



It would be a major achievement to capture symbolism of all the Nations represented at Haskell, but very difficult. Please accept my attempt to capture this spirit.

A NEW BEGINNING...




In April 1993, the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities visited the Haskell campus and reviewed the academic programs offered. Their recommendation, formalized by a motion in August of that year, approved Haskell to move from offering associate or two-year programs to offering a baccalaureate program in elementary education. Anticipating this change in the mission, the Board of Regents began early in the winter to solicit nominations for a name which would reflect the change in status. In a unanimous vote at their May meeting, the Board adopted the name: Haskell Indian Nations University. According to the resolution passed, the name reflects the respect and support the Board has for tribal sovereignty.









Hiawatha: Hiawatha was built in 1898 and was used as a Chapel and Auditorium. The gym was in the basement. In 1918, swimming became part of the physical education program with a pool in the basement until it was discontinued. In 1933, it was converted into a girls' gym. Today, it houses the Welcome Center and the Indian Sports Hall of Fame.



Kiva Hall: Kiva Hall was built in 1900 and was used as the school's laundry until 1951. In 1954, it was used for the Navajo Training Program and was named Kiva. Today, the Dean of Instruction, Teacher Education Program, and the Natural Resources Program uses it as office spaces.

Pushmataha: Pushmataha, the Administration Building, was built in 1920.

Pushmataha, Choctaw, was born in Novubee County, Mississippi, around 1765. The name means "eagle." He was chosen to the envied position of the chief of the Choctaws in 1805. He signed the treaty of Mt. Dexter, which provided for cession of a large tract of land in Alabama and Mississippi. He was once one of the main leaders in persuading the Choctaw Nation to join the United States.

He died in Washington D.C. on December 24, 1824. He is buried in Arlington Cemetary. Band Stand: The Band Stand, a landmark of Haskell, was built in 1908. Music has always been an interest to Haskell students. The Bandstand was used frequently for concerts.

The Alumni Association and the National Historical Society made a recommendation that the bandstand be a permanent structure on campus.



Tecumseh: Tecumseh was constructed as a gymnasium in 1915. Tecumseh, a Shawnee chief, was born in 1768 in the village of Piqua (near the present Springfield, Ohio.) The word Tecumseh means Shooting Star. At the age of sixteen he took part in his first attack against the white settlers. It was after one of these earlier raids that Tecumseh first witnessed a common act of torture. He was so shocked and filled with horror that after he became chief, he would never allow a prisoner to be tortured by any of his people.

Haskell Stadium & Arch: The stadium was dedicated in October, 1926. The three-day dedication consisted of a drama presentation, a buffalo barbeque, and the Haskell-Bucknell football game, which Haskell won 36-0.

Charles Curtis, United States Senator from Kansas gave the dedicatory address. At the dedication program, Jim Thorpe and John Levi, well known Haskell athletes, gave an exhibition. The Kansas City Star in the "Believe or Not" section reported that John Levi threw a pass for 83 yards.

The Haskell Stadium was the first lighted stadium in the Mid-West. The National Historical Society has requested that the stadium and the arch be a permanent structure on the campus.

Blue Eagle: Blue Eagle was constructed in 1957. It was dedicated in 1957 as part of the 75th anniversary of Haskell. Acce Blue Eagle paintings were presented to Haskell with a stipulation that they were to be hung in Blue Eagle Hall.

Acee Blue Eagle, Creek-Pawnee, was a renowned authority of Indian history, myth, legend, law, religion, and music. He attended Haskell briefly and later went to Bacone College. In 1932, he received his Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree at Oklahoma University. He toured England, Scotland, Switzerland, Germany, Spain, Italy, and Sweden in 1935 conducting series of lectures on the "Life and Character of the American Indian."

In 1941, he entered the Air Force, during World War II, where he served at 18 posts, leaving Indian murals at each. Acee was also a photographer on heavy bombers. His most famous mural was painted for the Battleship U.S.S. Oklahoma, which was sunk at Pearl Harbor.

Blue Eagle was used as the Commercial Building until commercial department was moved to Sequoyah Hall in 1965. Today, it houses business classes and offices for Business instructors.

Ross Hall: Ross Hall was constructed in 1972. It houses the English and reading department along with the Learning Center. It was named after John Ross, one of the Cherokee Chiefs of the Cherokee Nation.

John Ross was born October 3, 1790 near Lavhont Mountain, Tennessee. He was prominent political figure, who led the Cherokee tribe's educational and mechanical development to one of prominence. He also led the relentless fight for their homeland in the great Smoky Mountains. After losing their homeland, he led his people half way across the United States into Oklahoma. The "Trail of Tears" is a tragic epic.

Ross was president of the Cherokee National Council from 1819 to 1826. In 1828 he was elected chief of the Cherokee Nation, which he held until his death. Ross died in Washington D.C. in 1866, while working on a treaty for his people.


Navarre: Navarre Hall was constructed in 1971. It was named after Peter Navarre, the first graduate from the Haskell Institute printing department in 1901. Peter Navarre, a Potawatomi, was born March 26, 1884, in Rossville, Kansas. After graduating from Haskell in 1901, he worked in the Rossville News Office. He moved to White Earth, Minnesota in 1903 to assume control of an Indian school journal. Navarre and his wife purchased Rossville Reporter, a monthly newspaper, in 1913. They were owners and editors for 40 years. Navarre died in August, 1970.


Today, Navarre Hall houses the Haskell president's office, Indian Leader, print shop and the Business office.

Tahoma: The original building was built in 1905 as a hospital for Haskell students. During the first years of Haskell's existence, the sick were cared for in Keokuk and the Teachers Quarters.

It is thought that the name Tahoma is corrupted name for Tacoma; however, Tahoma is an Indian name for Mt.









The 1993-94 school year is historic for Haskell Indian Nations University in a number of ways. First, we began the semester with the accreditation of our first baccalaureate program and a new name, which symbolizes a new direction and era for Haskell.

Second, as a student body, you have marked this era by enrolling at Haskell in greater numbers—a ten year high for the university. You represent 163 Indian Nations and 37 states. This diversity provides a rich opportunity to learn about the cultures of many Indian nations, making Haskell a special and unique place.

You have also demonstrated a serious commitment to your academic pursuits and improving the quality of life on campus and in the community. You have carefully and thoroughly researched significant issues and acted upon your convictions with appropriate and energetic responses. Your heightened awareness and concern levels resulted in a activism that created a number of positive changes at Haskell. For example, the wetlands and the medicine wheel will be protected, forever, because of your actions. In addition, thanks to you, Haskell now has its first recycling program.

Furthermore, you have conveyed to Haskell and the community a sense of pride in your heritage and who you are as a person. Accordingly, you will not tolerate prejudice, discrimination, and being treated as a second-class citizen. You are a group of students who have left an indelible imprint on Haskell and Lawrence and we are proud of your accomplishments.

As you leave Haskell, I know that you represent the future for Indian people. It is your visionary leadership that will make a positive difference in Indian country. Good luck to you and may all of your dreams be fulfilled.



























HINU Rejects









With a 10-0 vote last Thursday the Haskell Indian Nations University Board of Regents voted not to accept Douglas County's compromise proposals and recomended that another route be found for the South Lawrence Trafficway.

"It's been a very emotional week whether you're from the Haskell community, the county or the city of Lawrence," said Regent President George Tiger.

Haskell students and Student Senate have protested the current alignment of the trafficway since the school was officially notified in October.


The county had planned to build part of the \$62 million trafficway on the southern border of the Haskell campus along 31st Street, but when protest came from the students of Haskell they were forced to take notice.

"We never meant to hinder the development of Lawrence, we just want to protect what is precious to us." Student Senate Vice President Adrian Brown told the Regents.

"We don't enjoy 31st Street as it is, the South Lawrence Trafficway is just more than we are willing to cope with." Brown went on to call for the removal of 31st Street after the Trafficway is built farther South.

The students claimed that the trafficway would destroy the serenity of the Haskell Medicine Wheel, and the wildlife studied by Haskell's science students in the wetlands adjacent to 31st Street.
