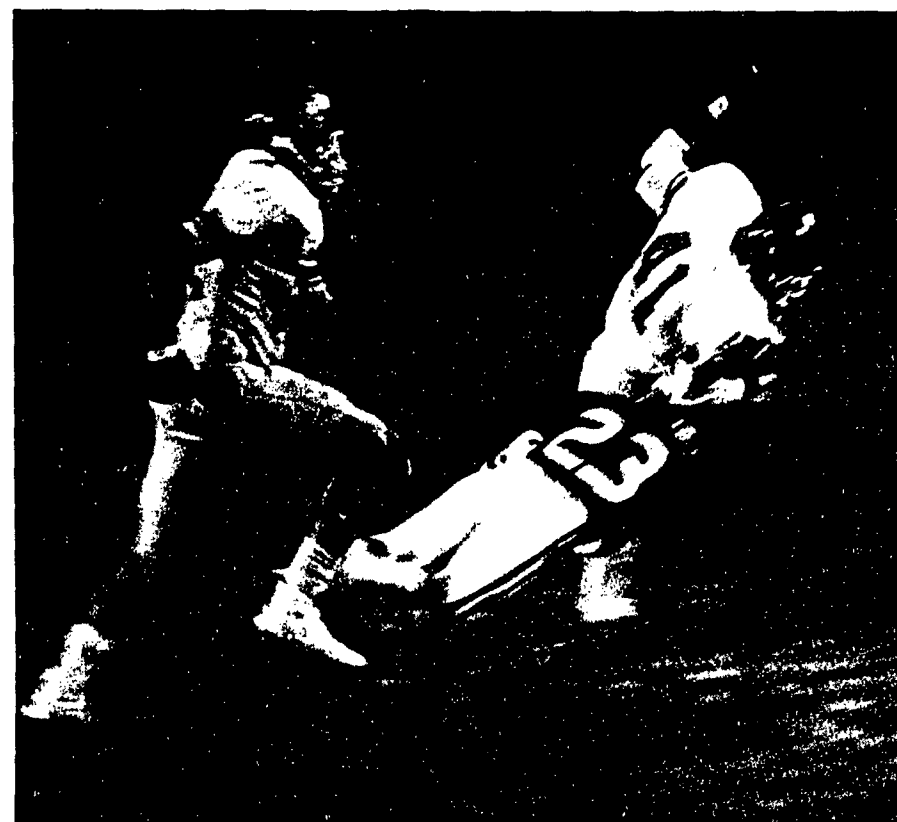

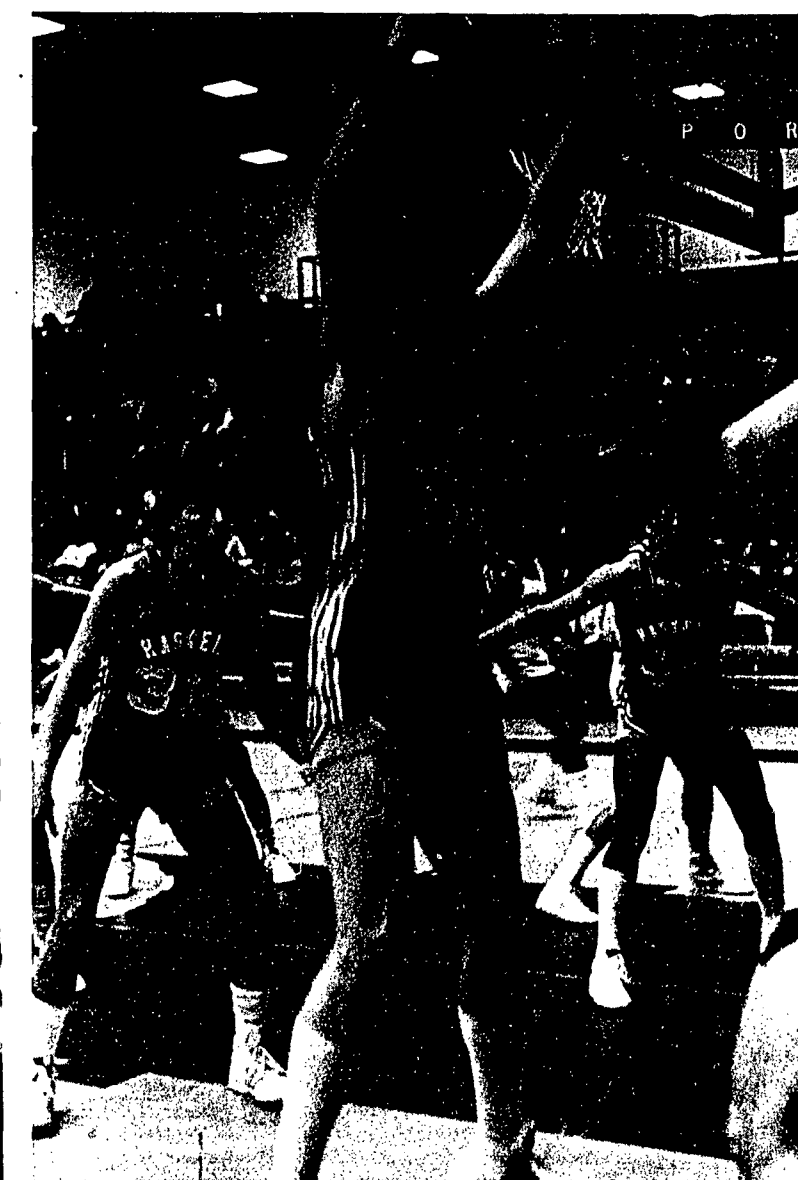
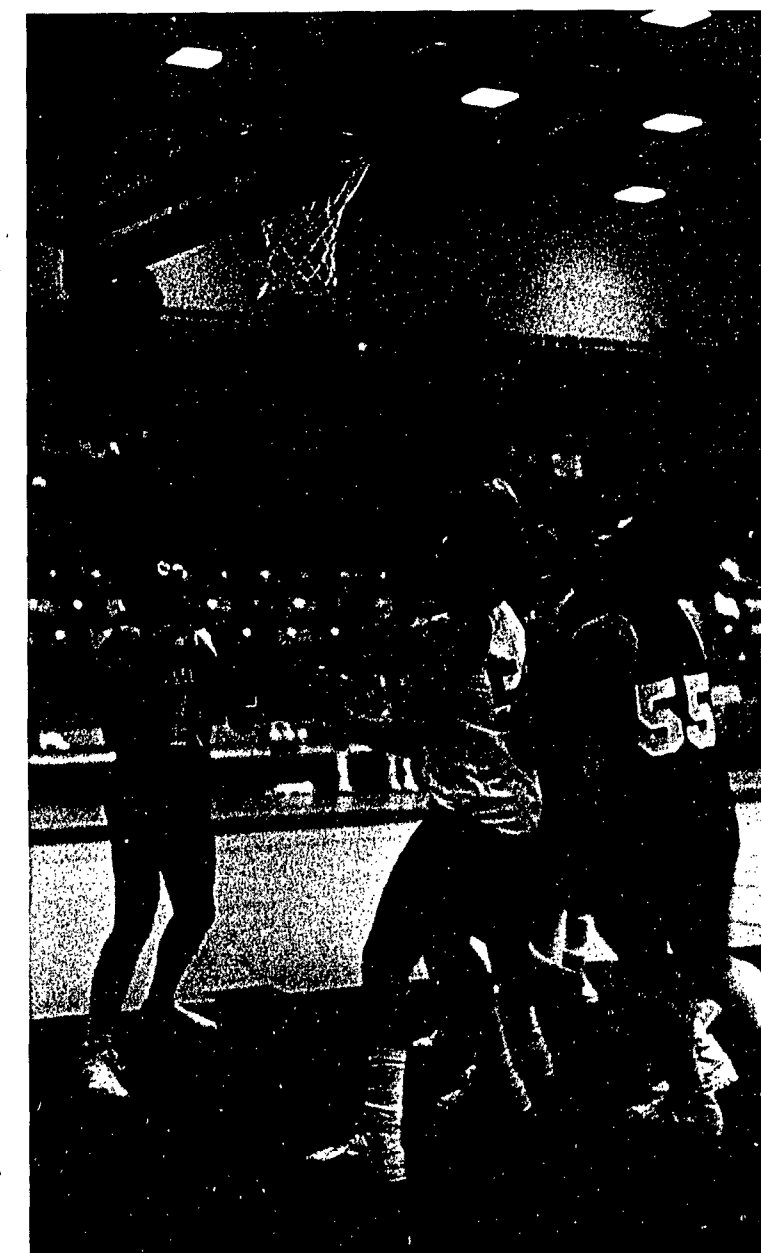
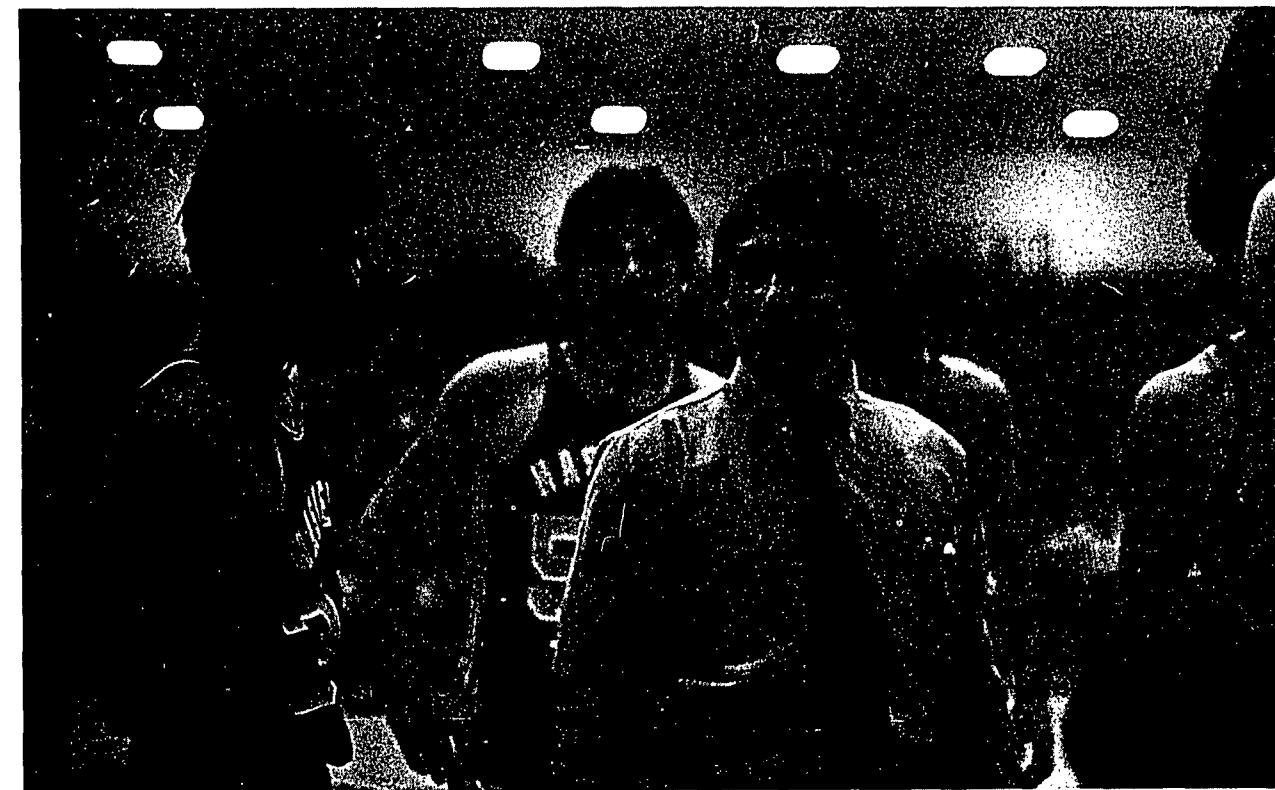
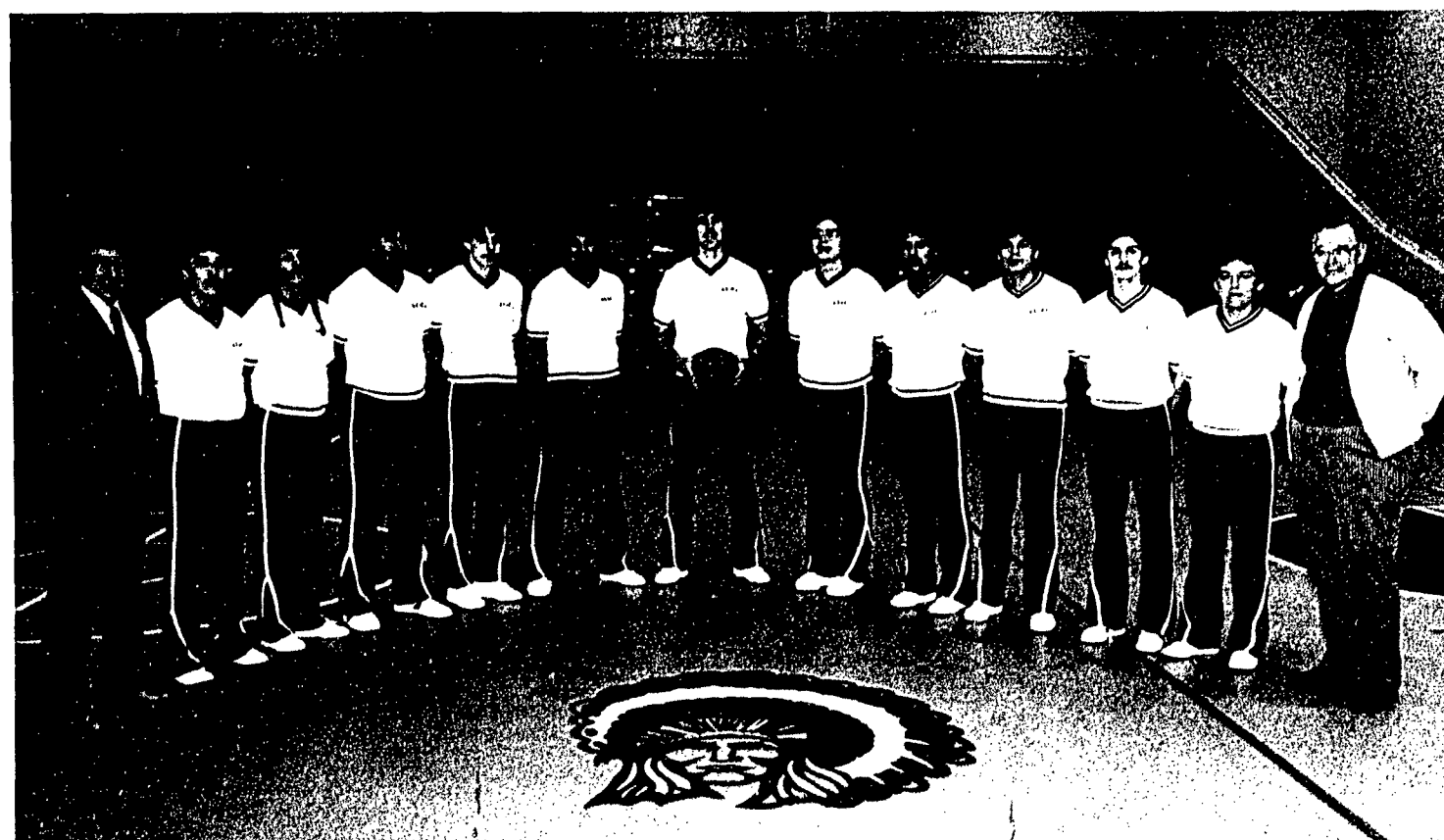
BASKETBALL

This year's basketball team showed a lot of hustle. Led by Jim Miller who was the team's leading rebounder and scorer, the Indians lost some close games but also won their share.



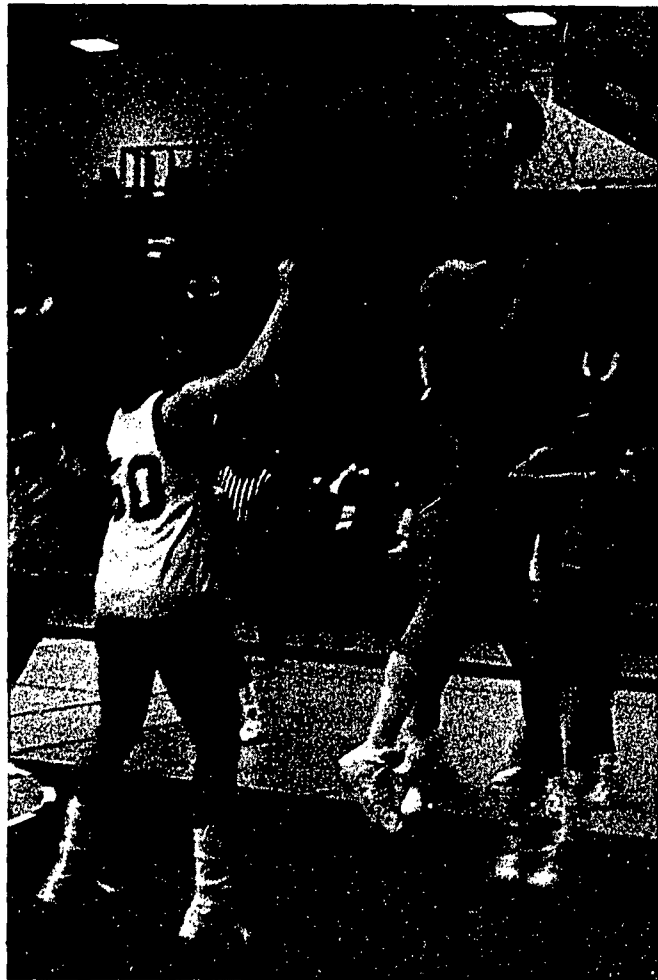

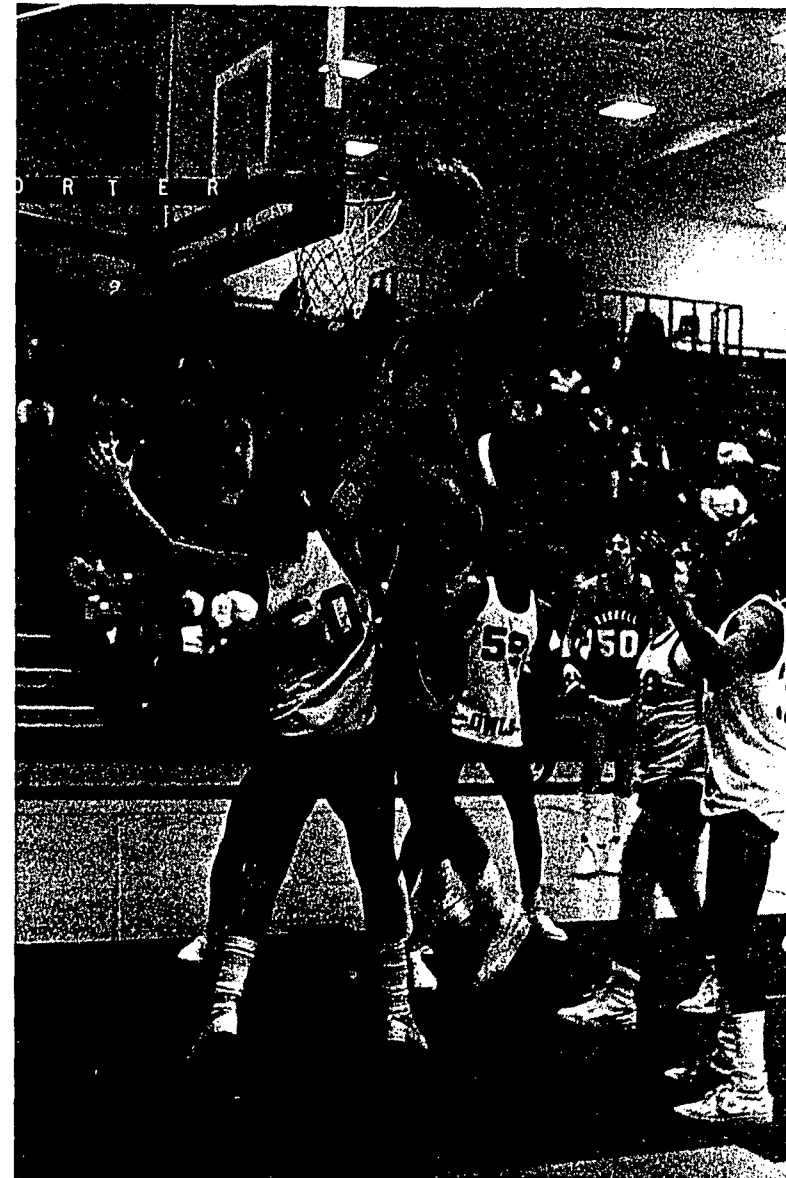

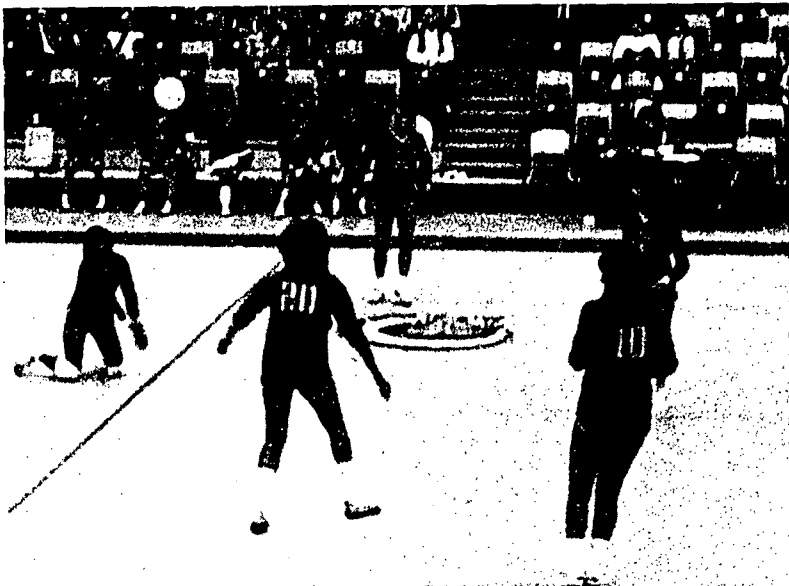

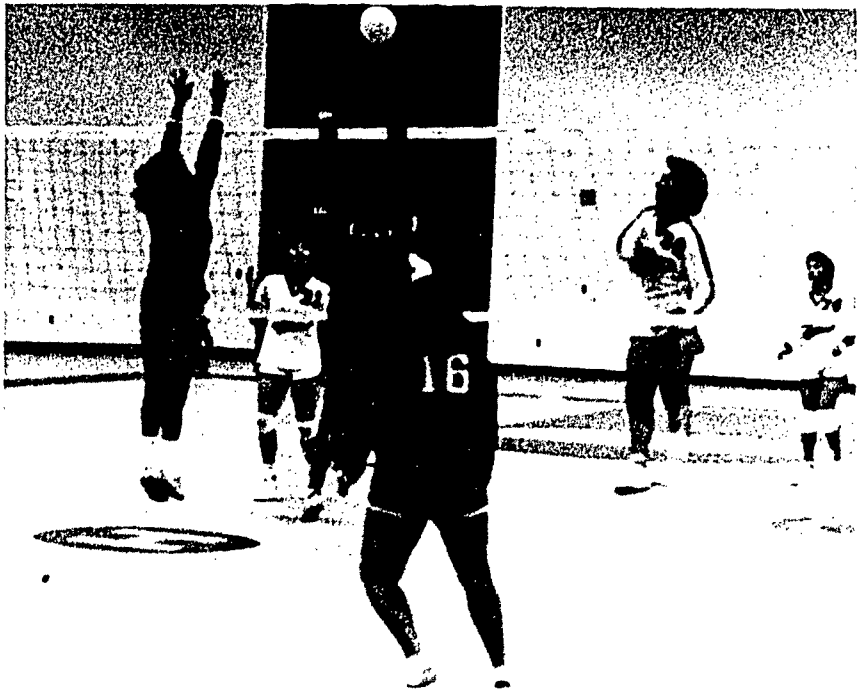

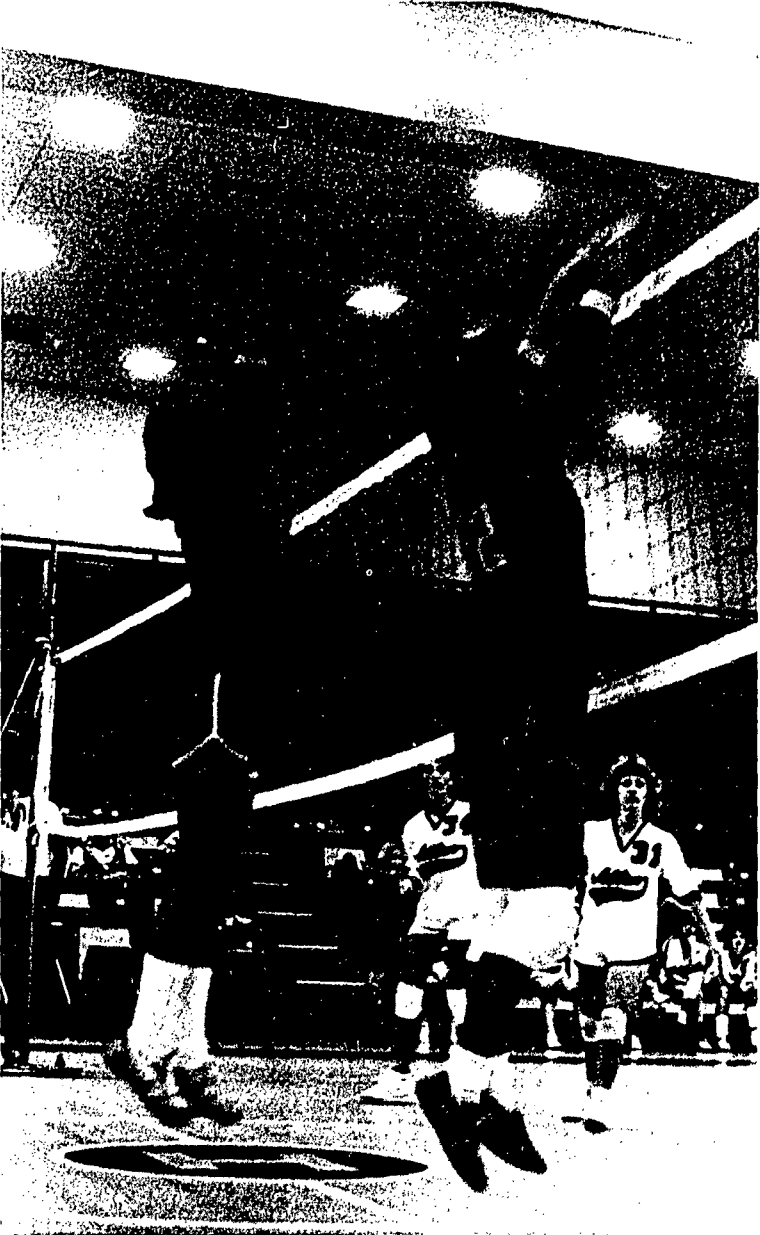

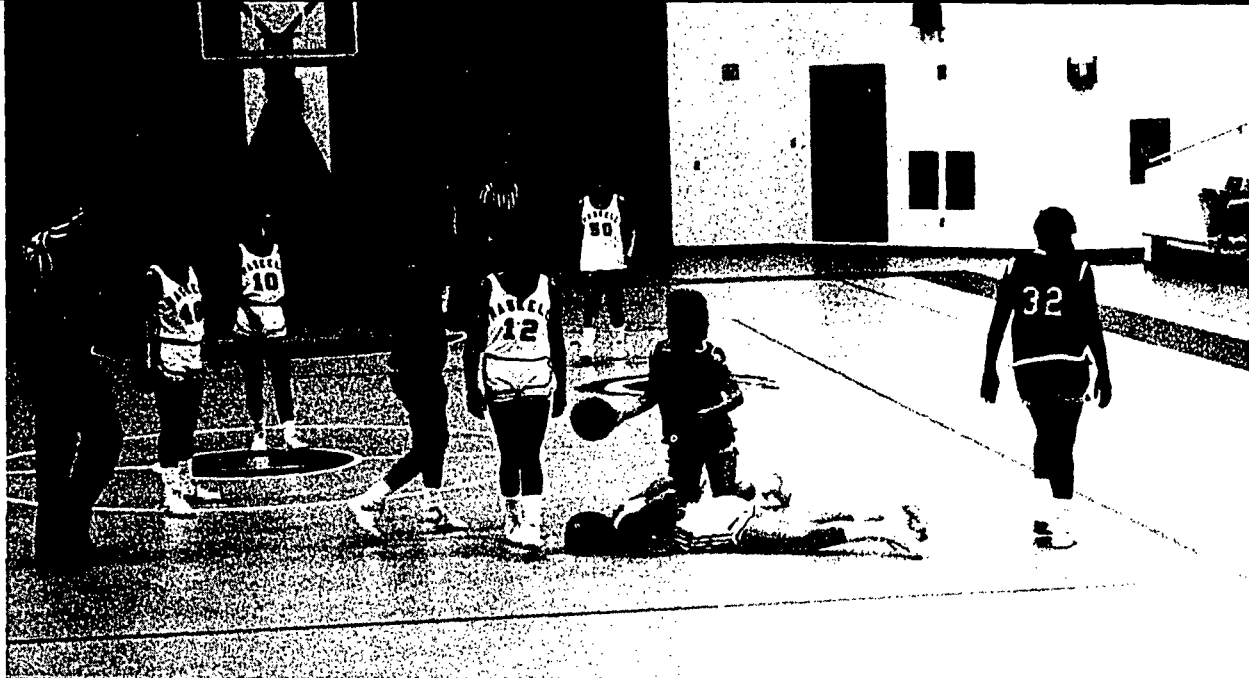
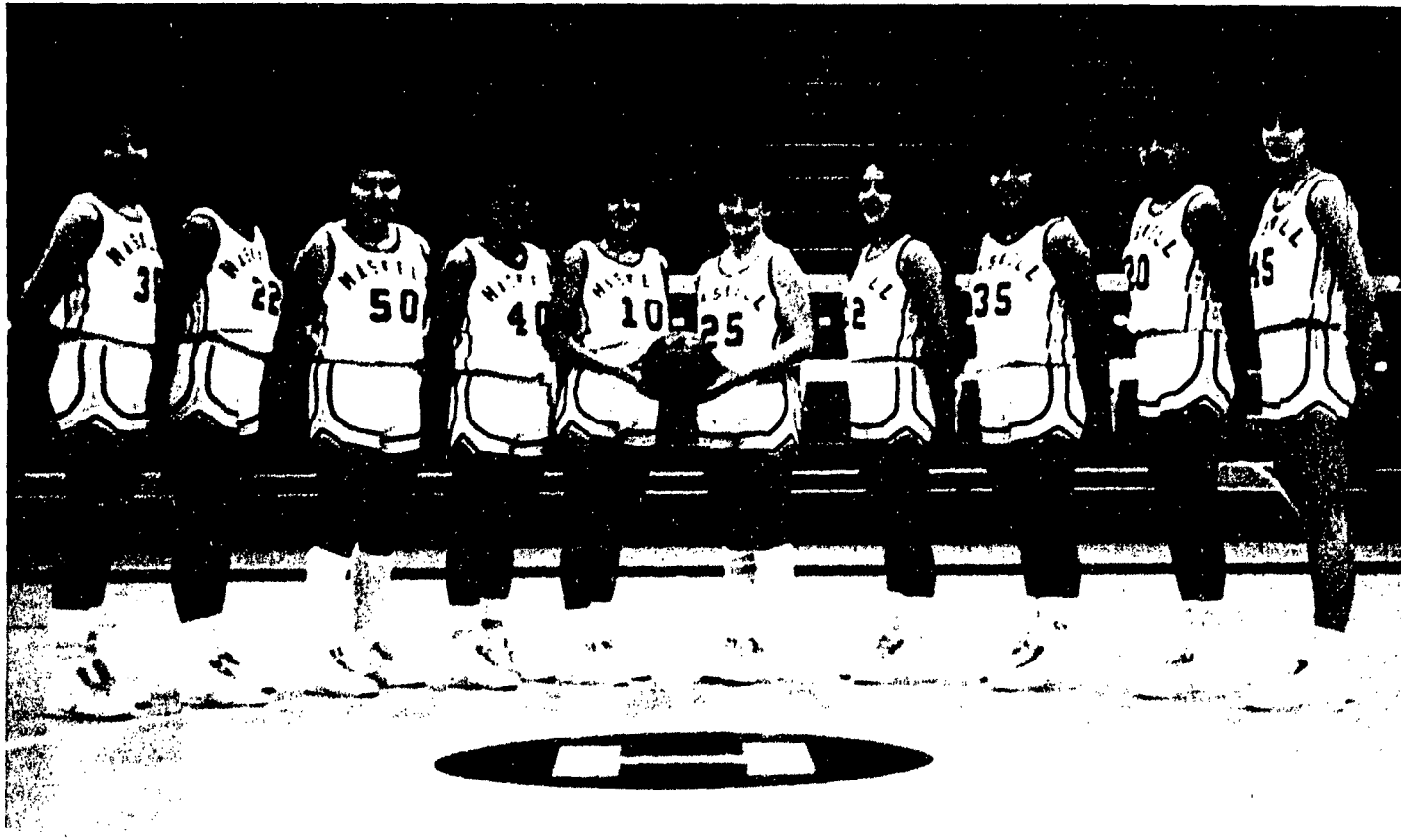
BASKETBALL WOMEN

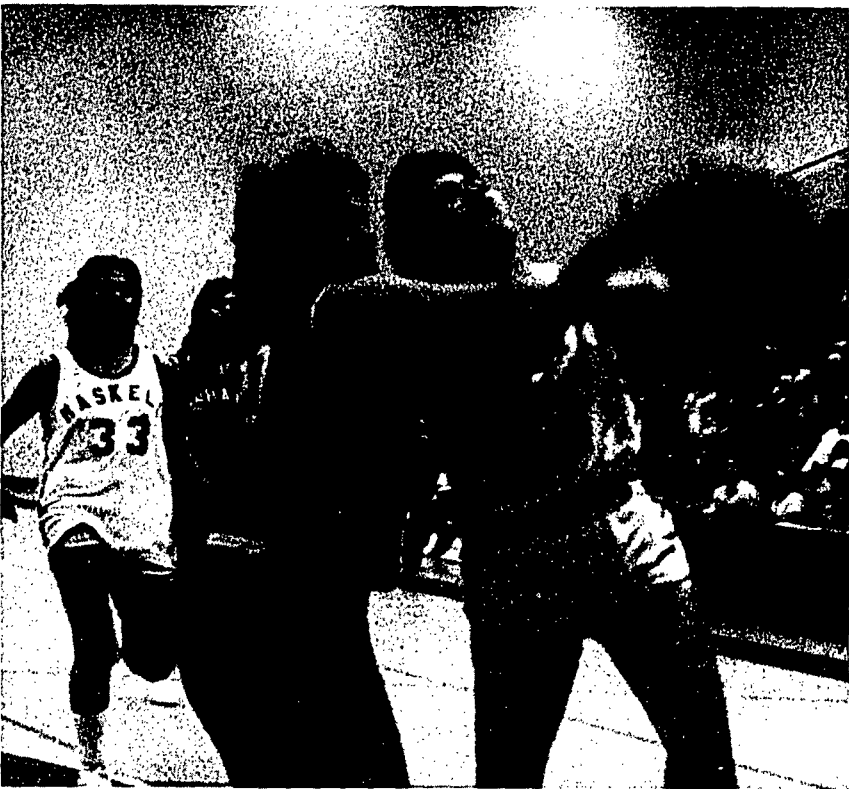

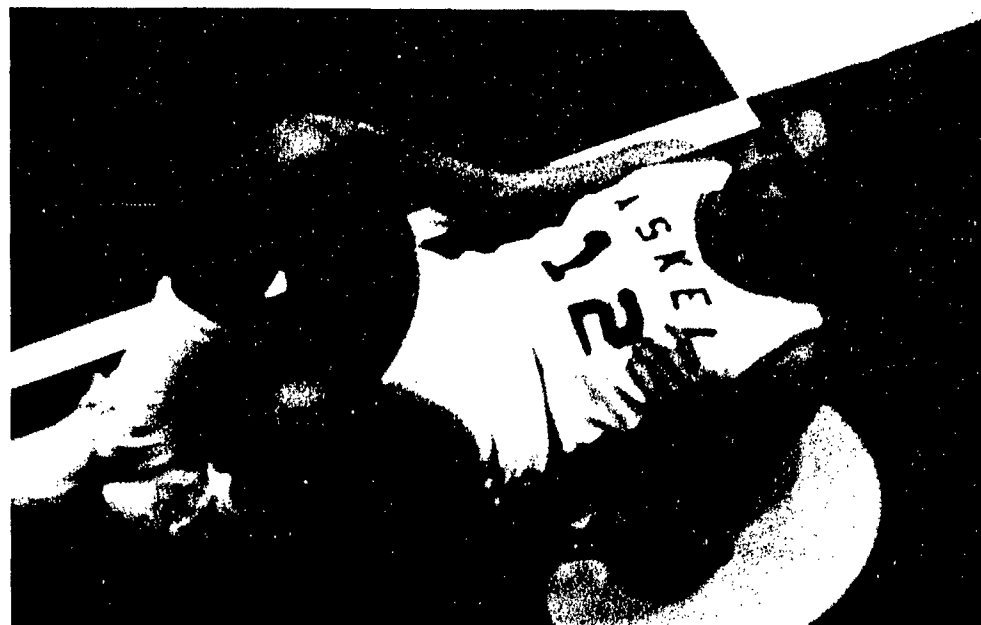

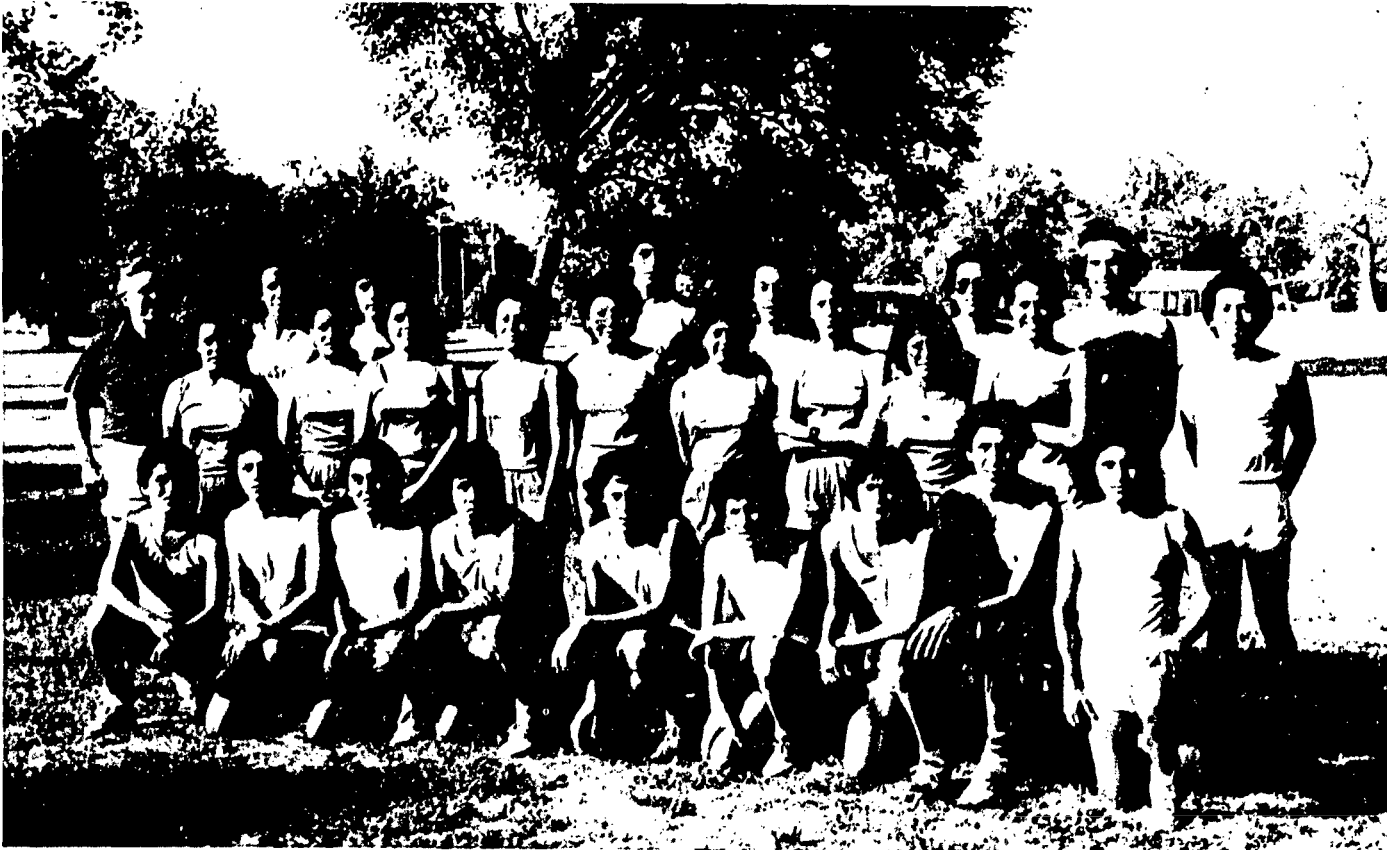
